PORTALES IS ON THE LINE!

Santa Fe Extension From San Angelo to Pecos, Texas Connects Portales and Pecos Valley Points With Transcontinental Line From Galveston to Pacific Coast.

Attention should be called to the fact that Portales is on the line of what will be the Santa Fe's first transcontinental line, already built from Galveston to San Angelo and which is now being built from San Angelo to Pecos City, Texas, a distance of about 200 miles, where the line will join the Pecos Valley road over which this transcontinental line will pass through Roswell, Portales and to Clovis where the Belen cut-off line will be used westward to the Pacific Coast. The announcement of this extension from San Angelo to Pecos, together with the plans of the Santa Fe, it will be remembered, at once followed the announcement of the beginning of the work of double-tracking the Santa Fe's lines to the Pacific. It will therefore be seen that the Santa Fe intends to have two routes from Galveston to the Pacific, the one going by way of San Angelo and Pecos through Roswell, Portales to Clovis and the other going by way of Coleman through Lubbock to Texico and Clovis, where both lines will come together with the Chicago line and move westward to the Pacific. This, it will be seen, while not giving Portales and Roswell a new line of railroad, will give twice the passenger service now rendered by the Pecos Valley line and will also give us direct connection from Galveston on the one side and the Pacific on the other.

Inducements for Other Railways

Certainly there are few towns which can offer the special inducements for new railroads which Portales presents. Let us notice some of them briefly:

1. There is absolutely no grades necessary either to get into or out of Portales in any direction.
2. Portales is practically on a bee-line between Forth Worth and Albuquerque between which cities lies a vast and limitless productive area of varied soils which is practically undeveloped.
3. It is by far the shortest and cheapest line which can be built from Lubbock, Texas westward, there being practically no grade line in the 100 miles between Portales and Lubbock, and the richest shallow water land which inside of 5 or 10 years will be in one vast pumping irrigation plant.
4. The 10,000 acre irrigation plant to be installed in Portales this spring which is to be increased to 25,000 acres before another year, is in itself an inducement which few if any towns in all

this section of country can offer for other railroads.

5. We have the largest and most accessible water supply to be found anywhere except on the gulf or some river-side. We know of one town which is quite a railroad center where the railroad has been forced to sink almost a dozen deep wells and where 100 gallons per minute is counted a good flow. Whereas Portales offers a water supply where one well was tested and showed capacity to deliver 1400 gallons per minute. The Santa Fe Railway company's well at Portales delivered 9,000,000 gallons of water in May 1909 and that without special test.

6. Then the Portales Valley has the "folks." For 30 miles to the east, and 40 miles to the west and 100 miles south the people are settled on almost every 160 acres of land. Give them a new line of railroad from Lubbock to Portales and westward and give them time to get the 100,000 or more acres of shallow water land under pumping irrigation ditches and we challenge the sun in heaven to look down upon a country whose future is more certain or more glorious.

THE IRRIGATION BOND IS MADE!

Judge G. L. Reese returned to Portales last Saturday leaving Judge Lindsey at Chicago to see that all the details of the bond of the Western Construction Co. were properly arranged. Judge Lindsey remained over to the first part of this week, when he left for Kansas City to meet members of the town board who are purchasing the machinery for the town power plant. Monday afternoon Judge Lindsey had a wire aboard the passenger train saying that the irrigation bond was arranged and that Mr. Fuller and officials of the Western Construction Co. would be here tomorrow, (Fri.) or next day, when the work of installation of our irrigation plant will begin. Mr. Fuller will remain in Portales and push the work of installing this plant with all possible vigor and haste. Alright, let's go!

THE HERALD'S CAREER.

