## District Court

The only case of any import ance in court this week, in so far as the civil docket was con cerned, was the First National bank of Elida against Cleve George. This case grew out of a promissory note on which Mr George was one of the sureties, and the fact that he had moved his cattle to grass last fall, thus temporarily absenting himself from his accustomed abode, was made the ground for the suit in madehment. The case was hard fought one the bank being hard foaght bye, T McClure of Roswell, and T. E. Mears, of of Roswell, and T. E. Mears, of
this city; and Cleve George was represented by Judge G. L. Reese, of this city. The court gave the jury the general instructions cov ering such cases and two specia findings requested by the plaint iff bank. The jury found for the defandant in all matters. Notice was given of a motion for a new trial and appeal.
Another case on the civil docket that was disposed of was the suit of J. B. Sledge and others against the board of county commissioners. This was an old case and involved the accuracy of surveys that had been made through the Benson addition to the town of
Portales. The jury found for the commissioners.
In the case of the state against Ursi Keen, charged witc the larceny of ten head of neat cattle in one count of the indictment, and with having driven from theiraccustsmed range, ten head of neat cattle, the jury broqgot in a verdict of not guilty. Robert C. Dow prosecuted and Judge James A. Hall defended.
Judge Bratton declared a court recess from Friday, March 21, until Monday March 31, on account of the fact that a large majority of the jurors were men whp owned more or less cattle, and the present state of the weather demanded that they be at hume to look after their stock, or tun a risk of considerable loss. This courtesy and thoughtfulness of the court was appreciated by every juror ot the panel and it will meet with the approval of those who were not affected by the order, as well as those who

Interesting Letter from France ${ }^{\text {by }}$ by the Romans and defeated and

Dear Uncle:
have been so busy since my return that I have not had chance to write you a letter tell ing about the trip that I had to Aix-les-Bains. But first of all. ince I returned, they are grant ing the enlisted men leave to Nice, and from here one can go
to Italy. I am sorry that I did not get in on this but glad that have had my leave.
First, Aix is a city of, $I$ should say, something like thirty thousand. It is situated in a valley and surrounded by the mount ains, and a very large lake.
Aix-les-Bains is both a summe and winter resort but has been closed all the time that the war has been going on. up to the
time that the government (U.S.) opened it for a leave area for en listed men.
There are many side trips that you may take. Onk is a trip to the top of Mt. Revard; you take the $\operatorname{cog}$ railway and it takes two hours to get on top. From here
you can see Italy, Switzerland, and the famous Mt. Blanc. Of course there is lots of snow up kees and have lots of fun.
We also made a side trip to Shambrey. This used to be the capital of Savoy, and a very historic city of France. This is the city that Hannibal passed through with his army of ele-
phats on his way to Rome with reinforcements for his brother as you remember, he was cut off
beheaded and his head sent to
his brother, and later his brother was beheaded. A monument of four elephants was erected in this eity; and I sent you a postal .
Another trip to the Cat' Tooth, by boat across the lake and then a hike of ten miles and about a third, gets you to the Cat's Tooth; but from here you see the valley the elephant army tains are very pretty

