New Court House for Roswell Carries.

Special Dispatch to the Morning Journal.

Roswell, N. M., Full returns show that the bond issue in Roswell county for a new \$125,000 court house and jail in Roswell carried with a majority of sixty-two votes. Plans for letting the contract will be made at once. J. W. Lewis, assistant territorial engineer, County Surveyor, R. E. Kenny, and a party of five assistants today started out to survey the route of the scenic and automobile route from Roswell to Carrizozo, ninety miles west. The work is to be done by the counties of Chaves and Lincoln and territorial convicts.

Santa Fe to Have Fastest Train in West.

Chicago.—If present plans of the Santa Fe railroad are carried out, a new fast train making through from Chicago to Los Angeles in sixty hours will be put in a short time.

The intention became known in western railroad circles today and caused much comment. A conference of competing lines was immediately called and E. D. McCormick, assistant traffic director of the Harriman lines, was delegated to find out what plans the Santa Fe had in mind.

New Mexico Military Institute Destroyed by Fire.

(Special Dispatch to the Daily Journal.)

Roswell, N. M.,—The New Mexico Military Institute at Roswell, burned this morning about 4 o'clock. The fire started in the basement and how it originated is unknown.

The work of remodeling it has been going on for several months preparatory to opening school. There was no insurance on the building.

This school, it will be remembered, is one of the strongest military institutes in the southwest, according to the report given out by the war department, and it is to be regretted that its buildings should have been destroyed at this time. It is likely that others will be built but this is not known.

Fifty-two Heralds, One Dollar

Fire Destroys \$80,000 at Texico.

Texico, N. M., Texico suffered the most severe fire loss in her history this morning when a fire broke out in the store of the Coker-Triplett Company, burning one-fourth of the business section and entailing damages to this and other establishments approximating \$80,000, with insurance totaling \$80,000.

Beginning with the Coker-Triplett building every structure on the block was swept along main street. The fire was of unknown origin, but is believed to have been incendiary. The Coker-Triplett stock was a complete loss, amounting to \$25,000, with only \$18,000 insurance. Other losses were:

Texico Trumpet, total loss, \$4,500, no insurance. Palace drug store, loss \$5,000, insurance \$3,000. Light and water plant, Ed T. Massey, proprietor, total loss \$5,000, no insurance. Pease Furniture Company, loss \$8,000, some insurance. Nichols confectionery, loss \$500. Sixty-six saloon, total loss, \$2,000, insurance \$700. Caris fruit store, loss \$1,000, fully insured. Twin City meat market, total loss, \$800, some insurance. Postoffice building, owned by E. T. Massey, loss \$8,000, no insurance. Opera

house, owned by First National Bank of Texico, loss \$3,000, insurance \$700. In addition to these were destroyed Taylor's law office, a second hand store and a number of out buildings.

The fire is a severe blow to the town, as crops are light this year and most of the merchants are carrying heavy accounts.

Government for the Grifters and by the Grifters.

The following is taken from the Register-Tribune and the Eagle, the one published at Roswell and the other at Santa Fe, and sets forth in plain English the drift of territorial legislation as that article is ground out by the present political posse, otherwise known as the legislative body of the Territory of New Mexico.

"An examination of the 'Budget' of the territory of New Mexico as enacted into law by the last territorial legislature is not encouraging to the average taxpayer. In fact, it is distinctly alarming. Perhaps the generously inclined representatives of the people who appropriated money with so little restraint became alarmed on their return home and acquiesced in the long delay which has attended the appearance of the laws of 1909.

Be that as it may, however, there can be no doubt but that the 'Budget of 1909,' taken as a whole will go down into territorial history as one of the most extravagant, illy-considered and unwarranted of any that a New Mexico legislature has been guilty of. The appropriations of the 1907 legislature were bad enough considering the comparatively meagre resources of the territory. The direct appropriations by that legislature amounted to \$567,890.33 for the 50th fiscal year and the same amount for the 60th fiscal year, with the exception of certain deficiencies and other items.

