## WATER FLOODS STREETS OF PORTALES

One Thousand Gallons Per Minute Are Pumped from Lindsay Well—Waters Invade the Town—Arouse the People—Reach J. B. Sledge's Home and Still Coming

If there ever was any question about the water supply in the Portales Inland Valley, that doubt has been dissipated—washed away in the flood of water which Messrs. Webber & Rose are pumping from the Lindsey well, one and a half miles west of town. For days this well has been made to send forth a flood of water amounting to one thousand gallons per minute, until the waters have passed over the Lindsey farm, down the west road to town, all the way to the corporate limits, and finally down to Mr. J. B. Sledge's home. And as we are going to press the announcement comes to this office that Engineers Webber & Rose are getting ready to wash away the town of Portales with a still greater flow from the Lindsey well.

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## MR. STOVER UNANSWERED.

Journal Dodges and Ignores Facts

### Stover's Letter.

Editor Albuquerque Morning Journal:

On the 19th inst., in your leading editorial, under the heading of "A Boomerang," you state that it does not pay, "in dollars and cents," for a city like Albuquerque to abolish the saloon, and you give some strong figures in support of your assertion, but I do not think your statement entirely fair.

You state that "the city would lose thirty-two thousand dollars a year by going on a no-license basis and would have to add that much to the direct tax now levied upon the property of the people."

You do not take into consideration the extra cost of running a city when it is full of saloons. The police force is a costly item in the management of any city where saloons are licensed, and while I do not know what our police force costs, it would be safe to say that it would not cost half as much if the city was "dry." Then take into consideration the costs of the police court, the feeding and care of prisoners and the property loss to our citizens that can be traced directly to drunkenness and you will find that your thirty-two thousand dollars is reduced to a very small sum if not entirely wiped out.

Again, for all practical purposes Albuquerque is Bernalillo county, as the city pays about all of the taxes of the county. The costs of running the district court of this county are, in round numbers, about fifteen thousand dollars a year, and from my careful estimates more than two-thirds of that sum can fairly be charged to the use and abuse of intoxicating liquors. Several times while a member of the grand jury I have made a close estimate on cases coming before it and have found and in one case reported to the court, that directly and indirectly, and He gives the result of the use of intoxicating liquors, the privilege to we fair, therefore, to say that ten

means to lead abstracted from your "thirty-two thousand dollars" the direct money loss of those who use liquors intemperately, the direct thousand merchants who furnish such families with food to nothing, would more than balance your thirty-two thousand dollars, so I assert positively that it is easy to prove that so far as dollars and cents are concerned it would pay this city to go "dry."

## JOURNAL'S REPLY.

### The Liquor Question.

A few days ago the Morning Journal took occasion to refer to the report of a grand jury in Eddy county, in which the jurors in drawing a comparison between two towns in that county, attempted to prove that it was profitable to a town, in the way of dollars and cents, to refuse to grant license for the sale of liquor. We criticized the report on the ground that the temperance question was a moral issue, and that an attempt to put it on a money basis would serve as a boomerang, and come back upon the inventor. The object of the report in question was to show that the sale of liquor increased the police expenses of a town in a sum greater than the amount received for licenses, and to show the error of this contention we called attention to the experience of Albuquerque, where the amount received from liquor licenses pays one-third of the entire expense of maintaining the whole machinery of the city government.

Hon. E. S. Stover, in a communication which appears elsewhere in this morning's paper, takes issue with us on this point, and declares that the cost of policing the city is so much greater on account of the liquor traffic that it practically wipes out the entire sum received for liquor licenses. To show the fallacy of his argument it is only necessary to call the attention of the reader to the fact that the maintenance of our city police department, on its present basis, costs in round figures, sixteen thousand dollars a year, while the liquor licenses bring into the city treasury thirty-two thousand dollars a year, or enough to pay the cost of the whole police machinery of the city on its present basis, twice over.

Mr. Stover attempts to sustain his position by charging the city with the extra burden put upon the district court by the liquor traffic throughout the country, but that is too unfair to merit any discussion. The bulk of the business created for the district court by drunkenness, probably ninety-five per cent, comes from the numerous low hell holes which are permitted to run throughout the county, dispensing the most virulent "forsty rod" whisky, at a merely nominal license. The practical way to meet that evil is to have the legislature give us a local option law, which will give to each county the power which incorporated towns and cities now enjoy, of regulating the traffic in their own way.

