## GOOD

 ROADSKEEP EARTH ROADS IN SHAPE Engineer of Wisconsin Highway Com. Sytem of Maintenance

Earth roads will be in existenc over wide areas for many years to come, notwithstanding the rapid extenfion materials.
Mr. F. Sergeant, a division enginee of the Wisconsin highway commission writes;-
"After a season's experience witt the patrol system of matntenance if
division No. 7, where we have prao tically all earth roads, I am more thar ever convinced that this type of road can be fairly well maintained by this
system, even where subject to consid erable heavy motor traffe.
"A patrol section should not be more than six or seven miles in length and should be taken care of by one man
with team. This man should be held with team. This man should be held
responsible for the condition of his section at all times and should be required to devote all of his time to the
work. patrolman must have a good team, and the wagon box equipped with a dump bottom. The eounty
should furnish a light two-horse blade should furnish a light two-horse blade grader, road plane ${ }_{2}$ plow, scraper and
necessary small tools, such as shovel, necessary small tools, such as sho
plek, bar, brush scythe, rake, etc. plek, bar, brush scythe, rake, etc.
"In spite of all the clatms made for the road drag as a maintenance tool, we find the light blade grader or the road plane far superior to it, and we advocate the use of these tools entireI for road maintenance. We find that
a road drag having no bearing except on the blade, has a tendency to gouge out the material in soft spots making them still deeper, and glving the road grader or the road plane, having a long wheel base or bearing surface cuts only on the high spots and dis tributes the material in low places,
building them up and giving the road building them up and giving the road
a nice, smooth, driving surface. A blade grader should be so constructed that one man can drive the team and
make an adjustments necessary while make an adjustments necessary while the machine is moving, as onis
man is required on this work. "An earth road with low crow badly sodded shoulders cannot be properly maintained by the patrolman, but should be first trimmed up with a ling heavy sods, properly heaping up the crown, flling low places and opening up drainage.
"The blade grader should not be ased on earth roads when they are
sloppy, but should be used as soon as sloppy, but should be used as soon as
the material is dry enough to roll nice Iy on the blade, and pack Into the rute and depressions. And no great amount of material should be moved at one
time ; a quarter or half inch cut is suetime; a quarter or haif inch cut is sul-
ficient for the best results, furnishing all the material that the blade can dis tribute evenly. Under ordinary weath-

er condiftions the material is in a fatr condition to work. with the grader for about three days after a rain, giving
ample time for three full rounds of the section which should leave even a badly rutted road in falrly good cond1tion. Be sure to always make the first
round trip on the center of the road. "Six inches of crown to a 24 -foot
con driving surface is sufficent. Care should be taken that the roadbed is nicely rounded, and not dragged to a
peak in the center or a large ridge of peak in the center or
loose earth left there."
