

Quinces come late in the season when more attention can be given to them. Grate and cook with equal parts of sugar, letting the mixture stand in the sugar over night before cooking. This is quince honey, nice as a garnish for ice creams and pud-

If one makes his own sausage at home, roll it in corn husks and smoke it. You will find it a most delicious and unusual flavor. Save nice perfect husks for this purpose and make the sausage roll the size of the ear that came out of the husk. Tie the ends with strips of husk and when smoked pack in layers in a box. Keep cool and the sausage will keep well.

English Chutney Sauce.—This sauce requires no cooking but should be kept where it can be stirred daily for ten days before putting away. Chop one pound of apples, three-fourths of a pound of raisins, one dozen ripe tomatoes, two red peppers, six small onions and one-fourth of a cupful of mint leaves. Add an ounce of white mustard seed, four ounces of salt, one used for briqueting in Canada. When making French dressing a small piece of ice in the salad bowl will blend and thicken the dressing quickly.

Do not leave meat in its wrapping paper; the meat is not only flavored by the paper but the juices are absorbed by it.

While carrots are young and tender make some marmalade. Take 11/2 pounds of well-washed carrots, the same amount of sugar and two lemons cut fine, excluding the seeds. Chop the carrots and simmer until tender, then add the sugar and cook until thick. Seal in jelly glasses.

In developing plans for industrial housing projects one of the greatest problems confronting the building committees and architects is to decide what type of building will best suit conditions and meet requirements. Each type of house has its particular advantages and the decision is largely governed by climatic conditions, class of workmen catered to, proximity to large cities and the facilities for transportation.


Heretofore the detached house has generally been conceded the most satisfactory solution to the problem, but after a careful survey of the situation the large industrial institutions throughout the country are rapidly awakening to the fact that the multiple dwelling or apartment building possesses many advantages over the single house.

In the multiple dwelling a number

In building for industrial purposes it is absolutely necessary to keep the building costs down as low as possible, whether the apartments are to be rented or sold outright. The average workman is a man with a family of from three to five, consequently maximum sleeping accommodations must be provided without materially increasing the cost of the building. In carrying out the modern ideas of efficiency, all unnecessary rooms must be dispensed with entirely.





This plan is used successfully in many sections of the country and is much more efficient than the old plan of eliminating the dining room, compelling the housewife to serve meals in the kitchen.

Sometimes it is advisable to have at least one regular bedroom. In such instances a plan such as No. 2 is used. This plan is for a building 34 feet by 42 feet and represents the old style six-room apartment with two bedrooms eliminated, reducing it to four rooms. In addition to the living room, dining room and kitchen there is one bedroom. Otherwise the same ideas contained in plan No. 1 are carried out.

Eliminating Bedrooms Economy. Great economy in construction, furnishing and housework is gained by eliminating as many bedrooms as possible and making the living and dining rooms do double duty, serving as bedrooms at night when they are no longer needed for other purposes.

GOOD WARTIME DISHES.

We cannot say that we are doing our part in food saving and serving unless we waste abso-

> lutely nothing. Not a crumb of bread should be wasted. The crumbs that fall from the bread board in cutting bread will amount to at least a teaspoonful from a few slices. Put them in chopped meat, in puddings, in gravies for

thickening instead of wheat flour. Any number of uses will occur to the cook who is trying to save.

Veal Sweetbreads. — Sweetbreads spoil quickly and should be used as soon as possible. Plunge them into cold water and let stand an hour, changing the water twice. Put them to cook in slightly salted acidulated water, boiling hot. Cook for thirty minutes rather slowly. Drain, plunge into cold water which keeps them white and firm. Now they may be used in various ways.

Liver.—Parboll one pound of beef liver five minutes. Drain. Remove the skin and veins, then brown in a little hot fat, chop, add a fourth of a teaspoonful of mustard, a teaspoonful of salt, a few dashes of pepper, a fourth of a teaspoonful of worcestershire sauce and thicken with a teaspoonful each of butter and flour. Add a hard cooked egg and a teaspoonful of lemon juice. Serve on corn dodgers.