### The Question at Issue.

The question at issue in the above discussion is: Will it pay in dollars and cents for a city like Albuquerque to prohibit the liquor traffic? The Journal answers in the negative, pointing out that Albuquerque would lose \$32,000 every year. Mr. Stover kindly calls attention of the Journal to the fact that several main items in this consideration have been overlooked. For example, granting that the saloons pay in the handsome sum of \$32,000 annually, what do they cost Albu-

querque and Bernalillo county? Let us name the items, at least approximately correct:

1. Extra expense to city government not less than \$9,000.00 yearly.

2. Expense of prosecutions, caring for and guarding whiskey criminals in county, not less than \$9000.00, yearly.

3. Loss to families and to the business and commercial interests of Albuquerque by reason of unnecessary money spent for whiskey, not less than \$10.00 per capita for every man, woman and child in Albuquerque, or at least \$100,000.00. For this enormous sum, the people of Albuquerque have absolutely nothing to show, except the living expenses of the saloon men and their families.

4. Loss from the decreased earning capacity and the totally wrecked earning capacity of the citizenship of Albuquerque, not less than \$42,000.00 yearly. This item is based on the reckoning that there are at least 3500 working men in Albuquerque who earn salaries or dividends at some occupation; and that of this number 35 men yearly have their earning capacity totally wrecked by whiskey, while at least 70 others suffer loss of at least one-half of their earning capacity by reason of strong drink. Now if we put the average earning capacity of these men at \$600.00 yearly, we have a total loss of \$40,000.00 from this source alone.

### Financial Loss.

From this estimate which we believe is not only conservative but under the real facts, it will be seen that Albuquerque is annually sustaining a loss of more than \$125,000. Pretty heavy burden, don't you think?

### BIG INCREASE IN SCHOOL CENSUS FIGURES.

Returns from All But Eight Counties In—100,000 Persons of School Age in Territory; Places Total Population at 325,000.

### Special Dispatch to the Morning Journal:

Santa Fe, N. M., Oct. 19.—That the present population of New Mexico may be estimated roughly at 325,000 people is indicated by the returns of the school census received by Territorial Superintendent James E. Clark. The returns are from all but eight of the counties and it is figured that complete returns will show 100,000 persons in New Mexico of school age, or between the ages of five and twenty. This, it is believed, indicates a population of 300,000 outside of the Indians, or a total population of 325,000. The school census this year shows a big gain over last year.

The following counties have reported: San Miguel, 7,621; Bernalillo, 7,581; Santa Fe, 5,607; Chaves, 5,300; Grant, 4,509; Mora, 4,309; Eddy, 3,680; Gaudalupe, 3,392; Union, 3,368; Valencia, 3,231; Torrance, 2,836; Otero, 2,485; Lincoln, 2,275; San Juan, 1,952; Sierra, 1,380; Luna, 1,278; Roosevelt, 4,583; Socorro, 4,450.

### AUTOMOBILE ROUTE FROM ROSWELL TO VAUGHN.

Manager of Buzz Wagon System Announces Terminus Will No Longer Be at Torrance.

### Special Dispatch to the Morning Journal:

Roswell, N. M., Oct. 20.—Manager J. W. Stockard of the Roswell-Torrance automobile mail and passenger stage today announced that he would begin work at once on a new route over which the mail from Roswell to the Rock Island railroad will be carried to Vaughn instead of Torrance. The change will be effected within ten days, as a new road has to be built for only forty miles of the distance of 110 miles that separates Roswell and Vaughn. The present route will be utilized to a point eighteen miles north of the half-way house. This is an important change for the traveling public also.

While Torrance is the junction of the Rock Island and Santa Fe Central, it has no accommodations for the traveling public. Vaughn is the junction of the Rock Island and Belen cut-off of the Santa Fe and will have a Harvey house and all accommodations. The work of cutting the new road is a light matter compared with usual road building.

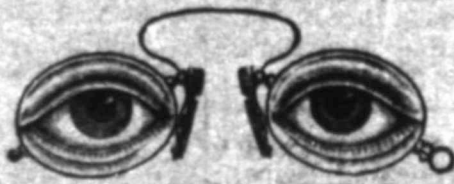

### Question of Deep Plowing.

Plowing 8, 9, 10, 12 inches deep is only common plowing, in our instructions nothing less than 8 inches is considered "deep plowing." We are not advocating a single breaking of 8 inches in depth once in two or three years, but the preparation of an 8, 10, or 12 inch seed bed thoroughly pulverized and filled with humus. It is not intended here to insist that this should be done at once in all cases. These are the depths that must be reached finally to secure the best results. The farmer must determine how soon he can secure these depths under his conditions.

