BUILDING A GREATER PORTALES!

Construction Begins on Power House of Water, Light and Sewer System
--Prominent Citizens in Chicago in Interest of Irrigation!

The building of a greater Portales has begun. Work on the power house of the water, sewer and light system for Portales began the latter part of last week and the excavating work is almost completed.

Committee Reports Favorable.

The special committee consisting of Judge G. L. Reese and Secretary of Chamber of Commerce T. J. Molinari and Hon. W. E. Lindsey who went to Chicago last week to approve the bond of the Western Construction Company and to look into the reliability of the surety company through whom the Western Construction Co. are offering security report that their work has been practically accomplished and that the people here have no need of further anxiety.

The company offering surety, together with the details of the final arrangements of our irrigation proposition. 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"A bootlegger is the illegitimate offspring of prohibition. He is a breaking out cancer on the body politic. If his joint is closed at one place he will open at another. The man who buys from the bootlegger is protected and the prohibitionists have never yet advocated a law making it an offense for a man to buy liquor."

WRONG PEDIGREE.

The imagery used by the speaker in this instance is both forceful and realistic. The bootlegger is an illegitimate offspring—and he might have added, an ANARCHISTIC offspring. Then "he is an outbreaking cancer on the body politic" and he is also securely "protected," hedged about by a motley herd of lawless henchmen and a shameless array of perjured hypocrites. The only fault we have to find with the definition is that it assigns the wrong pedigree to "this cancer of the body politic."

WHERE IS HE?

Coming to the sober facts, whence is the bootlegger? Is he a prohibitionist? Was he ever in favor of prohibiting the sale of intoxicants? Does he operate in the name of prohibition, or assist its sworn foe? Does his business tend to help or hinder prohibition? In what sense, then, is he the illegitimate offspring of prohibition? Does God's Commandment; "Thou shalt not kill," put murder in a man's heart? Does the Commandment; "Thou shalt not commit adultery," put fornication in one's heart? Does this holy injunction; "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain," put curses and blasphemies in the human heart? No: the desire and determination to murder; to commit adultery and to blaspheme the name of God rankles in the heart of men who cherish the foul desires and commit the outspoken crimes in spite of all law and self restraint. And so it is with the prohibition of the whiskey traffic,—the desire and determination to sell whiskey is in the bootlegger's heart and will. His community speaks, but he will not hear. The law thunders out its prohibition of the liquor traffic, but he will not heed. The desire is in his heart to sell whiskey, and he proposes to sell whiskey, law or no law, penalty or no penalty, crime or no crime,—sell whiskey if he has to break every ordi-

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WHO WILL THEY BE?

THE HERALD has no desire to name the next trustees for the town of Portales; but it is very evident what sort of men must be chosen if the best interests of the town are to be subserved. First, they should be business men of recognized ability and integrity—the best business men who can be persuaded to accept the position. Second, they should include a sufficient number of the present trustees to insure the maintenance of the present policy, both as to the moral uplift of the town and the carrying out of the business enterprises launched. Third, the election should be so made as to avoid the re-opening of the old "bank fight" which, happily, has been eliminated, but the reopening of which should be strenuously avoided. Fourth, no man who seeks the responsibility should be considered worthy of the trust to be incurred in his election. For the office is without remuneration; and a man who would seek it or who could afford to assume and carry out its duties without a real sacrifice, is not the man needed for the place, he is either incapable of discharging the obligations it imposes or else has some ulterior and unworthy motive to serve.

That it is possible to find a body of business men who in every way measure up to these requirements, everyone knows. Indeed we think we could name a dozen such men without effort; and yet why not get the best?

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CATTLE INDUSTRY GOOD

"There will always be cattle in New Mexico so long as there is grass. As long as we have grass to eat there will be cattle to eat it, and it will be a long time before there is any permanent shortage of grass."

With this terse statement Capt. E. G. Austin of the New Mexico cattle sanitary board yesterday dismissed the question as to whether or not the future of the industry is endangered here first by the heavy shipments of the past year out of the territory, and second, because of the large increase in homesteaders who are filling up the public domain.

"There is no more cause for alarm concerning the future of the cattle industry in New Mexico than there is for the future of sheep growing or alfalfa growing," said Captain Austin. New Mexico is a natural range country. It has a grass supply which in ordinary years is ideal and abundant and it is a safe bet that so long as we have grass there will be cattle to eat it.

"It is true that the public range that is being invaded by the homesteaders has broken up a great deal of the big range country of former years. This was to be expected and has been foreseen by all thoughtful cattle growers for some years past. They are not surprised by it. Most of them have made plans to meet it. It is true that during the past year two or three of the large outfits have cleaned up their stuff pretty thoroughly and that many of the old time large herds are being reduced in number."

Yet in spite of all this, only approximately 19,000 more cattle were shipped out of New Mexico in 1909 than in 1908, while the increase of 1908 over 1907 was only about 30,000 head. This is not a serious increase nor does it indicate the widespread reducing of the size of herds of which we have heard a good deal of late.

"In 1907, 288,000 head were out of the territory. In 1908 the number was 300,420. In 1909 it was 319,524. In 1910, according to present indications, will show smaller outgoing shipments than of the three preceding years."