Brown Stew.—This is a good dish to make a little meat go a long way. Cut a pound of the neck of a beef in inch cubes, season, dredge with flour, brown in fat, then add potato water to cover. When it boils up set it back and let it simmer slowly for three hours. Three-quarters of an hour before the end of the cooking, add carrots and turnips cut in cubes: a half hour before serving add potatoes. Three-fourths or a cupful of each regetable will be a good proportion.

GOOD THINGS WITH BARLEY FLOUR.

In many of the darker cakes, using spices, molasses and chocolate, barley flour may be used

exclusively in place of the wheat flour. Sponge Barley Flour Cake.—Beat four egg yolks very light, add one cupful of sugar, beating it in gradually,

then add a tablespoonful of hot water, a cupful of barley flour mixed and sifted with one and a half teaspoonfuls of baking powder, a fourth of a teaspoonful of salt and a teaspoonful of lemon juice. Fold in the egg whites, beaten stiff, and bake in a slow oven 15 minutes.

Plain Barley Cake.—Sift one and a half teaspoonfuls of baking powder with two cupfuls of flour, a pinch of salt. Cream a fourth of a cupful of fat. add three-fourths of a cupful of corn sirup, a beaten egg, two-thirds of a cupful of milk added alternately with the flour and well beaten. Add a cupful or less of raisins well floured and stirred into the cake. Pour into a shallow pan and bake 20 minutes.

Barley and Oatmeal Drop Cakes .--Take a cupful of barley flour, one and a fourth cupfuls of rolled oats that have been well parched and put through the meat grinder, a half a cupful of fat, one-fourth of a cupful of brown sugar, the same of corn sirup, one egg, three tablespoonfuls of water, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, with a teaspoonful of salt mixed with the flour, and lastly a half-cupful of nuts.

Barley Pie Crust.—Prepare the pastry just as usual, using barley flour instead of wheat. It will be a little harder to handle but will be tender and flaky. A most dainty pie can be made of custard, using three or four marshmallows to sweeten, and two or three tenspoonfuls of coconut stirred into the meringue instead of the sugar, which does away with using su-

Barley Cakes .- Take two cupfuls of barley flour, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, a half teaspoonful of salt, sifted together. Cream a fourth of a cupful of fat with three-fourths of a cupful of sugar, add a half cupful of milk and three-fourths of a cupful of nut meats. Drop on well-greased pans and bake in a moderate oven.



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DEPEW IS WOUNDED IN FIERCE FIGHT WITH GERMANS AND GOES TO HOSPITAL

Synopsis.—Albert N. Depew, author of the story, tells of his service in the United States navy, during which he attained the rank of chief petty officer, first-class gunner. The world war starts soon after he receives his honorable discharge from the navy, and he leaves for France with a determination to enlist. He joins the Foreign Legion and is assigned to the dreadnaught Cassard, where his markmanship wins him high honors. Later he is transferred to the land forces and sent to the Flanders front. He gets his first experience in a front line trench at Dixmude. He goes "over the top" and gets his first German in a bayonet fight. The nurses certainly work hard. They always have more to do than they ought to, but they never complain, and are always cheerful and ready to play games when they have the time, or read to some poilu. And their work is pretty dirty too: I would not like to have to do it. They say there were lots of French society ladies working as nurses, but you never heard much about society, or any talk about Lord Helpus, or Count Whosis, or pink teas or anything like that from these nurses.

A few shells landed near our hospital, while I was there, but no patient was hit. They knocked a shrine of Our Lady to splinters, though, and bowled over a big crucifix. The kitchen was near by, and it was just the chef's luck that he had walked over to our ward to see a pal of his, when a shell landed plumb in the center of the kitchen, and all you could see all over the barracks was stew.

That was a regular eatless day for us, until they rigged up bogies and got some more dixies, and mixed up some cornmeal for us. The chef made up for it the next day, though. The chef was a great little guy. He was a "blesse" himself, and I guess his stomach sympathized with ours.

There was a Frenchman in the bed next to me who had the whole side of his face torn off. He told me he had been next to a bomber, who had just lit a fuse and did not think it was burning fast enough, so he blew on it. It burned fast enough after that, and there he was.

