THE ED HARWELL CASE.

That Ed Harwell charged with killing C. A. Peck should, after being twice refused bail by

Chief Justice Wm. H. Pope on habeas corpus hearings, be acquitted constituted at once the chief topic of interest and the chief surprise of the last week's court proceedings. And yet it is easy to understand several if not all the causes leading to this result. For one thing, the eye witnesses who were present in the trial showed a marked personal interest in the case which went far to discrediting the worth of their testimony.

Then, it must be admitted that attorney G. L. Reese who had the management of the case for the defense from the beginning, demonstrated his right to be regarded as one of the best criminal lawyers of his age to be found anywhere. If there was a point missing in his mastery of the case the laity could not detect it. Judge Simmons of Fort Worth, Texas, who is the uncle of and who made the main speech for the defendant, also deserves much credit.

While we do not believe the

public was prepared for so sweeping a victory for the defense, it must be acknowledged in all such instances that there is room for honest differences of opinion and that the jury is more competent to pass upon the law and evidence than is an outsider. Nevertheless in spite of the fact that the jury doubtless did their best with the lights before them, there are in every community criminally bent men who will feel that they too may take the life of their fellows and go free. In this we do not censure the jury. The full facts will doubtless never be known about any case of like import and the courts of the country can not go beyond the known and proven facts.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

DELEGATES COME TOGETHER IN GREAT UNITY
AND PERFECT THE MACHINERY FOR
THE COMING CAMPAIGN.

Saturday afternoon promptly at 2 o'clock, Chairman Sam J. Nixon called the county Democratic Convention to order in the Wonderland Theatre at Portales. Attorney Gillianwater was elected secretary for the next two years, Attorney Monroe Compton was elected county chairman for the same period of time, though Judge Nixon presided throughout the meeting in absence of Mr. Compton. The opening address was made by Judge Wm. R. McGill of La Lande, who urged a thorough and competent organization looking to the election of a large majority to the constitutional convention, in case the enabling act passes congress.

The following precincts were represented in the convention, viz—

Portales, Floyd, Macy, Upton, Dora, Taiban, Dereno, Causey, Rogers, Fairview, La Lande and Elida. The following resolution prepared by Attorney T. E. Mears and offered by Judge W. K. McGill, seconded by Attorney Faircloth, was adopted:

"Resolved that this convention appoint a committee consisting of one from each precinct who shall serve until the coming primary election or until their successors are elected and qualified; and that one precinct committeeman shall be elected by the Democratic voters of each precinct at the next primary election, who shall be the executive, head of such precinct and who shall hold his office for two years or until his successor is elected and qualified and he shall receive the vote as cast and tabulated by the judges holding the primary election and shall meet the committeemen from the various other precincts on a day to be fixed by the county democratic committee herein designated and such committee men from all the townships, together with the chairman assembled shall constitute the executive officers of the Democratic party of Roosevelt County."

In keeping with the foregoing resolutions, the following were appointed committeemen of their respective precincts until their

successors are elected and qualified— viz—

Sam J. Nixon, Portales; T. D. Cain, Elida; E. E. Eastwood, Tolar; G. W. Jones, Causey; Emmett Gore, Upton; Albert Lewis, Fairview; Simon Lane, Floyd; J. M. Grisso, Carter; O. F. Chaney, Rogers; J. O. Wood, La Lande; J. S. Payne, Dora; Jno. Benson, Pearson; W. M. Wilson, Taiban; J. C. Kitchens, Dereno; George Robertson, Hawkeye. A resolution passed the convention that the county chairman should proceed to the appointment of all precinct chairmen's not elected by the convention. The matter of date for the county primary was discussed at some length. But in view of the fact that the enabling act may pass congress sometime in the spring or summer, in which case there would be no election of territorial or county officers, no definite action was taken to the setting of the primary. It was recommended, however, that the primary be not held earlier than the third Tuesday in May, in the discretion of the county executive committee. The convention then adjourned.

ADOPT PORTALES PLAN.

Estancia, N. M., March 10.—Great interest is stirring the people of Estancia and vicinity over a big irrigation pumping plant. The matter has been maturing for some weeks and today took definite shape when some prominent farmers in this vicinity subscribed 3,000 acres for irrigation.

