GLASS STAINED BY X-RAYS, Experiments Have Shown These Pro duce the Same Effect as the Light of the 8
It is well known that glass exposed for long to sunlight acquires a violet tint. In very old houses the wind wio-
facing south are often distinctly vio let. Experiments recently made in the
laboratorles of the General Electrie company at Schenectady with X-rays prove that these can be used to dye glass in many colors, principally an amethystine violet and an amber yel-
low, but also green and bright yellow low, but also green and bright yellow
These colors, according to Mr. Rosenthal, who conducted the experiments, are due to modifications of the physical structure of the glass and not
to chemical alterations. The color can be made to penetrate to any desired' depth, from a mere surface tint to complete coloration of the entire sub-
stance. stance. And the same method can be
applled to tintling porcelaln, and prectous atones.
An interesting and important fact about this glass that has been colcoed by long exposure to $\mathbf{X}$-rays is that is becomes impervious to the radiations
that have transformed it. be used as a protection against the glare of the sun or the snow and agalnst the X-rays themselves.