There was a Belgian in one of the other wards, whom I got to know pretty well, and he would often come over and visit me. He asked many questions about Dixmude, for he had had relatives there, though he had lost track of them. He often tried to describe the house they had lived in so that I might tell him whether it was still standing or not, but I could not remember the place he spoke of. During our talks, he told me about many me I had heard before, and some of them I heard of afterward. Here are some things that he either saw or heard of from victims:

He said that when the Germans entered the town of St. Quentin, they started firing into the windows as they passed along. First, after they had occupied the town, they bayoneted every workingman they could find. Then they took about half of the children that they could find, and killed them with their musket butts. After this, they marched the remainder of the children and the women to the square, where they had lined up a row of male citizens against a wall. The women and children were told that if they moved, they would all be shot. Another file of men was brought up, and made to kneel in front of the other men against the wall.

The women and children began to beg for the lives of the men, and many of them were knocked in the head with gun butts before they stopped.

Then the Germans fired at the double rank of men. After three volleys, there were eighty-four dead and twenty wounded. Most of the wounded they then killed with axes, but somehow, three or four escaped by hiding under the bodies of others and playing dead, though the officers walked up and down firing their revolvers into the piles of bodies.

The next day the Germans went through the wine cellars, and shot all the inhabitants they found hiding there. A lot of people, who had taken refuge in a factory over night, decided to come out with a white flag. They were allowed to think that the white flag would be respected, but no sooner were they all out than they were seized and the women publicly violated in the square, after which the men were shot. A paralytic was shot as he sat in his arm-chair, and a boy of fourteen was taken by the legs and pulled apart.

At one place, a man was tied by the arms to the ceiling of his room and set afire. His trunk was completely carbonized, but his head and arms were unburned. At the same place, the body of a fifteen-year-old boy was found, pierced by more than twenty bayonet thrusts. Other dead were found with their hands still in the air. leaning up against walls.

At another place the Germans shelled the town for a day, and then entered and sacked it. The women and children were turned loose, without being allowed to take anything with them, and forced to leave the

make canes out of shell cases, and were almost exhausted by hunger, tried rings of aluminum, and slippers and to escape. They were bayoneted and clubbed to death. Twelve men, who had taken refuge in a farm, were tied together and shot in a mass. Another group of six were tied together and shot, after the Germans had put out their eyes and tortured them with bayonets. Three others were brought before their wives and children and sabered.

The Belgian told me he was at Namur when the Germans began shelling it. The bombardment lasted the whole of August 21 and 22, 1914. They centered their fire on the prison, the hospital, and the railway station. They entered the town at four o'clock in the afternoon of August 23. During the first twenty-four hours, they behaved themselves, but on the 24th they began firing at anyone they pleased, and set fire to different houses on five of the principal squares.

Then they ordered every one to leave his house, and those who did not were shot. The others, about four hundred in all, were drawn up in front of the church, close to the river bank. The Belgian said he could never forget how they all looked.

"I can remember just how it was," he said. "There were eight men, whom I knew very well, standing in a row with several priests. Next came two good friends of mine named Balbau and Guillaume, with Balbau's seventeen-year-old son; then two men who had taken refuge in a barn and had been discovered and blinded; then two other men whom I had never seen be-

"It was awful to see the way the women were crying-'Shoot me too, shoot me with my husband."

"The men were lined up on the edge of the hollow, which runs from the high road to the bottom of the village. One of them was leaning on the shoulders of an old priest, and he was crying. 'I am too young-1 can't face

"I couldn't bear the sight any longer. I turned my back to the road and covfew escaped."

This Belgian had escaped by hiding -he could not remember how many days—in an old cart filled with manure and rubbish. He had chewed old hides for food, had swam across the river, and hid in a mud bank for almost a

week longer, and finally got to France. He took it very hard when we talked about Dixmude, and I told him that the old church was just shot to pieces. He asked about a painting called the "Adoration of the Magi," and one of the other prisoners told us it had been saved and transported to Germany. If that is true, and they do not destroy it meanwhile, we will get it back, don't

My wound was just a clean gunshot wound and not very serious, so, although it was not completely healed, they let me go after three weeks. But before I went, I saw something that no man of us will ever forget. Some of them took vows just like the men of the legion I have told about.