These men who signed their names agree to make a contract with the promoters from Wichita, Kan. to have their land watered. The promoters, who are operating the plants at Wichita Kansas and Portales, N. M., require that contracts be made taking water for 40,000 acres; and nearly a third of the amount was subscribed on the spot, making it sure that the project will be put through without a hitch.

People are recalling that sugar beets from this vicinity analyzed 14% higher in sugar than any other at the territorial fair more than a year ago, and that we raise the finest potatoes in the great west, with other products way toward the top. They are brimming over with satisfaction and many predict that 20,000 acres will be watered from the first.—Albuquerque Journal.

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WILL WE GET ENABLING ACT?

Everyone interested in immediate statehood were gratified at the action of the senate conference committee which ordered the bill as amended, reported favorably. Alas this is but one step and there remains some decidedly difficult questions to be solved yet before the enabling act really comes into being. About the most vexing obstacle in the way at present, however, is the fact that the statehood measure in congress must await the action of congress on both the railroad bill and the postal savings bank bill. Unless this program is changed this means a delay of at least eight weeks. We take the following from the dispatches from Washington anent the railroad bill:

Practically all the "insurgent" senators will speak on the railroad bill and there will be many speeches from the Democratic side. No one estimates that the debate will be finished in less than six weeks and some senators predict that much more time will be consumed.

So that one thing is certain, the enabling act will not even receive further consideration before the middle of May.

THE MARCH OF EVENTS.

SENATOR BAILEY, true to his masters as the needle is to the pole has another serious task before him. After helping Aldrich and Canon to install a high tariff on iron, coal, lumber and hides in an effort to protect the trusts and help them to systematically rob the people, has now turned his hand to help out "future" gamblers who do not produce the corn, cotton, oats or wheat but who set around and gamble on it with a view to getting a "corner" on it and controlling the price. I suppose he will be out in an elaborate speech next week telling the country that these gamblers are the only original Democrats and patriots of the past and the only hope of the future!

YOUNG Mr. CUDAHY has hit upon a new and striking method of dealing with the "home destroyer." Returning to his home unexpectedly a few days since, in Kansas City, he found his wife receiving one of these "high society" home destroyers in the person of a certain bank president and club man. Calling to his aid his chauffeur, Cudahy overpowered the scamp, took a knife and mutilated him. We wonder what ought to be done with the villainous treacherous woman and wife in the case.

And now the DEMAGOGUE JEFF DAVIS OF ARKANSAS has troubles of his own. It is strictly against the law for a congressman or senator to receive even the promise of remuneration for his vote and influence in the legislative halls of the nation. But last week Jeff, let slip the remark that if the "sunk lands" bill passed congress he would get a handsome fee out of it. Subsequently he attempted to revise his statement but failed.

Dr. HYDE HAS ELEVEN INDICTMENTS against him and it is feared that apart from his name there will be little hide left about him by the time he faces the jury on the eleven counts lodged against him for alleged poisoning of his wife's family.

THE STATEHOOD GRIND AT WASHINGTON is growing beautifully less. Of course the Democrats did it! They naturally could run it over a Republican president pledged to statehood and a Republican Congress throughout. Any how, did you notice how systematically Delegate Andrews is making a name for himself? He makes it his most serious task at Washington to appeal for two new pensions every week. I tell you, Andrews does things!

WANTS A TICKET.