As far as we are able to gather from an examination of the finance bills of the last legislature, which have just been made public, the total amount appropriated for the 61st fiscal year reached the large sum of \$759,593.98, an increase of \$182,703.62 over the 1907 appropriation. This amounts to an increase of 31 per cent. It is certainly not a very good showing for an administration whose watchword is 'retrenchment and economy.' The increase is greatly due to pure, unadulterated extravagance, to a woeful inability of a majority of our legislators to appreciate the responsibility that rests upon them and to a generally wide spread impression that it is perfectly excusable to touch the public till for all that it is worth.

In spite of the fact that the salary of the governor, paid him by the United States, was increased from \$3,000 to \$3,500 by the addition of \$500 for 'traveling expenses' a year or so ago, the territorial legislature increased the 'Governor's Contingent Expense Fund, payable upon the order of the governor,' from \$3,000 to \$3,500. This makes what practically now amounts to the governor's available salary \$7,500 annually, when we take in consideration the \$500 paid him as a member of the U. S. Land commission. He is now, moreover, provided with an executive mansion, and while the expense to him of living in such a mansion is considerable, the cost to the territory of its installation and maintenance is also

great. The 'Mansion' is in the capitol grounds, and, while it is not clear what proportion of the increased expenses of maintaining the 'capitol building and grounds' is due to the governor's residence, we find an increase of \$1,500 in the employee's account, of \$2,000 in the 'Fuel and Light' account, of \$500 in the 'Repairs and Improvement' account and \$3,000 in the Insurance Account, much of it traceable, apparently, to the cost of maintaining the Governor's Mansion.

It does not appear what was the actual cost of building and furnishing this mansion. The 1907 legislature provided for the building of an extension to the capitol and a Governor's Mansion and authorized the issue of \$50,000 of bonds to pay for them. The last legislature appropriated in one way or another over \$40,000 to finish payment on the land upon which the mansion is built, on the mansion itself and on the capitol extension.

The increase in the 'Contingent Expense Fund,' however, is on a different basis. It undoubtedly furnished an argument for the increase of territorial salaries generally, and we find on examination a total increase in the annual salary account exclusive of the adjutant general's office of \$16,580. The attorney general's salary is increased from \$3,000 to \$3,500, and he is given an assistant at \$1,800. The territorial engineer's salary is advanced from \$2,000 to \$2,400, and he is given a new clerk at \$1,200. The commissioner of public lands secures an advance to \$3,000 from \$3,500, and an additional bookkeeper at \$1,200. The superintendent of the penitentiary's salary is increased from \$2,000 to \$2,400, and that of his assistant from \$1,200 to \$1,500. The salary of the clerk of the supreme court is just doubled, that of the superintendent of public instruction increased from \$2,400 to \$3,000, his assistant to \$2,000, and a new clerk is given him at \$1,500. The stenographers and clerks in many of the offices have advances of from \$300 to \$400 per annum.

HUNDREDS TO SEE PRESIDENT

Special Train Now Being Engaged to Carry the Crowds to Albuquerque During the Fair.

Albuquerque, N. M., September 10.—From present indications, one of the biggest crowds that ever visited Albuquerque will be here on October 15th, during the territorial fair, when President Taft makes his brief visit to New Mexico. The fact that the President's only stop in the territory is here and that this will be the only opportunity to see him is going to bring a record-breaking mass of visitors. Special trains are already being called for from a number of points and it is likely that every section of the territory will contribute its quota of people coming in their own trains.

Final announcement of the program for the President's reception is delayed, pending advices from the summer capital at Beverly, but it is certain that the president will speak and the people of the whole territory are looking forward with eager interest for what the chief executive will have to say, particularly on the subject of statehood. It is anticipated that the President will take this occasion to express to the people of New Mexico in person the support of the statehood cause he has already given through the press.

The car is in charge of Lawrence Lee and Charles Lenoke, two energetic young advertising experts who will spend a day in Portales, telling our people about the attractions of this year's fair, which now promise to set a new mark, particularly in the amusement line.

