## MASS MEETING PETITIONS GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS

**Enthusiastic Citizens Crowd Courthouse Saturday in the Face of Wind and Dust Storm. Resolutions Adopted and Petitions Circulated**

In the face of a terrific dust and sand storm the courthouse was crowded beyond its seating capacity Saturday when promptly at 1:30 p. m. the irrigation mass meeting was called to order by E. P. Alldredge. J. A. Fairly was elected chairman and E. P. Alldredge secretary. Many enthusiastic speeches were made, both by Portales citizens and by farmers round about. Among others Messrs Joe Howard, Chairman Fairly, Lumpkin and Molinari made very telling talks, which were followed by the presentation and unanimous adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Whereas, we realize that the Government through the Reclamation Service is effecting a far reaching public service by converting large areas of semi arid west into great extensive farming districts, thus reducing farming to a scientific basis and furnishing homes and competence for thousands of her best citizens, and

2. Whereas, there is adjacent to the town of Portales, New Mexico, a valley approximating an area of 500 square miles of the most fertile soil with an inexhaustible supply of good water at a mean depth of twenty feet beneath the surface, and

3. There are between 1500 and 2000 homesteads occupied by bona fide settlers, using all their energies, time and money in the effort to build their homes in the barren country and to earn a livelihood for themselves and their families by dry farming, and

4. Whereas, in view of all these things, we believe the Government, through the Reclamation Service, has an opportunity in the Portales Valley and vicinity to reclaim one of the largest, most productive and most healthful areas of semi-arid soil and at the least expenditure of money to be found in the United States, and at the same time to bring immediate, direct and permanent help to the thousands of heroic settlers, many of whom have battled against the odds of uncertain seasons and other difficulties consequent to the frontier conditions until they are ready to surrender hope and leave the country, and finally to obey the Divine commission, "To go forth and subdue the earth and replenish it."

Therefore, be it resolved by

### Institute Opened

The summer institute and normal of Roosevelt county opened Monday of this week at 1 p. m. Twenty-one teachers were in attendance the first day and that number has been increasing from day to day. Professor W. G. Russell is director in charge of the work during the first two weeks.

During the latter half, beginning June 14th, Superintendent T. W. Conway of Raton will be director and he will be assisted

the citizens and settlers residing in the Portales Inland Valley assembled in Mass Meeting in the court house of Roosevelt County, at Portales, New Mexico, on this the 20th day of May, 1909, that we do hereby commend the efforts of Honorable W. H. Andrews, Delegate to Congress from New Mexico, to secure the passage of House Bill No. 9528, which provides for the purchase of a site and the erection of a power plant in this community at a cost of \$300,000 for irrigation purposes; and do most earnestly appeal to the Honorable F. H. Newell, Director of Reclamation Service, for his kind offices and assistance in securing the immediate passage of the Bill or for such relief as in his judgment the conditions and opportunities herein set forth demands or justifies."

In addition to the passage of the foregoing resolutions, a committee was appointed to draft a petition to be presented to Mr. F. H. Newell of Reclamation service, asking for an immediate investigation of the splendid advantages which the Portales Inland Valley offers for the large plant proposed in Delegate Andrews' bill already introduced before Congress; and also urging the immediate passage of said bill at the present session of Congress.

In this connection we may be permitted to say what we have said before with reference to conditions obtaining in the Portales Inland Valley. It is absolutely unthinkable that an area of at least 500 square miles of the richest soil, with an inexhaustible supply of good water at a depth of from eighteen to twenty feet beneath the surface in the most salubrious climate on earth with from 1500 to 2000 bona fide settlers actually residing upon and cultivating the land, there should not be some way to utilize this splendid supply of water in such a way as to irrigate this entire valley. The apparent loss is too obvious, too easily overcome, and altogether too inexcusable; while the benefits are too manifest, too large in proportion to the cost and too easily and readily realized. Let us push this matter along. Write to Delegate Andrews, also to any other member of Congress whom you may know personally and urge immediate action.

## SPLENDID WOMAN'S CLUB BUILDING WILL BE ERECTED

**Subscription List Has Almost Reached Four Thousand and the Contract Will Soon Be Let. Building to Cost Six Thousand Dollars**

Nearly four thousand dollars has been raised for the erection of the building contemplated by the woman's Club of the city. The build will cost six thousand but the contract will be let before the whole amount is raised.

The present plans finally adopted provide for a gymnasium with bath and sewerage connections, an auditorium, ladies' club room, men's club room and library on the first floor, and a large reception room, quarters for the Woodmen of the World and a kitchen on the second. On the first floor will also be a rest room which will be open for the free use of ladies from the country. This will be equipped so as to serve the convenience of ladies who have time upon their hands and who need rest while in town. The members of the club desire that it shall be used freely.

The public good intellectual, social and moral. The library will be open to general reading and will be furnished with all the popular magazines as well as the leading dailies. The gymnasium will be modern in all its equipments and will be a popular resort for men and boys. The bath and sewerage connections will be made as soon as the city waterworks are in and this feature will be especially attractive. The auditorium will be used for lectures and other programs of high intellectual order. In fact every department of this splendid structure is designed for service and will be valuable in the extreme.

