Irrigation Plant Assured

At an intensely interesting and quite lengthy mass meeting at the courthouse at Portales last Saturday several important steps were taken looking to the installation of a large irrigating plant by the coming spring so that it will be available for the coming crop season. Mr. Rittenhaus and Mr. Detweiler representing the U. S. Sugar & Land Company, also an engine manufacturing company came before the mass meeting and presented a definite tangible proposition which may be summarized as follows: To get as much as 12,000 acres of land subscribed for irrigating purposes, and to install a power plant and all connections, also motor, pump and meter on each farm, which will be ready 1st of February or March of the coming year, and which will cost practically seven dollars per acre per year, or \$280 to \$300 a year on 40 acres, and put a guaranty bond in any sum desired and to forfeit all in case of failure.

Mr. Rittenhaus spoke at some length and went into every detail of his proposition as well as answering questions and discussing a number of incidental matters. His speech was followed by a motion by Judge Compton which carried, to the effect that it was the sense of the mass meeting that the executive committee, appointed a week since, should consider favorably the proposition submitted by Mr. Rittenhaus, also having Mr. Rittenhaus and Mr. Detweiler to go over the matter again. It was also determined that the executive committee should go over the law touching the Carey Act and the bond issue proposition already discussed and passed upon.

A meeting was also set for Saturday afternoon at which time it is proposed that the executive committee make some definite recommendation as to the plan by which we are to proceed in establishing the power plant here. Let everybody come to this meeting.

Picnic at Rogers.

Tuesday, August 3d, the people of Rogers and surrounding community will celebrate by having a picnic on the grounds. These people failed to celebrate on the Fourth on account of giving away to other places around and assisting them in their cause. One of the exciting features of the day will be a base ball game between Portales and Rogers. These teams have played three games and the former winning two. This is the time for Rogers to get busy and tie the games. They extend a hearty welcome to those that desire to attend and make this one of the grandest celebrations ever given at Rogers.

Superintendent Elected.

After casting about some weeks in search of the proper man, the board of trustees of the Portales public schools were happy in having Mr. W. A. Poore of Hohenwald, Tennessee, to visit our town and accept the position of superintendent. Professor Poore appears to be poor only in name. A graduate at Centreville Training School, Centreville, Tennessee, he later attending Peabody College for teachers of the University of Nashville, where he received the degree of Licentiate of Institution and Bachelor of Arts. During his college career, Mr. Poore gained the distinction of being president of his literary society, editor in chief of the Peabody Record for 1908; class representative of the L. I. Class of 1907; president of the Sophomore class; inter-society debate for 1907; received the Dudley medal for best scholarship and highest standing as to character and leadership.

Professor Poore looks forward to the profession of law, having already completed his junior year at Cumberland University law school, and being admitted to the practice of law in June 1909.

He has not a little experience in teaching withal, being Professor of modern languages, Gibson-Mercer Academy, Bowman, Georgia, and was tendered the principalship to come west. Strong in body; well equipped in mind; commanding in personal presence, Professor Poore has the natural ability, the training and the experience that will enable him, not only to succeed with the routine class work of our public school, but also to put the school on a higher plane of service to the whole community.

Sanitarium Gathers Patients.

The Portales Sanitarium had a splendid opening, beginning July 12th with four patients. Perhaps no better equipped establishment of its kind can be found in the country. Mr. Lowry and Dr. Garmany are to be congratulated, as is also the whole town and community which shares in the benefactions of this splendid institution.

Saturday, August 6th at the D. Z. headquarters there will be a picnic for the Inland Valley in general. Everyone is cordially invited to bring a well filled basket and make this special occasion a grand event. Two base ball teams are to meet to battle against one another for the championship of the eastern part of the territory.

Clovis Lumber Fire.

A very damaging fire of manifest incendiary origin, flamed up in the lumber yard of the Kemp Lumber Company of Clovis, at 11:15 Wednesday night of the past week. The heroic work of the newly organized fire department of that city saved further loss; but one million feet of lumber in this large yard, together with \$900 worth of paint, entailing a total loss of \$85,000 of which only \$22,000 was covered by insurance ensued. We extend to our personal friend, Mr. R. H. Kemp of Roswell, our sympathy and regret that the splendid company of which he is the head, has been called upon to suffer such a loss.