Always plow in the fall before the winter rains set in—the earlier after the 1st of October the better. Every observant farmer has noted that seeds germinated more quickly and that plants grow more rapidly on fall breaking than on spring breaking. Fall plowing renders more plant food ready for use, while the preparation of the land in the fall saves work in the spring, when everything on the farm is crowding. In plowed land properly handled the loss of plant food is less than in unplowed land. In case a cover crop is used the loss of plant food is slight.

An objection is sometimes urged that fall-plowed soil becomes saturated with water during the winter and remains wetter and colder later in the spring than land left unbroken in the fall. Water passes through deep breaking readily, and with reasonable drainage it is ready for planting earlier than lands broken in the spring. Oklahoma Farm Journal.

### Ordinance No. 26.

An Ordinance prohibiting the carrying of Deadly Weapons within the limits of the Town of Portales, New Mexico, and for other purposes.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. Any person who shall carry a deadly weapon, either concealed or otherwise, within the limits of the town of Portales, New Mexico, except it be in his or her residence or upon his or her landed estate, if intoxicating liquors are not sold on any such premises, or in the lawful defense of his or her person, family or property, the same being then and there threatened with danger, or except such carrying be done by legal authority, upon conviction thereof before the Justice of the Peace for said town shall be punished by a fine of not less than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not less than thirty days nor more than ninety days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court; and any person violating the provisions of this section may be arrested by the Marshal of said town without a warrant.

### TWO NOTABLE DEATHS

**Crafty Politician and Renowned Justice.**

New York, Oct. 23, (Saturday).

Pat MacCarren, who has been very low since the operation for appendicitis which was performed several days ago, and who has become recognized as the greatest politician of his age, died at the St. Catherine hospital at 1:15 this morning. Friends and close relatives were at the bedside of the sick man when he passed to his reward. The last rites of the church were performed by the priest of the Catholic church several days ago, when it was thought that MacCarren could not possibly recover from a severe setback which occurred the third day after the operation. He insisted on talking of the political situation as

long as his physicians would permit.—Clovis Daily Journal.

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 25.—Rufus W. Peckham, justice of the United States supreme court, died at Altamont, last night, of a complication of heart trouble and Bright's disease. He was born in New York Nov. 8, 1838, and was appointed to the supreme court from New York state court of appeals by Grover Cleveland, in 1896. Justice Peckham was the author of many of the supreme court opinions regarding corporation law. He was a democrat and was extremely popular with his associates on the bench.

### URTON LAKE PROJECT TO BE COMPLETED.

Private Irrigation Corporation With Quarter Million of Capital to Reclaim 71,000 Acres in Vicinity of Fort Sumner.

A tremendous water storage and irrigation project probably the most pretentious ever attempted by private capital in New Mexico is about to be started in the Pecos valley, to cost at least two millions of dollars and to reclaim 71,000 acres of land with water from a reservoir carrying nearly 200,000 acre feet of water taken from the Pecos river.

This immense undertaking is the Urton Lake project, formerly started by the Reclamation service of the government and relinquished at cost to the Carey act board. This week in Santa Fe the Urton Lake Land and Water company capitalized at \$250,000 filed incorporation papers in the office of the territorial secretary. The company is headed by ex-governor and Territorial Treasurer Miguel A. Otero as president; Loyd Sigler of Salt Lake City, Utah, secretary, and I. B. Melville of Denver, secretary. These officers will constitute the board of directors. The new company will take over at once and push to completion the Urton Lake irrigation project begun by the government in 1903, but abandoned by reason of the lack of funds. The reclamation service completed surveys, platted the land and positively determined the feasibility of the project. The new company under the provisions of the Carey act, recently made applicable to the territories, has made its formal application to territorial engineer Vernon L. Sullivan, who now has it under consideration.

By means of a huge storage lake and supplementary canals the system will distribute water taken from the Pecos to the lands, which lie partly in Chaves and partly in Gaudalupe county, in the vicinity of Fort Sumner. These lands have been turned over to the territory and in accordance with the provisions of the Carey act, the application seeks to have the lands segregated. The company has prepared a bond in the sum of \$50,000 to turn over to the territory in case the application is approved. There is little doubt of an early favorable report from the engineer.