The Woman's Club ought to have the unanimous support of the people, and they doubtless will, in the construction of this splendid two story stone building which will be an ornament to the town and of incalculable service to the public, especially the young people.

### Narrow Escape.

Dudley, the little two-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Pitts narrowly escaped drowning Wednesday. The little fellow had been accustomed to go to the bank of a surface tank near the house to examine fish lines. This time, in some unknown way, he fell into the water and in the excitement kept going farther in instead of getting out. When Mr. Pitts discovered the child only the back of his head was to be seen. He at once sprang over the fence and into the tank rescuing the boy immediately. **The American Hen**

The Wall Street Journal has the following: "Primary as the great crops are among the things that make for farm prosperity and business recovery they are ably supplemented by such subsidiary source of farm revenue as come from dairying and poultry raising. In 1899 the farm value of eggs produced in this country was \$144,286,158. That was when prices were comparatively low. During the current year the price has ranged from 16 to 40 cents a dozen at St. Louis, or fully twice that of eight years ago. It is, therefore, easily within the facts to say that the American hen now adds to the income of the farm in eggs alone no less than \$290,000,000 a year. Few people appreciate how much these minor sources of farm income help to turn the tide from depression to prosperity. There are at a rough estimate 200,000,000 laying hens in the United States, responsible for the production of at least 1,400,000,000 dozens of eggs in the course of a year. When hard times run up against such facts as these there is going to be a change for the better. And this is why from the cash income derived from these sales the current farm purchases are made for the individual or household needs, in the daily or weekly visits to the country and village stores. High prices for this and other produce help to increase the output. Month by month the command of the farm over the products of industry gives proof of a demand which merchant and manufacturer are quick to recognize as the advent of better times. The turning point between bad times and better times is to no insignificant extent the work of the patriotic American hen. Hats off to her!"

**Local Option at Santa Fe**

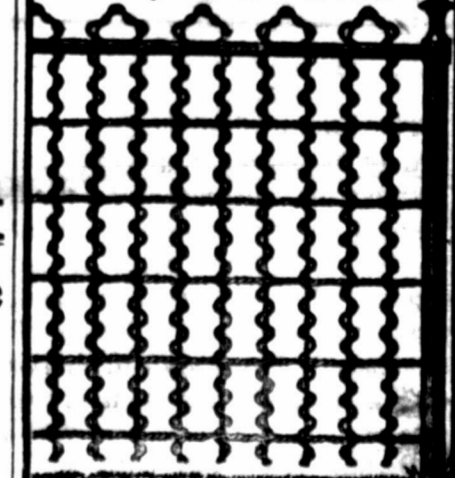
That Local Option fight over at Santa Fe is assuming national proportions. The beginning of the scrap was when the Women's Christian Temperance Union secured the passage of an ordinance by the Santa Fe city council, giving the saloons a time limit of December first to get out of business. The booze men contended that the people did not want the drink dispensaries closed, and sought to have the ordinance repealed. The city council then called an election to let the people vote on the matter. The saloon men, backed up by the Albuquerque "Personal Liberty League," sought aid of Attorney General Clancy and Governor Curry by the injunction route, their contention then being that the council had no right to use city funds for defraying the expenses of the election. The W. C. T. U. saw their bluff and also raised the bet by promptly putting up the funds to pay for the election, showing at the same time that the city had no funds, and that it was an act of charity to both the liquor interests and the city to thus provide the sinews of war. It is reported on good authority that the Governor informed the "Personal" etc., people that under the circumstances, he would not only interfere with the election called, but would vote for the closing of the dampness joints. He promised, however, not to use his influence either way in the matter. If the dries win, it will set a rather hard precedent for the whiskey men to overcome, for the dries having paid for the election, the wets will have to come along with a similar price before a reconsideration can be ordered. The New Mexican, the W. C. T. U., R. L. Baca, speaker of the 37th Assembly, Manuel R. Otero, Receiver of the Santa Fe land office, Hon. Ben Read, and many prominent citizens of the capital city are lined up on the side of temperance, and it looks so serious for the wets that they are seeking national inter-vention.

### An Incomplete List

One of the bankers at Jefferson City the other day, in submitting an argument against state-wide prohibition, gave a long list of persons who would be thrown out of jobs if prohibition were adopted. But the list was incomplete. He could have made it very much longer. This banker is surely not well informed or else his memory played him a trick.

To begin with, the police force would be greatly reduced under a prohibition law. And the police and criminal courts would have less business and would, therefore, need fewer men. Not a few lawyers would find themselves out of a job if the liquor business were outlawed. Divorce courts would have less to do. Jails could run with a smaller force. The penitentiary would have fewer prisoners, and would need fewer cooks and guards. The insane asylums would have fewer inmates, and would need fewer employees. Not a few undertakers and grave diggers would be thrown out of employment. Fewer people would be pauperized and compelled to go to the poor houses. This would lose jobs to many. There would be fewer orphans, and of course fewer people would be needed to care for them. Wives who have been sent to the wash tub by drunken husbands would lose their jobs because the cause of their slavery would be removed.
