We appreciate the fact that our folks are doing their part and by doing so we are able to give you many victories, and assure you of many more. Thess are hard won battles, such as I can not describe to you in a letter and you could hardly believe. But there is nothing that can stop our men. Although I am not in the trenches and do not expect to receive the praise that the fighting men get, do not want any; the praise goes to the dough boy, and he deserves it. The truck trains or ammunition train are very necessary. They have no protection against artillery and machine gun fire, also aeroplanes and gas, but we are protected against some gasses by the gas mask. Most of our driving is doné over mountain roads and at night with no lights. Even at this we are only doing our part, and after a man has been in the game on this side he looks at the thing in an altogether different light.
There is nothing that you can send me, as I would not get it Did you ever get the government insurance policy of $\$ 10,000$. It is made out to you, and I pa premium on it each month. ## LODGE'S BONEHEAD