When this is received work will start at once. The company now has engineers in the field plotting the land and doing other preliminary work. The work will be done under direction of the territorial engineer in co-operation with the Reclamation service experts. Bonds for the sum of \$2,000,000 will be issued, the arrangements having been made in the east for the underwriting of the bonds.

A diversion dam 25 feet high and 150 feet long will be built in the Pecos river. From this dam will extend the widest diversion canal in the world, sixty feet in width and 37 miles long. This canal leads to the Urton lake bed, where the waters will be stored. The capacity of the lake is 190,000 acre feet.

Two main outlet canals will extend from the lake to the lands to be irrigated. The diversion canal alone will cost approximately a million dollars. Solid concrete and steel is to be used entirely in the building of the dams, flumes, etc.

H. T. Henderson, president of the Henderson Engineering company, of Durango, Colo., will be consulting engineer in charge of the work. Mr. Henderson built the million dollar Montezuma project in the Montezuma valley, Colorado; the two million dollar plant of the

Animas river company at Durango; the Alabama Northern railroad; the \$100,000 Ignacio project in the Pine River valley and many other big enterprises. Loyd Sigler, secretary of the company, is president of the American Colonist and Trust company of Denver and Salt Lake.

He is interested in the Greer River project of Utah, where 200,000 acres are being reclaimed; in the Palisade project in Colorado; the Ignacio project where he brought in 1,500 colonists; and the 1900 acre Peach arrosa orchard at Green River, Utah, the largest peach orchard in the world.

I. B. Melville, the treasurer of the new company, is head of the law firm of Melville, Sacket and Calvert of Denver. He is a member of the Western Irrigation and Colonist company of Denver, which company has extensive interests in four states; a man of great legal ability who stands highly in the business world.

Ex-Governor M. A. Otero, for nine years the chief executive of New Mexico, is known to every one in the territory. The fact that he has been chosen as president of the new company, augurs well for its success.

The land which the company proposes to irrigate will be available for settlement purposes immediately upon completion of the company's project. The settler can then obtain the land at a cost of fifty cents an acre, which money goes to the territory, and by agreeing to pay his prorata share of the cost of constructing the project, which will irrigate the land. This water right cost, however, will not be made payable in a lump sum, but the settler will be given ten years at least in which to make the payments, rendering the obligation an easy one.

Mr. Sigler figures that the land under the project will in the near future rise to a value of \$200 to \$1000 an acre.

From 15,000 to 30,000 people it is expected will colonize the project, and the settlers on the lands will be of the thrifty, energetic type for which eastern and southern New Mexico is famous.—Albuquerque Journal.

#### Circular Letter to County Superintendents—Vaccination.

Gentlemen: Chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903 and Chapter 17 of the Laws of 1901 provide that all children of school age in each county of the Territory shall be vaccinated against smallpox. An exceptional difficulty has arisen concerning the interpretation and enforcement of these laws, and upon request I am submitting the following interpretation.

Each teacher of the public school (rural, village, town or city) shall deny admittance to the school to all children who are not so vaccinated. Every child admitted to the school should be required to present a statement from a reputable physician, licensed to practice in the territory of New Mexico, certifying that said child is properly protected by vaccination; said certificate specifically stating that the child has been effectively vaccinated (leaving well pronounced scars) within a period of five years previous to the date of entrance upon the school, or that such child has been vaccinated either with or without pronounced effect, within a period of twelve months previous to entering the school.

N. B. It is the consensus of opinion of physicians of the United States that an effective vaccination protects the child against smallpox for a period of at least five years.

At the beginning of the school year and at such other times thereafter as it may be deemed advisable the teacher shall make report to the county superintendent of schools giving the number of children who have been vaccinated within a year and the number of children who have presented certificates certifying to effective vaccination within a period of five years, together with a list of names of parents who refuse or fail to have their children vaccinated.

It becomes the duty of the sheriff or any constable whom the sheriff may designate to arrest such parents or

guardians and upon conviction they shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100) dollars, or be imprisoned as provided by law.

The fine collected for violation of this act shall become a part of the school fund in the district in which the offender lives.

The county superintendent of schools is required to enforce the law touching the vaccination of children attending the rural schools under his supervision.

In incorporated cities and towns the boards of education are required to enforce the law.

Section 12, Chapter 221, Laws of 1900, provides a penalty (\$25 to \$500) for the failure of any member of a Board of Education or any county superintendent to perform his duty imposed under or by virtue of the law.