of large reception halls, parlors, library, theatre, and game rooms. The construction and architecture are very beautiful. The grounds surrounding are very pretty-many tennis courts, gardens, and such places as lovers would choose for a quiet talk, or good place to make up after misunderstanding with your best girl. This is the place that
Harry Thaw won in a single night, along with a hotel across the street; but he lost the fortune the same night. And in
this hotel that he won is where his wife, Evelin Thaw, took bath in champaine; might say that this is where the first shot was fired by these men that afterwards caused the real shooting. Across the street is the fa-
mous Silver Grill Room, Stanford White, while drinking, bet sixty thousand that he could hit the breast of the nude por missed the picture; and the bul-
let hole is still there. The lake here is beautifnl, and very clear, all the water coming. tains. It is said to be the la in France. This lake rises and falls at will. It is said that it has an underground current. One morning you may go for
your boat and find it in the mud, your boat and find it in the mud,
the water having fallen, and later you may go back and have to swim if you get to it. There is some very fine fish in this lake. Another noted feature of this city is the baths. They have the hot water, about 115 degrees Fr., oming from the ground. The bath house looks like one of our anks from the outside, but when ou get in you find library, reeption halls, parlors, and suits of bath rooms. You may get an alum bath, sulphur bath, pure water and many other baths. Mr. Morgan had a suite of rooms and took these baths for treatment. As for me, I took the shower and in the pond and the needle bath, only had one Turkish bath.
The roads here in France are wonderful and as they use the bike over here lots I had a ride ach morning around the lake and some times up in the mountains. I made one trip to the Gorges, and you also should have postals of this, as well as all other trips that I made, as I sent wo of each trip that I made.
The hotels here are finest in he land, and you can't beat the Frencl-bed. Justask any A. E. F. man about the French beds and he will tell you that they are he best things in France; leav ing out the good looking girls, nowledge that they had anything to do with them
I mentioned the baths before, but will give you a little more history of the baths. It is said that here in Aix- was the first public baths dating back to B. C. To see these old tubs and rooms you have to go through a hole something like ten by ten for back a hundred and fifty yards booms are the old tubs, here rooms are the old tubs, made of
rock and a furnace built under them, and a smooth surface o stone where you get out of the tub. These large rooms back to have been full of water at one time, as the rock is honey comb. Here is where the well is, or where the original five streams of water that came from the mountain is confined to on stream. This work was done by Italian engineers. Pay Is Announced At least one million and a quar ter soldiers and sailors will re
ceive the bonus of $\$ 60$ as bac ceive the bonus of $\$ 60$ as bac
pay granted in a recent act o congress, according to informa tion received from the depart ment by the local board of thi city. The allowance is in accord ance with the act of co
Section 1406 of the Revenu Act authorizes the payment of bonus of $\$ 60$ to officers, soldiers eld clerks and nurses of th rmy, upon honorable separatio rom active service by discharge, resignation or otherwise. Thi bonus is not payable to the heirs cased soldier.
Those who are discharged hereafter will receive this bonus on the same roll or voucher upon which they are paid their final pay. Those who have been discharged and have received their final pay without the $\$ 60$ bonus, should write a letter to the Zone Finance Officer, Lemon Building, Washington, D. C., stating their service since Apri] 6, 1917, the date of last discharge and their

ISSUE WEATHER FORECASTS Ald for Automoblie and Motortruck Traffic During Winter Over

Prepared by the Unted States Depart
The weant orther burreau of of the United Ttates wepartment of agriculture has arranged, in co-operation with the
state highway commission of Pennsylvania, to ald the automobile and mo Cortruck trafflc during the winter ove burgh and Harrisburg by giving out dally information of the weather con-
ditlons prevalling over the route and ditlons prevalling over the route and
issuing weather forecasts and warnings of heavy snows and cold waves for the assistant superintendents o highways at points along the route to report to the weather bureau office a ing by telephone or telegraph the depth of snow or ice on the highway, giving
its general condition. These reports

are published in the newspapers and
furnished to the different automoblle
clubs, thus becoming avallable to auto-
mobile and motortruck drivers passing
over the highway. The forecasts and
Warnings are given public distribution
and telegraphed to the superintendent
of highways at Harrisburg, who gives
Instructions to his forces along the
highway to make provisions for the
anticlpated weather conditions. This
service was in operatlon last winter
and gave great satisfaction. The
weather burean is ready to give siml
lar service to other traffic routes as
may be desired.

## Hatch Early

Eariy hatched chicks get a bet er start than late hatched chicks and are therefore stronger and acks of lice and disease. If yo will notice a flock of growing hicks which are lice infested you will find that it is the maller, weaker chicks which are suffering most. Observation will roublew that the lice are more weather than during the cooler weather of early spring so that the chicks hatched early are not ubjected to such severe attacks lice while still very young as of course does not chicks. Thi course does not mean that if the chicks are early hatched the matter of lice should be neglected. By all means examine them for ice, and if found, take measures to free the chicks from the pests. It does mean, however, that not so much trouble from lice will be experienced and that they will be easier to control and will therefore interfere less with the growth of the chicks

It is usually the smaller, weaker hicks in a flock which are atacked by disease. The older hicks are stronger and larger This is true during todisease. This is true during the entire growing season, but is perhaps most evident in the fall and early winter. At this time immature fowls seem to be much more likely to develop colds. Pulets immature when put in quar ters are a menace to the whole flock, for not only are chey more ikely to develop colds, but they are liable to be the means of the enting the colds throughou
therefore, to have the pullets reasonably well matured when they are put in winter quarters, pullets is to hatch early. The best time to hatch will depend upon the locality and the climate, and farmers and poultrymen are
urged to consult their urged to consult their county agent for this information.
