PEEVED AT MEXICO Is reported that we are be coming somewhat peeved at Mex ico again. We have had those peevish spells, now and again for several years. Mexico has be come accustomed to them. S have we.
Mexico has been killing Ameri cans for quite awhile, and the assassins bave never been puni.hed, so far as any person in this ceuntry knows. To killian Ame ican in Mexlco is regarded as riskless sort of sport.
But Mexico has gone even far ther recently. A boat load of United States sailors was attacke and robbed in the river near Tam pico, the other day. The day was not so recent either. It occurred about two weeks ago, and the government at Washington, afte the incident became known in the United Staies through other channels, is looking into the matter.
In fact, we are told that th government regards the incident as a very grave one. It was so reguarded on Saturday, and the graveness of it had not abated Sunday. Yesterday it was not so grave
It was stated in the Washing ton dispatches Sunday that th government will soon ask Presi dent Carranza to arrest and pun ish the perpetrators of the attac on the American flag, and if he reports that the perpetrators can not be located, then he will be asked to disavow the act.
Of course, Carranza will disa vow.it. That is easy. He als so on to the end of his admini tration.
But on each occasion of attack upon the American flag our gov ernment will look upon the mat ter very graveiy. That has be come a habit and habits are har to change.-Albnquerque Morning Journal.
The above editorial commen from the Albuquerque Morning Journal comes with a peculiarly bad grace. It will be remembered that the courts of New Mexico had jurisdiction of the Columbus raid, wherein citizens of the gorillo state of Mexico of the gorillo state of Mexico
raided the American town of raided the American town of
Columbus, New Mexico. and durColumbus, New Mexico. and dur-
ing which raid-many white ing which raid-many white American citizens were killed. Some of the Mexican murderers were apprehended and brought to
trial in a $N \in \mathbb{W}$ Mexico court of justice, were convicted and sen tenced to ser ve terms in the penitentiary. One such, Silvano Vargas, was convicted and sen
tenced to serve seventy years in the state penitentiary at Santa Fe . One would think that a very rea onable sentence for the crimes committed, not so, the chief exe-
cutive of the state. cative of the state. Some two weeks ago an unconditional pardon was granted to this Mexican, bande, raider and murderer, and this before two of the seventy
years had been served. True it was alleged in extenuation of the pardon that Vargas was paralyzed rom the hips down; it is also rue that his victims are paralyzed or all time, are dead to the world, their friends, their relatives and their families. They lie bured in some village gravevard while the cowardly curs that surprised and murdered them are reeiving pardons and, for all we know to the contrary, congratulations. Judging from acts, it ould appear that official New Mexieo was not even peeved at
the atrocities committed by Mexican banditti; that the pardoning f murderers "has become a habit and habits are hard to change.

Radical prohibitionists are queer mixture of inconsistencies n the measure now before congress there is a provision that 'No person shall munufacture ell, barter, give away, transport, xport, deliver, furnish or receive any intoxicating liquor." One of the exemptions permirted under the proposed law is liquor for acramental purposes.
