HOGS SELL AT FORT WORTH FOR \$8.48.

Fort Worth, Dec. 9.-Hogs broke all records for high prices in the local live stock market here today, when two sales were made at \$8.40 a hundred pounds. This is ten cents higher than yesterday's price. A carload of rice fed hogs received from Beaumons today sold at \$8.10 a hundred. This is the first lot of strictly rice fed received here. —Daily Panhandle

THE GOOK RECORDS ARRIVE AT DOPENHAGEN.

Copenhagen, Denmark, Dec. 8.—The North Pole observations of Dr. Frederick A. Cook reached here today on board the steamer United States. Extraordinary precautions were taken to make sure that the long heralded data were delivered safely to the University of Copenhagen. The iron box containing the records was brought ashore as soon as the steamer reached the pier. It was closely followed by Walter Lonsdale, Dr. Cook's secretary, who bundled it into an automobile and in company with two detectives drove hastily to the University, where the box was deposited in the strong room. Examination will probably be made at the University and none but the duly chosen commission will be permitted to be present. The forthcoming of Dr. Cook's papers is accommanded by signs that reveal the Cook-Peary controversy. 