The "standpatters" of Portales otherwise known as those who favor upholding the prohibitory ordinances of the town and a good business administration, came together in convention at the Methodist church Tuesday night and nominated the following ticket for town officers: viz For Mayor T. J. Molinari, For Clerk Ben Woods, For trustee 1 yr. J. B. Sledge, For trustee 2 yrs. G. W. Carr, For trustee 2 yrs. T. M. Laister For trustee 1 yr. C. F. Anderson It is but truth to say that this ticket represents the choice of no one man; but a consensus of judgment on the part of many of the best business men of the town. It is not claimed, moreover, that they are altogether faultless men—this type of men don't happen to live in Portales just now. It is not expected that every man on the ticket will please every man who thinks he knows how to run the town. They are men who, on the whole, have made a success of their own business and on this account they have a right to be trusted in the carrying out of this special trust. Unfortunately no one of these gentlemen belong to the labor union. The labor union was asked through some of its members once and again to suggest some one of their number for a place; but no suggestion was made which fact was taken to mean that the union as such did not want a place on this ticket. There was also some disappointment that judge Lindsey and at least two of the old board would not agree to stand for reelection. But none of them would agree to stand, largely because after doing their best they were criticized to kingdom come, and as this seemed to be the program, they felt like the honor of being kicked and "cussed" and worked without pay was one that ought to be passed around. The ticket does not represent all the business interests of the town since, in the first place, this was impossible and in the second place other good business men were solicited and even urged to allow their names to go on the ticket but declined outright. And that it is their privilege and duty if they can not stand for the maintenance of the prohibitory ordinance and a business administration of the affairs of Portales. But from the standpoint of ability and integrity we dare say there is not a better qualified set of men in the town of Portales. The issue is now drawn and drawn openly and squarely. If the people want to maintain the prohibitory ordinance and have a good business administration they have the opportunity to have it by electing

this ticket. If, on the other hand, they want to bring back the saloons, they undoubtedly will have the opportunity of voting for another ticket which stands for the saloons.

PORTALES WINS JOINT DEBATE

The debaters of the Portales high school duly and truly carried off the honors in debating contest held at Clovis last Saturday evening at which time and place they waged the battle of argument with representative debaters of the Clovis high school. There were three speakers from each school. Those who represented Portales were Effie Anderson, Earl Williams and Albert Howard. The contestants for honors in behalf of Clovis, were Abe Cox, Claude Billingsly and Mr. Beiler. The debate was held in the Methodist church where a large audience greeted the speakers. The judges selected were Prof. Pile of Texico, Rev. Ausmus of Clovis and G. V. Johnson of Portales. The question for the debate was "Resolved that the Government Should Own and Control the Railroads of the United States." Clovis had the affirmative side of the question and Portales the negative. While the speakers were only boys and girls of the high school they made splendid talks and indicated they had made quite thorough study of the subject and excellent preparation. The decision of the judges as announced was two to one in favor of Portales. It was decided by the judges to grade each speaker on three points, viz: argument, delivery, and language. The average for each speaker given by each judge was again averaged to make the decision. A letter received this week by the Times from the superintendent of the schools at Clovis shows the average given by two of the judges was slightly in favor of Clovis, but the general average of the three was it favor of Portales. According to the notes kept by the Portales judge this is not correct. Our notes show that Prof. Pile of Texico gave the Clovis speakers an average of 87, and the Portales speakers an average 91.3. Of course the Portales judge decided in favor of Portales and the Clovis judge in favor of Clovis. At any rate the debate was a very enjoyable affair and a splendid method of development work for the pupils. We commend Prof. Smith of the Portales schools and Prof. Poore of the Clovis schools for their successful work in getting up and holding this debate as it is the very best of training for their pupils. Several from Portales attended the debate, including Professors Smith, Bailey and Cardwell and Miss Hutchinson, of the teachers, and Mrs. A. A. Williams and others.—Reported to the Herald by G. V. Johnson.

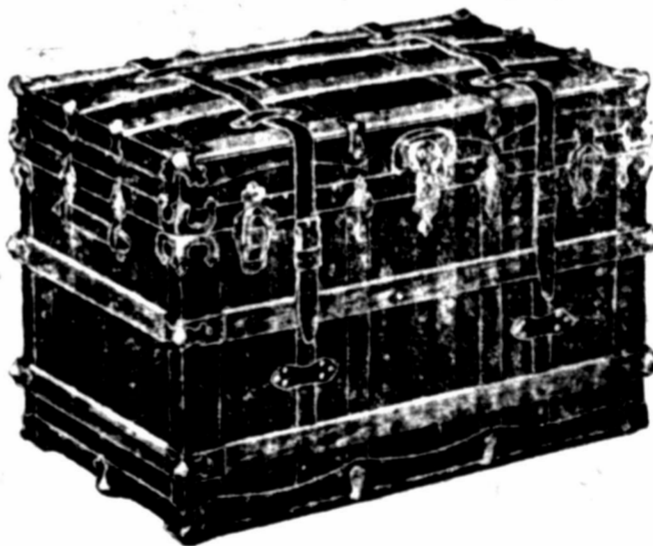