Vaccination may be performed by the county health officer or by any reputable licensed physician.

The expense of vaccination of children in indigent families may be met as provided in Section 30, Chapter 103, Laws of 1903.

County Superintendents are hereby urged to make special effort in the enforcement of the laws concerning vaccination against smallpox and to visit the various districts in which difficulty arises over the enforcement of this law with a view to a settlement of such difficulties without recourse to the courts.

#### Resignation of Curry Expected.

Rumor has it, however, that Curry told Ballinger he would resign within a month, and that this was satisfactory to the secretary.

#### CHARGES FILED.

It is known that on September 11th, A. M. Jackley of Alamogordo, filed serious charges against the governor, placing the evidence in the hands of Ballinger. Jackley was not called into conference during the day by Ballinger, but left with Ballinger on the 7:30 train. Jackley will accompany the secretary as far as Kansas City and en route the charges will be thoroughly gone over and future action decided upon.

#### OTHER CHARGES PREFERRED.

Other charges are said to have been preferred by prominent Republicans and it is known that Jackley is being backed by some leading Republicans.

#### WALTERS IS MENTIONED.

The visit of Ballinger is a sensational topic of conversation, the speculation as to Curry's successor running high. Paul A. F. Walter is now being prominently mentioned for the place.—El Paso Times.

## The President and Statehood

Enabling Act Certain of Passage, But with Conditions Pre-  
cluding an Oklahoma-like Constitution.

The word has been spoken. It came from the president himself in his Albuquerque address, Friday afternoon, the 17th. New Mexico is to have statehood. The enabling act is to be passed at the next session of Congress, or at least as early as possible, but the "powers that be" at Washington and not the people of New Mexico will determine the character of the constitution which will govern the ship of New Mexico statehood. The enabling act is to be hedged about with such conditions that a repetition of the Oklahoma constitution will be impossible. The president favors and favors so strongly that he will use all his powerful influence for an enabling act that will call for and demand a constitution that "will be simple, comprehensive, with proper limitations as to vested rights and personal liberty"—and especially the two last mentioned specifications. So, get in line, New Mexicans.

It would seem that the big man of the White House has a big stick as well as a big smile; and that in this case he expects to use it. The "vested interests," that is, the big corporations and trusts, were not given a square deal in Oklahoma. And that mistake is not to occur again under a republican administration.

A NEW DAY AHEAD.  
And yet there is a new day ahead of New Mexico with statehood that is now assured. For one thing, the government of the territory—we speak now of the executive and legislative departments and not of the judiciary—

will pass out of the hands of the incompetent and unscrupulous gang, even if it remains republican. In fact, one of the profound mysteries of republican rule in New Mexico is why a man of George Curry's personal habits, training and mental caliber should be exalted to the governorship in preference to men, like our own Judge W. E. Lindsey, who has the training, the executive ability, the clean Christian character and habits and the lofty, patriotic purpose of a governor who would be an honor to the territory and a powerful influence for furtherance of republican rule. Perhaps the Irishman's story is, after all, the correct explanation. It is said that Mr. H. B. Fergusson met an Irish friend of his with whom he was discussing Roosevelt's appointment of Governor Curry to the executive office of New Mexico, when the Irishman remarked: "Have you heard the latest, Fergusson?" "No," replied Mr. Fergusson. "Why," said the Irishman, in all seriousness, "the Pope of Rome died last night and Roosevelt has already cabled the appointment of a 'rough rider' in his stead."

For another thing, it is not at all certain that republican control will continue in New Mexico, even if more capable men are put forward. And certain it is that the protests of independent minds and the great democratic hosts will have to be heard, and that corrupt men and corrupt practices will be brought to the bar of the public conscience and cursed from the presence of a high-minded people forever.

### Long and Interesting Drives.

The Vaughn Auto Company, L. W. Fiscus, manager, made two long and interesting drives the present week, both without a mishap or breakdown. The first and longest of these trips was made by driver Thompson who perhaps knows more about autos and machinery of that kind than any one in this section of country. He drove Mr. Cass Cayton from Amarillo, Texas, to the Slaughter ranch—a distance of some 100 miles; thence to the great Yellow House ranch where Mr. Cayton inspected the deep well now being drilled at this place to a depth of 2500 feet; thence coming by Virginia City and to Portales. ### Visits Portales.