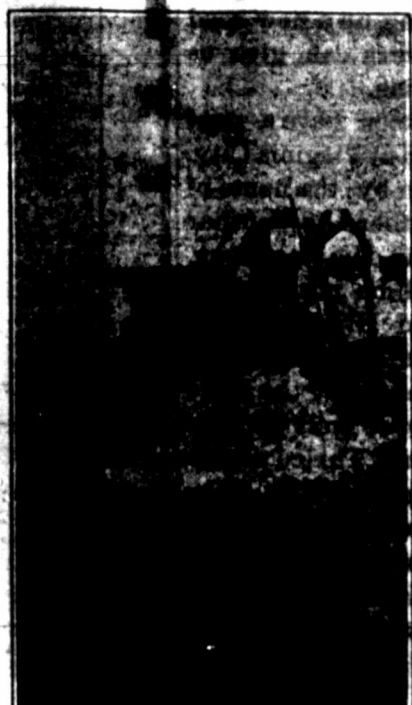

Portales and Her Irrigation Project!

THE TOWN: PORTALES is located 130 miles from Amarillo and 90 miles from Roswell, on the main line of the Pecos Valley Railway. Portales has 1500 inhabitants; two live banks whose deposits aggregate nearly half-million dollars; five churches; a \$20,000 public school with a still larger one projected; a court house and jail worth \$20,000; a full quota of live progressive merchants; two newspapers; four lumber yards; one cotton gin; a steam laundry and telephone system. Portales has no saloons or other haunts of vice. Its merchants gather trade for 50 miles west, 45 miles east and 100 miles south. It has a new \$5000 brick sanitarium.

It has but two negroes and not even one Mexican. It will build a \$20,000 high school building; a \$10,000 brick hotel. It will install and put in operation the \$75,000 water, sewer and light system, and a 10,000 acre irrigation project which will cost half million dollars.

THE IRRIGATION PROJECT will comprise 10,000 acres in Portales Shallow Water Valley where there are 100,000 acres with inexhaustible supply of best water at a depth from 8 to 30 feet.

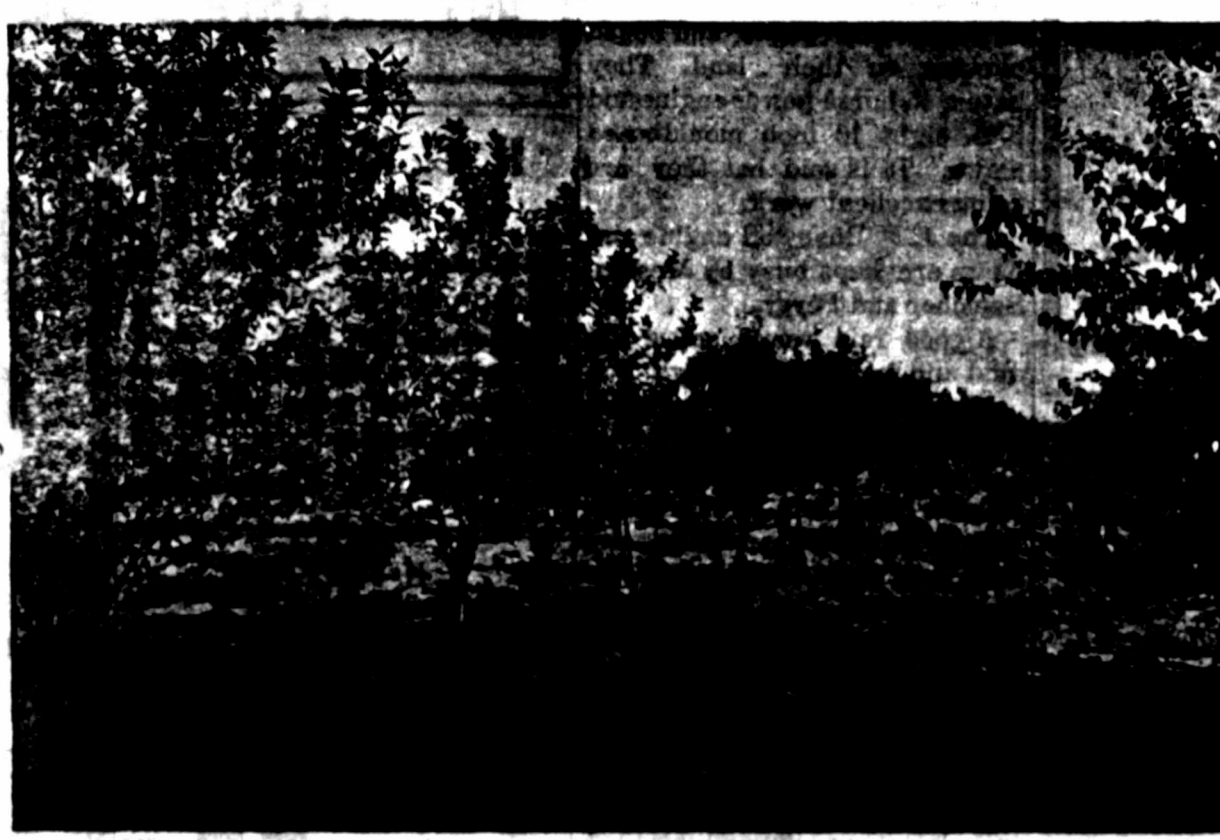
THE PLANT is an Electric Power Plant to be furnished by two 750 h. p. gas-producer engines, and to be carried out on large poles and heavy copper wires, equipped with lightning arresters, to the several tracts of land to be irrigated.

THE WELLS are dug 5 feet square down to the first strata of water. From thence they are drilled 14 inches in diameter down to 98 to 115 feet, a six inch centrifugal pump is connected to a 25 h. p. motor installed in pump house on top of ground.

THE INSTALLATION: It is agreed that the first 5000 acre unit will be in operation in April, 1910. The plant will be increased during this year to 25,000 acres.

THE COST is \$35.00 an acre, for the first 10,000 acres, payable in seven years, \$3.50 an acre cash.