Inda Humphrey now has another tank in the place of the other, that unfortunately blew down some time ago. This tank was put up by tinner, S. A. Dotson, and is six by thirty-two feet, holding 7000 gallons. It is to be used for irrigating purposes until the government establishes the irrigating plant which is now being agitated.

Artesia's Power Plant

Artesia acts upon the Portales plan and lets contracts for reclaiming 4400 acres on the edge of Artesian belt. The homes of the farmers using the power to pump water will be lighted with electricity. We read:

"The fertile stretch of land in this valley just beyond the limits of the artesian belt is to be reclaimed by a noteworthy project which has just been decided upon. The Farmers' Electric Light and Power Company met in the office of the Pecos Valley Immigration Company Tuesday evening and decided to accept the offer of the Buckeye Engine Co. to put in the pumping and lighting plant. The plant which is to be put in just west of the town will be used to pump water from artesian wells put down outside of the main artesian belt. Also from surface wells in the same tract. Forty four hundred acres of land will be irrigated, the homes of the residents lighted by electricity and provided with all modern conveniences, and this stretch of beautiful, level, but arid land will be converted into a veritable garden spot, equal to the country in the artesian belt."

It is perhaps not known to our readers that the Buckeye Engine Company which has received the contract for the plant at Artesia is the same company represented by Mr. Rittenhaus at the courthouse the past Saturday.

Locates in Portales.

Another Lawyer locates in Portales. This time it is Mr. S. W. Williams who is several times a college graduate, with the degrees of L. I.; A. B.; and B. L.; with the special honors of Inter-society debater, president of his literary society and finally president of his graduating class. Then Mr. Williams has also been several times a principal of various high schools and even county superintendent of education withal. Finally he settled down to law and was an honor graduate of Cumberland University law school, June 1909. Meantime he has had a dozen degrees or more from the college of "hard knocks". Landing in Portales some two weeks since and forming a tentative partnership with Mr. Coe Howard, our fellow townsman who is also a student at Cumberland law school. Mr. Williams declares himself pleased with the prospects of the country and asks us to count him a fixture.

Further Building.

Not content with beautifying their own homes until they are among the most beautiful in the city, Mr. Howard and sons are now erecting two new, modern cottages on the lots between Mr. Howard's house and town. Irrigation Facts and Figures.

From a resume submitted by the Albuquerque Morning Journal of the 18th we gather these interesting facts relative to matter of irrigation in general: Before the time of Solomon the Arabians, the Egyptians, the Assyrians and the Chinese had installed systems of irrigation and were reaping its large benefits. The Pueblo Indians, likewise, had well regulated systems of irrigations in different sections of New Mexico when these tribes were discovered and conquered by the Spaniards. There are probably not less than 250,000, farmers comprising 15,000,000 acres of land under irrigation ditches in the United States at the present time.

Colorado, California and Washington lead all other states in the adoption of irrigation. And yet not until recently was irrigation adopted on any large scale. For example, up to 1879 less than 20,000 acres were under irrigation in the whole United States; whereas in the next decade the number of acres was increased to 1,000,000. By 1902 over nine millions of acres was under the ditch which was the year that Congress adopted the national irrigation act. In Washington (state) at present, 248,000 acres have been reclaimed by irrigation at a cost of \$41,000,000 or at an average cost of \$17.00 per acre. Idaho has 360,000 acres under irrigation at a cost of \$7,000,000 or about \$30 per acre. Oregon has 188,000 acres at a cost of \$4,700,000 or at a cost of \$34 an acre. Montana has 145,000 acres which have cost \$5,300,000 or less than \$30 an acre.

The largest irrigation project on the continent is in the Bow river valley in Alberta, Canada, where 3,000,000 acres will be put under irrigation at a cost of \$5,000,000.

Revision is Upward.