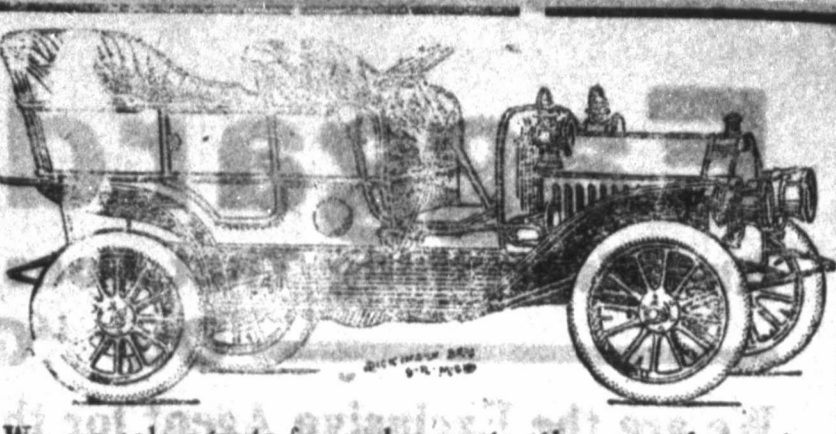

## Lemon P. Glascock.

Lemon P. Glascock, Confederate soldier and cattleman, was born December 23, 1841, in Travis county, near Austin, Texas, and died thirty-five miles west of Portales, at his home, October 24, 1909. A hardy, patriotic pioneer citizen, he reached his manhood and passed on to his declining days in Texas, from which place he enlisted and served in the Confederate army, leaving an honorable record behind him. Here also he was married to Miss Mary Wilkes, and from this union became the father of eleven children, ten of whom survive him. But the brave pioneer spirit suffered his share of the great losses of life. He gave up one of his children and later the mother of his children. Later he married Mrs. Grace Farmer and moved out into the new and undeveloped cattle country, thirty-five miles west of Portales, and resumed his wonted occupation. This was five years ago. But the ravages of time were not all overcome by the healthfulness of the new climate and country. As early as last spring, Brother Glascock's health began to fail and, in spite of the constant attention of loved ones and the skill of physicians, the heroic Christian spirit answered the roll call of heaven, Sunday, October 24, 1909. The bereaved ones have suffered a great loss; but they sorrow not as others who have no hope. For Brother Glascock had not only been converted and joined the Baptist church at the age of 17; he had lived the Christian life for over fifty years when the summons came. Surrounded by a host of warm and sympathetic friends, Brother S. M. Edwards, who was the particular personal friend of the deceased, spoke the words of Christian comfort and hope at the funeral services, held at the Baptist church, Portales, Tuesday afternoon, October 26th. Rest, brave and tired spirit! We shall miss you; for your life has blessed us and made us better.

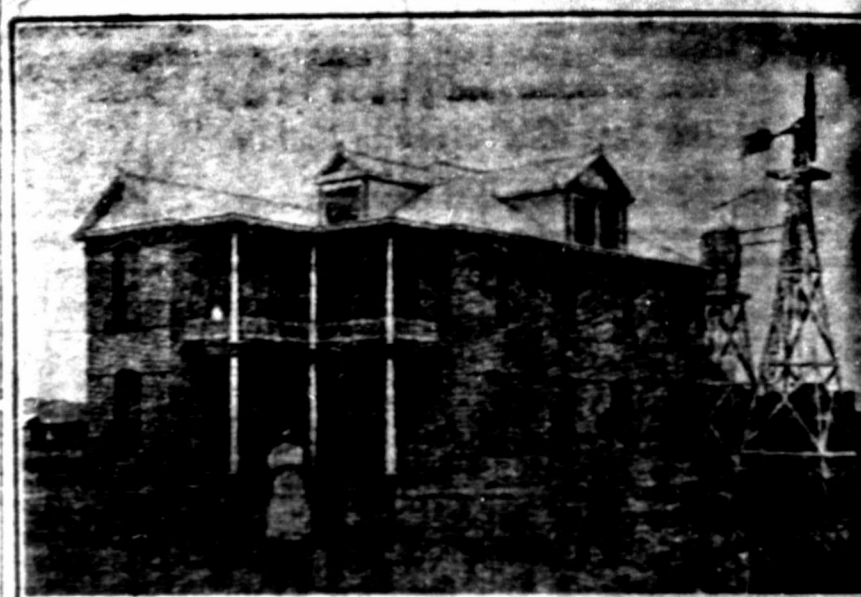