For almost a year the present management has published the Roosevelt County Herald. With what measure of success, we leave the public to judge. It is, however, only fair to state that we encountered almost every imaginable difficulty, some of them trivial, and some of them practically insurmountable. For one thing, the Herald was practically without standing in the community and it certainly was equally without mechanical equipment. And while we do not mention it in the spirit of boasting, we are glad to say that the Herald is now second to no country weekly in all this section in point of standing and mechanical equipment. Another serious difficulty which we have not yet succeeded in overcoming is that which confronts every weekly Democratic newspaper in the territory, viz: the fact that we are not allowed even to compete for a large part of the legal printing which goes to our Republican contemporary and the further fact that the people, largely from a lack of understanding, carry their Contest Notices and other legal publications, which we can publish, to the Republican papers; whereas, the Republican papers can and do enter into and compete for both the city printing and county printing and either get the lion's share of this or cause it to be cut to the point where it can pay little more than the actual cost of production, and in many instances there is an actual loss to the printer.

Still another difficulty which all but paralyzed the farmers and the merchants as well as our papers, was the overwhelming, blighting drought last year which left the people without money and without hope or heart. Now, while this caused more people to "prove-up" and thus helped out our Republican contemporary, who gets the notice publications, it left our local merchants with no hope to advertise and push their business and caused a distinct falling off in the splendid and constant increase of our list of new subscribers. In the face of these difficulties, it is little short of remarkable that we have been able to add 600 new subscribers to the Herald in the past year.

OUR NEW MANAGER

The past year's record of the Herald is all the more phenomenal however, when it is known that neither Mr. McBride, Mr. Spahr, nor myself are practical printers. Yet editor has wielded the pen in various capacities for ten years, but he is not a printer. Indeed he knows just enough about the printing business to fully appreciate the fact that the Herald could never succeed as it ought to until we had secured a business manager, who, in addition to being a high-minded, intelligent, wide-awake and progressive citizen, would be absolute master of every detail of the business and mechanical department of the Herald plant. We have been a long time finding such a man; and in the meantime we bear willing testimony that every man who has been associated with the editor in the work of the Herald has done his best; but we are glad to announce that we have found our man, in the person of Mr. Walter Brandon, formerly of Roswell, but who last week bought out Mr. M. Z. Spahr's interest in the Herald and moved his family, his hopes and his endeavors to Portales.

Mr. Brandon began his career as a printer in his father's office in central Texas at the age of ten years and with the exception of a few years since, he has spent the best strength of all the eighteen years since that time in a print shop. He was connected with the Canyon City News for four years, being editor and manager most of the time, and with other Texas papers. Then came a break in his career when he joined Governor Curry's Eleventh Cavalry Regiment in 18 months of service in the Philippine Islands. Such was the standing Mr. Brandon won for himself in this service that Governor Curry has repeatedly offered him any appointment in New Mexico he might deem himself fitted to fill. Mr. Brandon, however, returned to his first love and took a position with the Roswell Register-Tribune where he has remained until coming to the Herald and where he has been engaged in the various departments of this, one of the largest and best equipped printing offices in the southwest. We therefore feel that, without boasting, we can assure the Herald readers and friends that we now have a business manager and foreman in the Herald office who is capable of handling any and all classes of work and of giving you the best of service and we therefore ask you to **Watch the Herald Grow!**

WHAT OTHERS SAY OF OUR IRRIGATION PROJECT CONTRACT LET FOR PORTALES PLANT.

The contract for the construction of the irrigation plant was awarded to the Western Construction Company of Wichita, Kan., the consideration being \$350,000. The work has already begun. There is now one car load of machinery being unloaded, consisting of steel tower and tank. There will be seventy five more car loads of this plant, which will make this irrigation project second to none. The City Council also let the contract for water works, sewer and electric lights at a cost to the city of \$78,000 to be completed in five months from date. The irrigation project is to be completed by the first of May, so as to give farmers water for this year's crop.

Portales now has the brightest future before it of any city in the West and the country in and around Portales will from this on furnish the outside world with all kinds of vegetables and feed stuff, alfalfa, corn, wheat and broom-corn, and our four stand cotton gin will be running day and night.—Roswell Record.

BIG IRRIGATION PLANT

A big irrigation plant is being installed in Portales which will furnish water for the irrigation of 10,000 acres of land. All of the preliminary arrangements have been made and a payment of \$3.50 an acre has been made. The plant will be located at Portales and electric power will be generated by two engines of 750 horse power each. The electric current will be transmitted to the tracts to be irrigated, on heavy copper wires and the water will be pumped with centrifugal pumps each operated by a 25 horse power motor.