In a recent magazine I found a
statement similar to this—"The

dearly side with that ranks the

existence is a chance—their
whole life is a chance, and it is
any wonder that they drift hither
and yon and are creatures of
chance all the days of their lives?
We often have cause to wonder
why it is that honest parents
have dishonest children, that
strong parents have weak chil-
dren. It is a sad fact learned
sometimes too late that for every

existing condition there is a
cause and it is for us in the light
of modern research to find out,
generally speaking, what these
causes are and profit by them.
The most vital thing in the life
of any individual is how he is
born, and the day is fast coming
as it has already been started in
the state of Washington, when
this marriage business will be
regulated by law, and people who
are not fitted physically, mental-
ly and morally for parenthood
will not be allowed to assume the
responsibility.

This is the age of enlighten-
ment along many lines and people
are coming to realize more and
more that the most important
thing in the world is the child—the
most important thing in the
nation is the child—the most im-
portant thing in the home is the
child, and back of the child stands
motherhood! When a mother
comes to realize that the lives of
her children must not be sinned
against and her life-opportunity
is in them—that she wields her
scepter for good or ill as she suc-
ceeds in giving them sound bodies
minds and hearts and studies in-
telligently how to have them so,
then will she reach a place hon-
ored of God. When she learns to
see above the daily toil, above the
patching and the cleaning and the
vision of the greatness of her
work she can say with the virgin
Mary—"My soul doth magnify
the Lord and my spirit hath re-
joiced in God my Savior—for He
that is mighty hath done to me
great things and holy is his name."

After one of our rains a few
days ago I was looking into what

Catalpa Fence Posts.

In its interview last week with
Mr. Thos. Gaines, on Roswell
and the Pecos Valley, the Re-
porter included a short mention
of the growing of the Catalpa tree
for fence post purposes.

More in detail are the following
concerned facts:

The Hagerman ranches in the
Pecos Valley, comprising all told,
over 20,000 acres, are growing the
Catalpa for fencing purposes.
A considerable portion of Hager-
man lands being already thus
furnished with fence posts and
ten acres of Catalpa trees now
growing for additional fencing.

The Catalpa, in the Pecos Val-
ley, matures into a sufficient size
within three years for fence use,
the trees being planted three feet
apart and producing from 1,500
to 2,000 trees, or posts, per acre,
at a cultivation cost of about five
cents per post, or tree.

Experiments already made
demonstrate that the Catalpa can
be successfully grown in Colfax
county and its introduction as a
fence post growing product would
mean not only a cheap supply of
current county fence post de-
mand, but also a profitable ship-
ping export—it being conserva-
tively estimated that Catalpa
fence post growth, after the third
initial year—can be made to pro-
duce \$150 per acre.—Raton Re-
porter.

There has been five rains in two weeks here and our country is beginning to be covered with a natural carpet of green. Every-thing is beginning to feel fresh and take on new life.

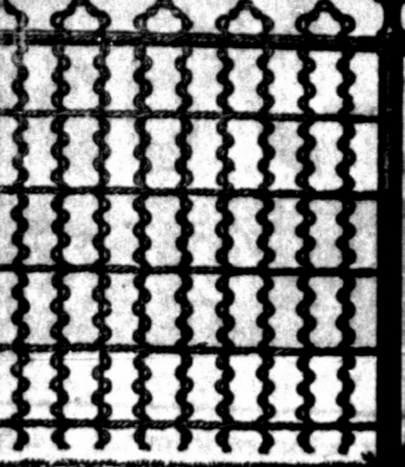

A proclamation by the governor, executive office, Santa Fe. Whereas, the board of trustees of the New Mexico reform school, located in the town of Springer, county of Colfax, have informed the undersigned that the said reform school will be fully equipped and prepared to receive and care for juvenile offenders on or after the first day of October, 1909.
Now therefore, I, George Curry, governor of the territory of New Mexico, in accordance with the requirements of section 10, chapter 2, of the laws of New Mexico of 1903, do hereby designate and proclaim October 1, A. D. 1909, as the time from and after which said New Mexico reform school shall be ready to receive and care for the juvenile offenders sentenced to said reform school by courts of competent jurisdiction in the territory of New Mexico.
Done at the executive office this 25th day of August, A. D. 1909.
