He has worked in co-operation with the chamber of commerce of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania and New York City, as well as in conjunction with some of the largest metropolitan dailies. Mr. Hagerline was but recently married to Mrs. Mildred Emerick of Oklahoma City, and brings his bride of a few days here to make

mother could know of such a crime being perpetrated in her own family without seeing to it that the responsible guilty party was brought to justice. It is one punishment, either in law, or is possible of administration. The death penalty, could it be invoked would not be commensurate with the crime. As yet no prelimi nary has been held and no bond fixed.