Every one who has kept up with the tariff measure in Congress has been aware of the fact that the protectionists were in power and that whatever amendments and additions might be tacked on to the revised schedule, the result has been and still remains a foregone conclusion, in favor of a higher and not a lower tariff. Along this line, the public is indebted to Senator La Follette whose energy and persistence has secured a statement from the Bureau of Statistics presenting the exact facts relative to tariff schedule already agreed upon. Summarizing the findings of this bureau, Mr. La Follette says:

"According to the figures supplied by the bureau, the bill as passed by senate on the basis of the importations of 1907, leaves unchanged, the duties on imports of the value of \$450,106,087 or 64.65 per cent. Duties are increased on imports of the value of \$149,716,619 or 21.51 per cent, while the decreases affect imports of the value of 96,869,619 or 13.84 per cent. The average increase in the entire bill is 5.66 per cent."

In this same connection, it is instructive to note how thoroughly pleased are Mr. William F. Corey, president of the United States steel corporation and Judge Elbert H. Garey, chairman of the board of directors of this same steel corporation. Mr. Corey says:

"Almost everybody is satisfied with the tariff as it now stands," and predicted that the result of the bills passed would be a "speedy acceleration of prosperity and a long era of good times."

Judge Gary adds: "The new bill should be generally satisfactory," he said, "and President Taft, the cabinet and congress are entitled to great credit for their successful work. Their revision has been conservatively downward. Business will improve rapidly from now on and steel will come into its own again with new high records." Albuquerque Journal.

Can there be any further question of whether or not the leaders in the United States Senate are servants of the great corporations of the country? This same Judge Gary is the man who testified before the committee of Congress that his corporation owned or controlled the ultimate supply of the iron ore of the entire United States. No wonder he is pleased with the work of Messrs. Aldrich, Bailey and the smaller lights of both parties who in the face of platform pledges, obligations to an oppressed people and a sense of justice and fair play, manipulated that august body with such consummate success for their great clients—the lumber trusts, the coal trusts, the beef packers trusts and that other small and toddling infant industry otherwise known as the steel trust. Rest from your mighty labors, gentlemen, your masters have said "well done." But one of these days, let us remind you,

the people will speak and you will be called into judgement where you will be cursed from the presence of an outraged justice and consigned to the oblivion of those who love material gain more than moral grandeur, money more than mankind.

Hats Off to Taft.

It is now given out as an assured fact that President Taft has won his fight for a reduction of the tariff. He cuts iron ore to free list; hides from 15 to 71-2 per cent ad valorem; coal from 67 cents to 45 cents; while the lumber schedule will be reduced to \$1.25 on raw product; and what is best of all, it is practically certain that Congress will bend to his wishes in the matter and that the schedule as revised by him will become the law of land.

Think of it! A tax on corporations, an income tax with a recommendation that a constitutional amendment be adopted upholding it; and now the tariff schedule of Aldrich, Bailey and the interests cut to peices, and the pledge of both the great political parties made good, in the face of the most consummate leadership the great interests have ever had in the Senate! It is almost too good to be true. If the happy consummation now confidently expected is realized

able position. We hail you brother Republicans! The pill is a pretty bitter one to many of you; but with the rank and file of the Republican party with us and with the big man of the White House smiling as he slashes the high protective duties you have arranged so carefully it is up to you to swallow it down, don't you think!

STILL MORE DEMOCRATIC.

And now it has come to pass by the efforts of the President and Senator La Follette, that with the exceptions of rice and a limited amount of tobacco, all articles grown, produced or manufactured in Philippine islands will be admitted free.

The Upbuilding of a Town.

El Paso, Texas, has undergone a moral and an industrial revolution within the past seven years which has few parallels in the country. Seven years ago, for example, we are advised by the El Paso Times that "El Paso had a white population of less than twenty thousand, there were six hundred professional gamblers, four hundred common prostitutes and over one hundred saloons, and not a modern church building, and a seating capacity of about two thousand in all the church buildings combined in the town, and it might be added that dance halls, gambling

recognized that their great reliance for reform was upon the church and the ministry and that they liberally supported and cooperated with both.

"Great as has been El Paso's progress toward civic righteousness—so great that she can show herself to be a cleaner city than any other of her class in the southwest—and great and rapid as has been the growth and prosperity of her churches, Dr. Smith's declaration that there is a great work of reformation yet to be done is true and if we are to judge by what has already been accomplished, the work before us will be quickly, thoroughly and well done."

