"AN OBSERVER" WRITES HIS VIEWS OF CREAMERY

Says "Plant Is One of the Most Complete in Any Man's Country."

"STAY WITH HOME INSTITUTION"

To Our Own Best Interests to Help Home Creamery Get the Business.

I was in the county when the creamery was opened at Portales and was especially pleased to find that the county had such an enterprise. The closer we stay to the old milk cow in these parts the more nearly will we stay in range of our obligations. A few weeks ago I was in home of one of the operators and later in the creamery and looked over the plant. One will hardly find a more complete little plant in any man's town than this one. I am in a sense acquainted with the managers or operators. The company may, in my judgment, feel themselves proud of their selections. They are, or appear to be, good citizens, and thoroughly capable in their line.

Before I proceed further I had better give a few items about myself. The reader will ask, "Has he any financial interest in the business?" I don't own a dollar's worth of stock nor a hand full of Roosevelt county dirt. I own no cows and haven't milked a cow but once in a number of years. So far as I can think thru it all I have no personal selfish interest in the creamery. One who argues with us about a business interest, we are ready to say, "He hath a Beelzebub," or is inspired in all his ways by prince of self-interest; and too frequently, while we wait and investigate the business declines and dies or falls into the hands of an enemy. It's really too late to raise a howl; but we just throw one fit after another. Really the situation is as plain as the nose on your face. The big boy is after the little one right now and just as soon as he can he means to strangle him to death.

It is an investment and a business of our own county that, if protected, will produce a constant and steady income to each man who has a pound of cream to sell. It has already raised cream from 18 to 32 cents, and what are we doing to help in the good work. So far as I can get at the facts we are practicing that same old saying, "A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush," and, if we go on in this practice, when we come to reach for the bird in the bush, there'll not be any bird there. We are demanding the best prices for our product and at that same time we are selling our heritage for a mess of pottage. That other fellow is investing in futures and we are selling to him. In fact, gentlemen, we are now just at the place many of us have crossed in the old states, or maybe, we were not there when our heritage was sold, but while we rebelled, we had to keep the contract and work out the plan. I worked fifteen years in a tobacco patch, raising the nasty weed under a contract that was sealed before my knowledge. Under the combines it sold for from four to five cents, and I with my own hands helped to build every dealer a beautiful home, while my father's home was burdened with a mortgage. That same stuff brings now eleven and twelve cents on the same market. We are building a new commonwealth and it has a hopeful future and it is for the possession of that future the outsider is bidding. Is it a fact that we, today, are going to sell from our posterity that future? It is a time when we should consider very carefully our affairs. Are we going to be surfs or princes? As I understand it, this cream-

ery is the possession of our county and it behoves us to rally about it with patriotism and vision. I see no use to strangle the child of our industry and then wait that it is dead.

It is not too late now to set in to do our duty toward this industry; of course, it has suffered by your waywardness. But set in to see to it that your cream goes to your own county creamery. An Observer.

