A Strong Delegation Has Been Selected to Attend Meeting at Lawton Oklahoma

Monday morning of this week James A. Walker, of Altus, Oklahoma, made an address to the citizens of Portales on the proposed branch of the Ozark Trails. The crowd that greeted Mr. Walker was about twenty in number, and should have been a hundred. He went carefully over the ground of what had been accomplished and what was ex pected to be accomplished. He
pointed out that Portales did not get a look in on the other line for the reason that the promoters were not at that time prepared to consider building a north and south road, however the time had arrived when Portales did have a chance to get on the map. The Trails Military Highway is now building, has, in fact, been
pleted to Matador, Texas. From there two routes are available, one of which is via Flainview, tales and Roswell, thence to El Paso. This route will connect three governmert contonments and keep military roads open it is expected that, upon com. pletion, the government will adopt it as a military highway. At the conclusion of the address a committee of three was aplciting charter members to county organization, the conmittee to report the next after three o'clock, a few of those who had signed the paper, and practically every business man in town had signed it, met and perfected an organization. James A. Hall was elected chairman, Ed. J. Neer, vice chairman and Jonez, James A. Hail, J. B. Priddy Ed. J. Neer, G. W. Carr, W O Oldham, and Roy W. Connally were elected delegates to the big meeting at Lawton, Oklahcma For the purpose of defraying the expenses of the above delegates, a finance committee, composed and J. S. Long, was appointed by the chair, and this committee was instructed to get the money It really seems that this time

I this amendment had carried it However, the tax amemdment is known to have been defeated and the prohibition amendment has carried beyond question.
The drive to raise thirty-five millions of dollars for Y. M. C.A. work in France and other countries will be successful, however, it wouid appear that the national atthorities, through their officers in the field, would be able to cope with the situation complained of through its police power. It is a laudable enterprise, always, to inaugurate movements for the human uplift, but it would seem that these movements would produce much more beueficial results if backed by the dictum from this government that foreign saloons and bawdy houses must remain closed to American soldiers upon pain of their withdrawal to places where these pitfalls were not so conspicuous. Thirty-five millions of dollars is consieerable money
and would buy many bandages and other hospital necessities and if it is to be backed by all the military force this government is able to bring to bear. Moral suasion is often a powerful factor or good, but the strong arm of the law has often been found to be of great aid in the suppression of vice An ultimatum to the police departments of Paris and other municipalities would effect ually close these places to the boys in France.
