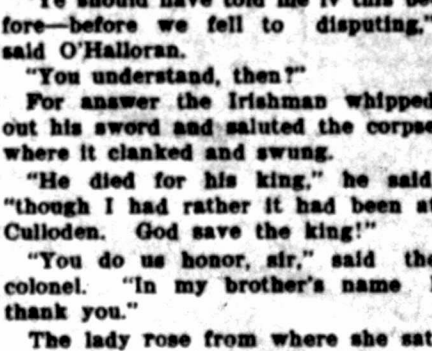

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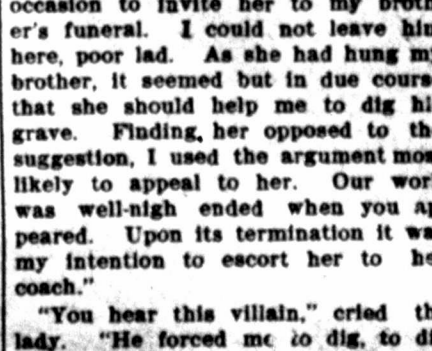

## THE CODLING MOTH HELD IN CHECK BY SPRAYING

Result of a Season's Experiment in Ohio—By Prof. H. A. Gessard, Entomologist.

Orchard, located near Amberst, was selected for the experiment. It consisted of about 12 acres of trees. These trees average 20 feet in height and have an equal amount of top. Some sections of the orchard were slightly infested with codling moth last winter. Carefully sprayed by the owner with Bordeaux mixture. Regular Bordeaux treatments were given for several summers. The present one, therefore, was quite free from scab. The codling moth system of culture has been used and wormy apples were said to be quite numerous the previous year, the owners estimating fully 40 or 50 per cent. of the orchard had been wormy at harvest if the trees had been left unsprayed.

The spraying outfit consisted of a power pump and a 250-gallon tank mounted on trucks. A suit-tower, built on the trucks and resting on an elevated platform from the tallest trees could be reached, added to the convenience and efficiency of the apparatus. Hand-extension rods ten feet long were used. Each rod was terminated by a four-ferrous nozzle. To save the value of the coarse drive shafts which were ordinarily used, worn vermored caps were used until the orifices were yet enlarged and these were used in comparison with new medium caps.



The Spraying Outfit with Which the Work Was Done.

Each one of the rods a crook was attached to the extension. The bent end makes an angle of about 25 degrees with the pole. The end of the crook is threaded, and to connect with the rod by means of a gas coupling, the other end of the nozzle is inserted into the head of the nozzle. This device enables the operator to direct the spray into the calyx of the blossoms and also to more fully reach the undersides of the branches by turning the rod so the spray is thrown upward. Figure 1 shows a cluster of nozzles on a rod which is set at about the correct angle by the manufacturer. If the angle is made greater than 30 degrees the spray cannot be done very satisfactorily. Some nozzles are so made they can be turned on their axis to about the right angle.

Since the owners of the experimental orchard keep bees we could not be spraying until all the petals were made up or three or four days in commencing than would have been the case under other circumstances. The first spraying was begun on June 30 and because of interfering rains was not finished until June 7.

On cold wet springs, if sprayed with Bordeaux mixture or arsenical compounds, young apples are apt to be more or less russeted, owing to excessive development of cork in the skin. This experimental orchard exhibited a conspicuous amount of russeting. The trees early sprayed russeted most, those sprayed ten days later possessing

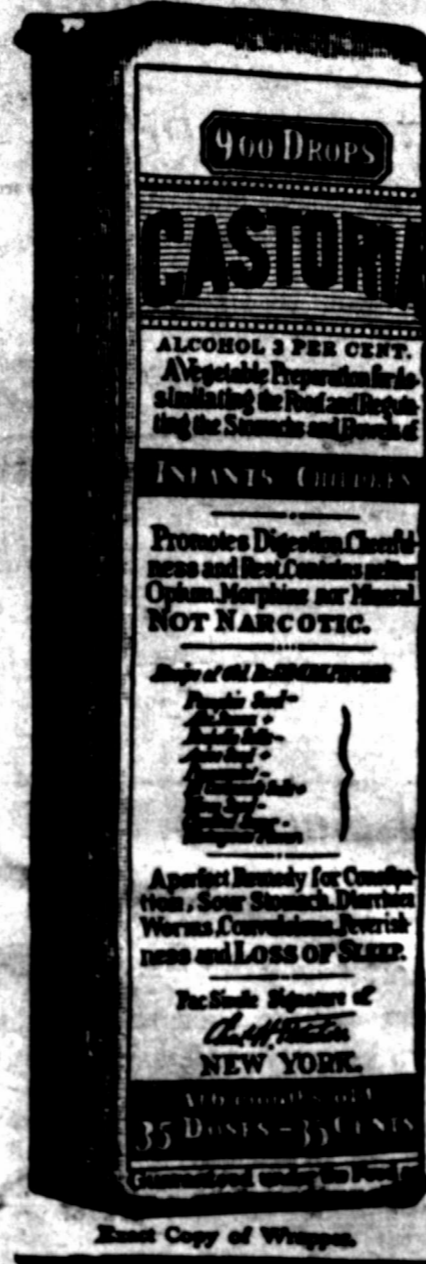