Democratic Convention

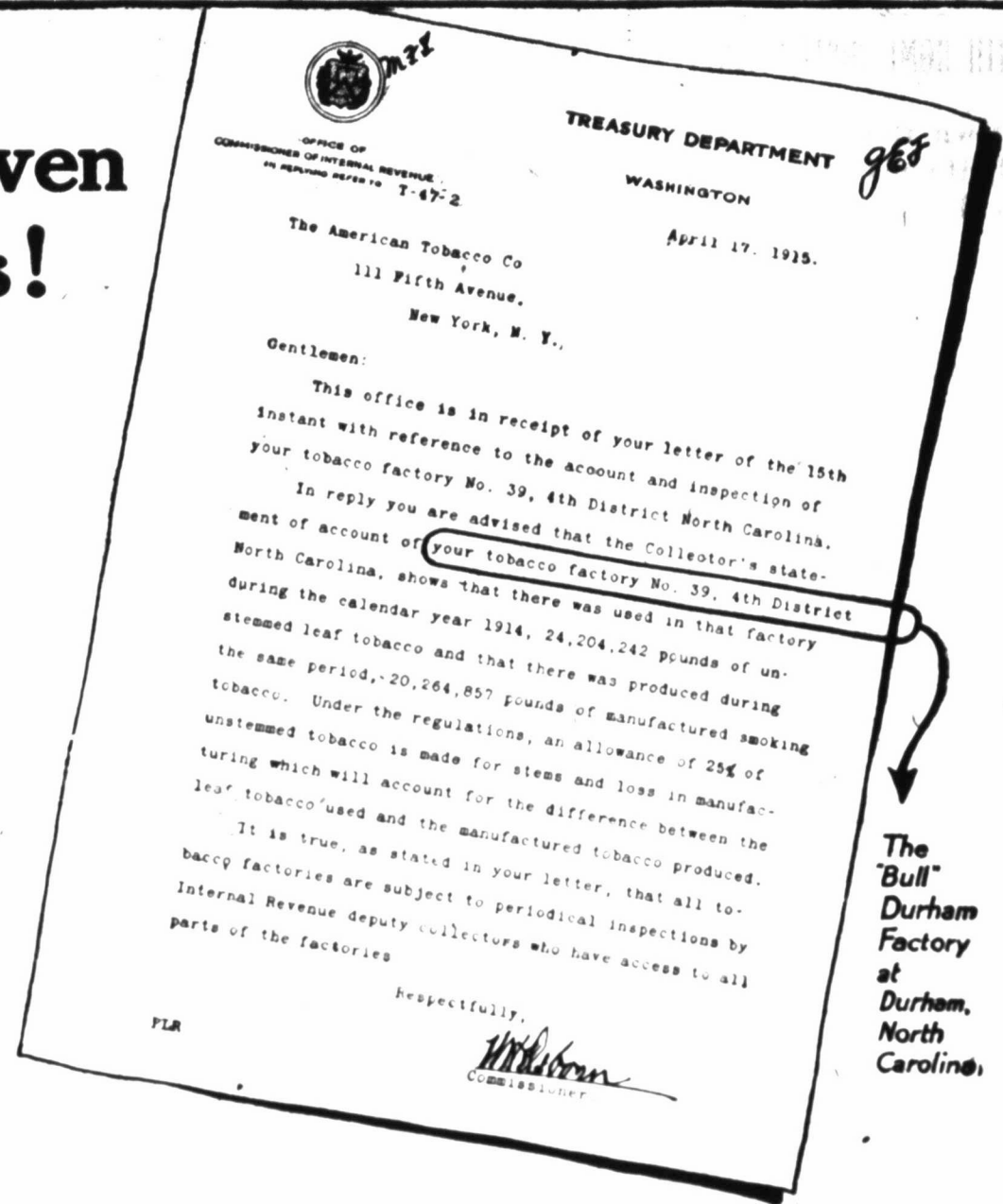

COMING EVENTS. April 18--Progressive State Convention at Santa Fe. April 25--Republican State Convention at Albuquerque.

Curry county teachers will meet at Clovis April 15.

Arbor Day was generally observed throughout the state.

The depots at Tularosa and Dayton were destroyed by fire.

The Santa Fe will build a five-stall round house at Carlsbad.

The governor appointed Jose J. Montoya of Cuba, a notary public.

April 14 is Bird Day according to Governor McDonald's proclamation.

Fire destroyed the barn and contents belonging to D. J. Owen, of Clovis.

The big sawmill in Alamogordo will run again after having been idle for more than eight years.

The Deming Chamber of Commerce has decided to work for a Luna county fair in September.

The Santa Fe depot at Dayton and several stock cars were destroyed by fire. The loss is placed at \$4,000.

By a vote of 106 to 6, the business men of Albuquerque have decided that they want a state fair this year.

The Santa Fe railway is getting ready to make extensive improvements on its line through the Pecos valley.

Castulo Silva of Dilla and William E. Kelley of Socorro have been commissioned notaries public by Governor McDonald.

The Deming creamery is now receiving from 900 to 1,000 pounds of cream weekly, and is producing from 200 to 250 pounds of butter.

Mrs. Maude Hawk Wright and baby have returned to Silver City from El Paso. Mrs. Wright was taken prisoner when Villa bandits raided Columbus.

Several hundred soldiers were put to work at Columbus preparing a new aviation field for the eight new aeroplanes purchased by the War Department.

A shocking accident occurred at the Kohler mine, resulting in the death of Arthur Reed, the 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Reed of Raton.

W. P. Southard of Albuquerque, announced that he would accept the chairmanship of the state fair commission, which Governor McDonald announced.

A total of \$100,000 is appropriated for the United States Indian school at Santa Fe in the general Indian appropriation bill passed by the Senate at Washington.

Seth Aiston bought of Mr. Hewitt, of Dunlap, 1,849 acres of land, 150 head of registered cows, forty graded cows and 1,800 head of sheep at a price of \$47,500.

Wolves, lions and coyotes took heavy toll of stock on the forest ranges in the Albuquerque forest district during last year. A total of 4,600 head were killed.

The United States Supreme Court granted the state of New Mexico permission to sue the secretary of the interior to compel him to grant title to coal lands in school land grants.

A brakeman by the name of Shaw running between Roswell and Clovis had his foot cut off in the railroad yards at Clovis.

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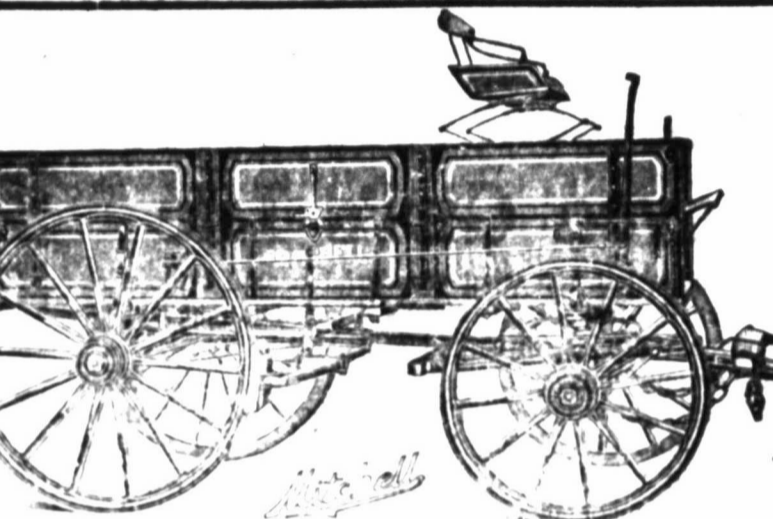