THE LESSON PATENT.

The lesson of the transformation of the city of El Paso is patent. They have had a set of churches which have stood for something in the community and have recognized their obligation to bring heaven down to earth and into blessed reality in El Paso, as far as possible. And then they have had what Roswell has and what we are glad to say hundreds of the larger cities are coming to have, viz—a set of business men who have sense enough to understand that the presence of saloons, gambling halls, houses of prostitution and institutions of that kind in a city is the worst possible drawback it could have; that these institutions do not help on trade, but rob every legitimate business interests associated with them; and that in proportion to their prevalence in the community so powerful will be their degrading and damning influence on every phase of life and work.

These men have come to understand that good business principles demand that these institutions be outlawed and as far as possible driven out of the community. Congratulations El Pasans! May other cities emulate your splendid example.

Bryan's Vindication.

After making the race for the presidency of the United States upon a platform which declared in favor of an income tax and the submission of a constitutional amendment specially authorizing congress to levy such a tax, along with a corporation tax, we now see the president recommending such a law and congress actually passing it and submitting it to the people! Mr. Bryan seems destined to get everything he has stood for except being elected president.

All the voters are constituents, but most of them are unrepresented and they will remain unrepresented until they make it their business to select senators and members of congress who can not be controlled by the few constituents who demand special privileges and favors.—Commoner.

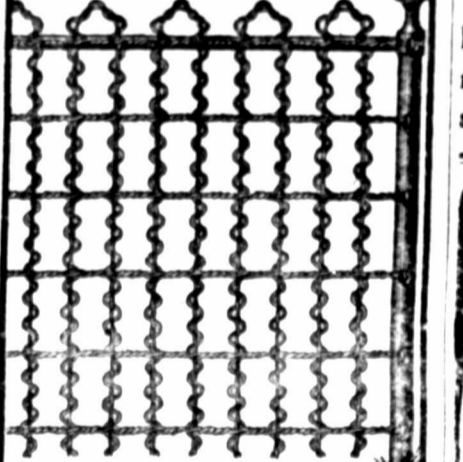

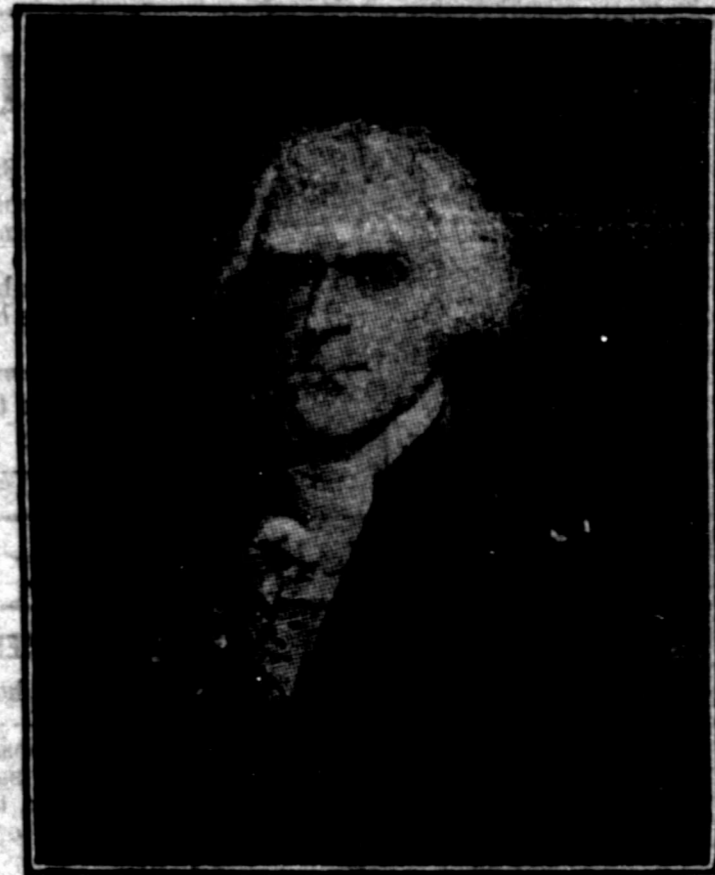