The average depth to water on the large tract to be irrigated is about 17 feet. The total amount pledged for the 10,000 acres of land is \$350,000 or \$35.00 an acre. The first payment of ten per cent has been made and the other payments are to extend over a period of seven years. This rate is about the same as is charged by the large irrigation companies for water for irrigation.

This work is being done by the Western Construction Company which was recently incorporated here. The president of the company is C. H. Rittenhouse and the company was organized for the purpose of constructing irrigation works. It is expected that the plant at Portales will be able to furnish water for the irrigation of 5,000 acres by the first of April and that 25,000 acres can be irrigated before the end of this year.

The enterprise will be watched with great interest by people interested in irrigation in the territory as it is the first attempt to irrigate a large area of land by means of electric power generated at a large central plant.—Santa Fe Eagle.

STARTLING REVELATIONS IN TAX SITUATION

Belen, N. M., Feb. 12.—Still more startling revelations are coming to light as the result of investigations of the Good Government League. Further examination into conditions in Valencia county reveals the fact that 72% of the taxes of the county are paid by the corporate interests and non-resident land owners.

The report of the investigating committee of the league shows that in one of the precincts recently investigated there were 240 registered voters in 1908, that twelve of these paid the grand total of the taxes levied in the entire precinct, which is \$216.92, or \$5.64 less than is being levied against one individual taxpayer in Belin precinct owning two acres of cultivated and four acres of uncultivated land, and \$12.61 less than is assessed against the owner of four small cottages built since March at a total cost of \$3,500 and which were not subject to taxation in this year's assessment.

The report of the committee also shows that some of the lands and personal property in Belin precinct are returned at their actual value, while the average for the grand total of the precinct just investigated is at a rate for the entire precinct of 1/4 of 1% of the actual value of the taxable property in that precinct, and that there are 70 out of a total of 82 owners of taxable property in this precinct, who do not appear on the assessment roll at all.

This about the condition that exists generally throughout the county. The Good Government League will seek the aid of corporations and non-resident land owners who are unjustly taxed in an effort to get the taxes equalized. They will strongly urge the surveying and platting of all county and grant lands now unsurveyed and ask that the newspapers and the people generally in counties who are paying their proportionate taxes aid them in this fight.—Tribune Citizen.

NEWS OF WEEK IN BRIEF

FOUR MILLION ACRES ARE THROWN OPEN TO PUBLIC.
Washington, Feb. 9.—More than four million acres of public
lands, which were included in the Forest Domain were thrown out
today and will be available for homestead settlement by action of
President Taft when he approved a plan for the re-classification of
forest lands which were formulated by Gifford Pinchot.

SOUTHWESTERN GETS ROAD TO TUCUMCARI.
Tucumcari, N. M., Feb. 9. Rumor is current here today that
the El Paso & Southwestern Railroad company has purchased the
entire line of the Tucumcari & Memphis railroad, extending from
here to Memphis, Tenn., a distance of over 800 miles, directly east.
While nothing officially has been learned, the report is believed to
be true by the railroad officials here. The evidence they base their
belief on is that all of the El Paso & Southwestern head officials
have made a trip of inspection over the line from Amarillo, Texas, to
Memphis, and also over the unfinished line between here and Ama-
rillo during the past week.

PEARY GETS HONORS.
New York, Feb. 8.—Before an audience of more than 4,000 peo-
ple in the Metropolitan opera house, Commander Robert E. Peary,
discoverer of the north pole, was presented with a \$10,000 check on
behalf of the citizens of New York, but instead of retaining it him-
self, he announced immediately that he would contribute it towards
the south pole expedition planned by the Geographic society.

