Henry Ford tested the Ford starting and lighting system his own ear for one year.
Ten months ago the Ford Mo tor Company was not manufac turing electric starters: today the output of its starter department is greater than that of any other manufacturer of electric satrting devices in the world lts neares competitor makes one thousand a day, whereas, the Ford Com pany's output is fast approaching the three ttousand mark two thousand eight hundred and eighty one alreapy having bee manufactu.ed in one day.
The Ford starter and gener ator, for it is really two separate units, is not the result of a new idea or of a sudden decision More than eight years ago Mr Henry Ford's vision saw the need, and his electrical engineer were instructed to begin enperimenting. After seven years of con $\infty$ tant research, which took into consideration the many different climates in whicn the Ford car is used, together with the factors of size and weight and an adaptibility to quantity production, twenty-three trial job were built. These were tested
in many different ways. Mr. in many different ways. Mr.
Ford himself used one on his car for a year. Still the engineers continued their oxperiments and improvements.
Then came the order from the government for 16,000 three-ton tanks, each one of which was to be equipped with two synchronized Fird motors. A starter wa essential, so the one now being ved. But, only one starter and geverator wastused to turn ove the two Ford motors in each tank Jayuary first 1919, the Ford Mo tor company began equipping en closed cars with this new start ing and lighting system. engineers say that although the entire system, starter and gener ator, weighs only thirty-one pounds. It produces a higher torque output (constant rotary motion) pound for pound, tha any other systen on the marke When the department for build ing the starting and lighting sys tem flrst began production, fifty unit, but now that machinery an equipment have been installed, the time for unit is four hours Two huge armature impregnating ovens have been instalted, each with a capa. In of 100 every amatures are dried, soaked in varnish and dried again. Eight hours time is required for this one operation.
The power from the starter to the motor is applied through the well known Bendix drive, which automatically engages the starter and then, once the motor is started, the starter immediately oilless bearings and needs practically no attention.
Within another thirty days or six weeks, the Ford company expects to be making enough start ers so that every Ford car will be equipped with the new electric starting and lighting system.

He said the tire company built a small building and bought some second-hand machinery and that the motor company purchaced an office building but had not begun building a plant. The brokerage company was said to have been organized primarily to sell stock in the other two concerns.

## UNIFORM APPLE GRADE LAWS ASSIST IN SOLVING VARIOUS MARKETING PROBLEMS

ton of waste, establishlng a basis for rading, creation and maintenance of and encouragement of better methods production and handling.
The first definite attempt toward se-

crade law was initiated in 1907 by rade law was initlated in 1907 by a
number of prominent growers, shtp-
pers, and dealers, who were mental, after working on the problem

bill enacted in congress. This bill be ame a law in August, 1912, when it effect July 1, 1913. Although this law was not mandatory, it served a valua.-
ble purpose in awakentg and crystalizing public sentiment throughout the
country favoring the enactment of legislation which would serve to stabilize tigg fraudulant and deceptive packing
ind buying and selling.
Barreled Apple-Grade Laws.