One of the patients was a German doctor, who had been picked up in No Man's Land, very seriously wounded. He was given the same treatment as any of us, that is, the very best, but finally, the doctors gave him up. They thought he would die slowly, and that it might take several weeks.

While in the hospital Depew witnesses a scene that convinces him that it is not only the kaiser and his system, out the German soldiers themselves, that are responsible for much of the frightfulness that has marked the war. Read about this scene in the next installment.





ERADICATION OF CUTWORM MOTHS

Late Fall and Winter Plowing of Grass Lands Will Destroy Their Winter Homes

HOGS DEVOUR MANY INSECTS

Injury Usually Consists in Cutting Off Plants Just Below Surface and Occurs in Spring - Eggs Are Hatched During Autumn.



If land that has been in grass for considerable time and is likely to contain cutworms is to be planted to corn the following spring, it should be plowed in midsummer or early fall, about the time the moths' eggs are laid or, better, before the eggs are laid, for then vegetation which is suitable for the moths to lay their eggs upon is removed. The earlier the preceding year grasslands to be planted to corn are plowed, the less will be the probability that the cutworm moths will have laid their eggs thereon, and the less, consequently, will be the danger of injury by cutworms the following year.

Late fall and winter plowing of grasslands, although not as effective as early plowing, will destroy many of the hibernating cutworms, as well as such other important corn pests as white grubs, and should be practiced when earlier plowing is impracticable.

Insects Are Devoured. Pasturing hogs upon land supposed to harbor cutworms is a beneficial practice, as these animals root up and devour insects of many kinds, including cutworms, in large numbers. Farm poultry, allowed to follow the plow, is of great value.

When cutworms are found to be a large part of the task of increasing abundant on corn land, the use of the roisoned bait is recommended. In

BIGGEST WHEAT YIELD

(Prepared by U. S. Department of Agriculture.)

The greatest wheat yield per acre that has been ascertained by the United States department of agriculture is 117.2 bushels, the average of 18 acres in Island county, Washington, in 1895. The field had been in cultivation for 30 years without any sort of fertilizer, except such as may have been left by crops. The usual production of wheat per acre in that state is 23 to 25 bushels; in the United States, 14 to 16 bush-

at or a little below the surface of the ground, almost invariably occurs in the spring, beginning as soon as the first plants sprout and continuing until late June or early July, by which time the worms are full grown. The worms feed at night and rest during the day beneath debris or in the soil from one-half to one inch below the surface, and since in most cases they resemble the soil closely in color the cause of the injury often is not apparent. However, if the soil surrounding the cut-off plant be examined carefully, the culprit probably will be found curled up beneath the surface.

Parents of Cutworms.

The parents of cutworms are grayish or brownish moths, or "millers," which commonly occur at lights during summer evenings. Each moth may lay from 200 to 500 eggs, either in masses or singly, in fields covered with dense vegetation, and hence the eggs are to be found more often than elsewhere in cultivated fields which have been in grass or weeds the preceding fall. The eggs hatch in the fall, a few weeks after they are laid, usually during September, and the young cutworms, after feeding on grass and other vegetation until cold weather, pass the winter as partly grown caterpillars. If an infested field is left to grass, no noticeable injury is likely to occur; but when it is broken up and planted to corn or other wide-row crops, the worms, suddenly being placed on "short rations," play havoc with the newly planted crops, the nearly fullgrown worms feeding greedily and consuming an enormous amount of food. In northern latitudes they attain full growth and stop feeding in late June or early July, and then change to the pupal or resting stage.

For a Family of Five.

A family of five, including two adults and three children under twelve years of age, under ordinary living conditions, shoould have stored for each month of the winter season the following food supplies: One bushel of Irish potatoes, one-half bushel of other root vegetables such as carrits, turnips, and parsnips; 25 quart cans of other vegetables; and 20 quarts of canned fruit and preserves. These figures are based on estimates by the United States department of agriculfure, which addr that most of this should come from the home gardens. With these figures as a basis, it is thought that almost any family may calculate its requirements, taking into consideration the length of the winter season in any given locality.

In every pen or yard a box of grit should be kept. Investigators have asserted that grit is a part of the necessary feed, giving the fowls strong bones and a bright plummage.