The check was presented to the commander by President
Hughes of New York at this, the first national testimonial in the
explorer's honor. Accepting the gift Peary advanced to the front
and said:

"Here is a check for \$10,000. This check will be deposited to-
morrow as a joint contribution of the members of this audience, the
officers and committee of the Civic Forum and myself toward an
American antarctic expedition for the purpose of exploration and
investigation; and to enter the stars and stripes in a splendid, manly
international race for the south pole with our British cousins, than
whom there are no finer foemen in the world."

Washington, Feb. 9.—A bill making Commander Robert E.
Peary, the discoverer of the north pole, a rear admiral was passed

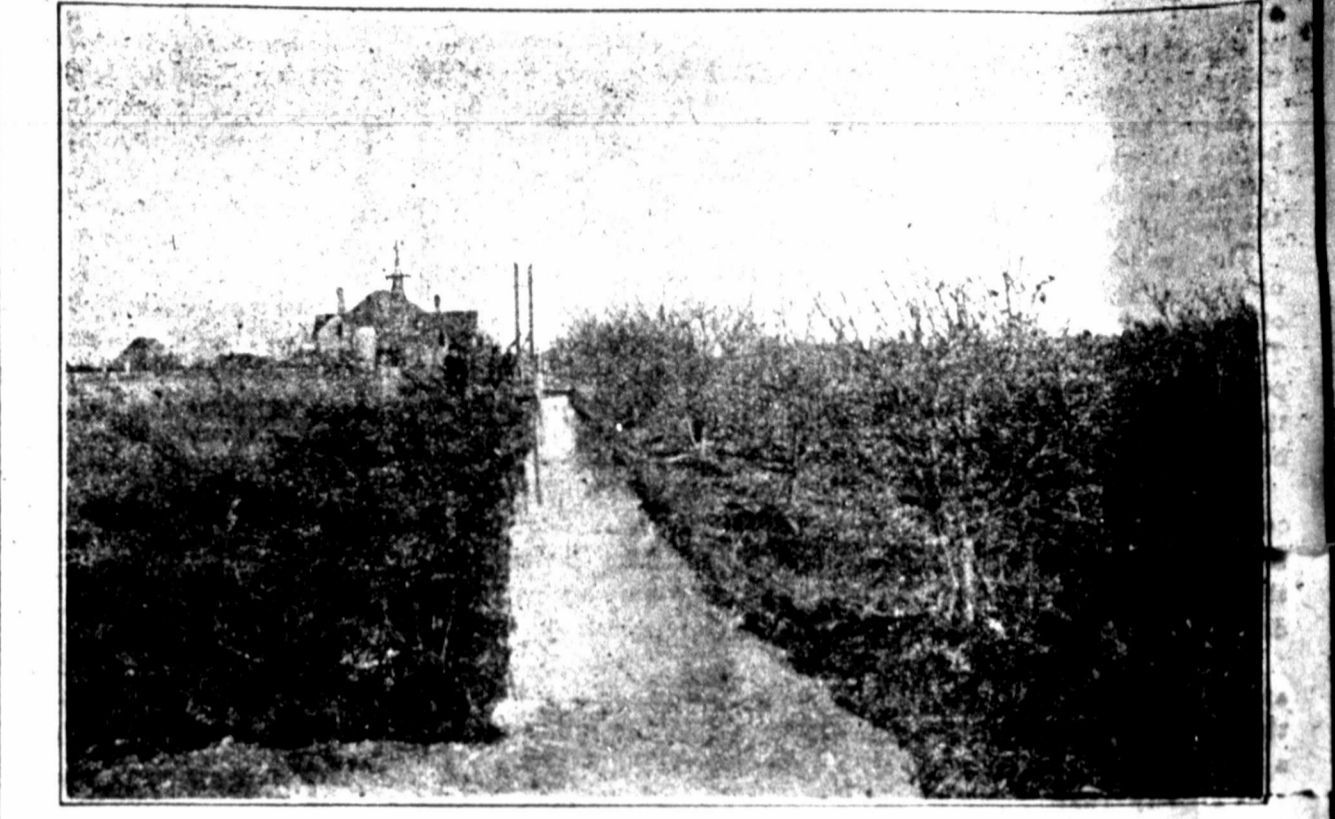
