# THE CITIZENS' TICKET WINS OUT IN CONTEST.

The Contest of Ballots Warm and Determined-Results in Doubt to the Majority---Harvey and Harris in Lead.

This result, while not a foregone conclusion, is easily accounted for. The declaration of the candidates and platform of the citizens ticket for prohibition claimed a good sprinkle of what otherwise would have been a straight prohibition vote, while the submission clause in the ticket's platform held out hope to the supporters of the saloons, and got their solid support, whereas the labor union naturally gave its strength to this ticket on the ground that two of the men on this ticket belong to that organization. In addition to this fusion of forces under the banner of the Citizens Ticket, the Prehibitionists had to carry charges of various shortcomings made against the old board. Of course there is nothing in the charges

their ideas; but it is but fair to them and to the town, a majority of whose voters have placed the welfare of the town in their hands for the next year at least, to say that we ought to give them a chance. If they can take up the financial propositions and the various other problems facing us as a town and solve them, make no mistakes, incur no criticisms and satisfy the demands of the situatioin, we believe the whole town will owe them a debt of gratitude.

# **JOYCE-PRUIT COMPANY BEGIN THE BIG BUILDING**

Construction Commenced Last Saturday on Big Building, S. P. Denning Having Supervision of the Work-Building to be 100x115 Ft., With 50x115 Basement.

As was announced in these columns some days since, the Joyce Pruit Co. have launced the building of the largest store house yet erected in Portales. The building is to be 100x115 feet with 50x115 feet basement, built of brick and concrete, with modern plate glass front and perhaps also a furnace heating plant situated in the basement. The building is to be located on the southwest corner of the square in Portales and its construction, along with the Warren-Fooshee building on the other side of the square and the construction of the town power house and the Portales Irrigation power house, certainly marks the beginning of the new and greater Portales. Mr. Fred Wagner of Roswell is the architect and construction foreman of this new building, while Mr. Sam P. Denning of the same place is contractor. The construction work, however, will be sub-let in sections and the work, all things being equal, will be given to Portales workmen. As is known to some of our readers Mr. Denning is one of the oldest and best known con-"Jack's Bluff" is a good one. tractors in eastern New Mexico, having built the Citizens National Bank building, the J. B. Sledge residence and other dwellings in Portales. The work of construction is to be pushed as fast as the material can be had, with a view to completing the building ready for occupancy within the next 60 or 90 days.

### A WORD FOR THE RETIRING BOARD.

Now that the heat of our municipal election for city council men has somewhat subsided, calm reason and justice compels most of us to achkowledge that much was said and done on all sides that might have very properly been eliminated from the campaign. If such be the case it is now ours to make amends and bury the remembrance of former strife. There remains only one phase of the situation about which we would speak ere the chapter closes, and that is a word of appreciation to the retiring board for what it has accomplished in the face of so many difficulties. The Herald sincerely believes that this body of men has labored faithfully and untiringly for the best interests of the whole people, and if perchance there may have been mistakes made, we should remember that on the whole they have acquitted themselves nobly in the task before them. Of the truly thankless positions in public life, that of alder man is the most thankless of all. It is a real case of being "cussed if you did, or if you didn't." This board, like all bodies similarly placed, has been censured by every person who did not exactly agree with its policy in every particular, whether that policy was right or wrong. This is no more than human, and as some one has said, it is one of the "penalties of greatness" to be misunderstood and censured by good people in good faith on account of difference of opinion.

### SOME OF THE DUTIES OF A NEWSPAPER.

In passing through an ordeal such as this community has wit nessed the past few days in the election of a board of aldermen, it very often develops that class of partisanship which believes that the only province of a newspaper is to take up one side or the oth erand utterly ignore the rights of the other party. In the first place there are two sides to every question - a right and a wrong side. The conscientious editor who does not presume to infallibil ity, will first of all seek to INFORM, and thus FORM the public mind and conscience. As an illustration of the point in question, the Herald last week sought to INFORM the public of both sides of mat ters about which all of us were vitally concerned, confining this "information" to the arguments and statements of the exponents of the two opposite factions represented in the political bout, at the same time giving utterance editorially to our own personal convic tions in the matter in no uncertain terms. As to how well we succeeded in the effort we leave it to our thoughtful and unprejudiced readers. A newspaper cannot pursue any other course and remain true to the varied classes of people which it represents. Anything short of a recognition of this duty to its constituency will justly entitle a newspaper to the severest criticism. An editor who will arrogate unto himself the right to permit only one side of a controverted issue to be aired in his columns depreciates the intelligence of his readers, in that he is willing to presume that the public will not be able to choose the right after the submissal of both sides. However, the fulfilling of this obligation in no wise precludes a newspaper's inalienable right to express an opinion on all matters affecting the public weal and the "fence-riding" class who would restrict the press to newsgathering alone is the same fellow who is always clamoring for the pulpit to preach the "simple gospel of the Master" and would inhibit the progressive and ag gressive preacher from dealing with any personage more recent than Nicodemus or any event less remote than the Deluge. limitation in either case would reduce the press and the pulpit to futility and impotence.

Now to reduce these premises to a practical working basis as regards the attitude of the Herald right here in Portales: That it is not the purpose of its editors to exclude the "other fellow's side" of any question, regardless of sect. creed or politics, which may concern the body politic-the community at large. The purpose of the management is to have a paper for the expression of all the people forming this democratic community of ours, only reserving the right to have "our say" after all has been said. We propose to hack away and let the chips fall where they may.

### A STEP FORWARD.

The good ladies of Portales are certainly to be commended for the pride and zeal they are showing in the contemplated beautify ing of the school grounds. It may safely be said that every community has at least one building which its owns in common; that is the school house. It is built by everybody, maintained by every body and belongs to everybody. It ought to be of benefit to every body. Of course the initial and essential use of a schoolhouse is to provide shelter for the children while they learn their lessons, but it ought to do a great deal more for them than that. It ought to educate them in taste, in the appreciation of art and in the knowledge of beauty, and thus increase their resources of happiness. This may be done by making the building and the grounds on which it stands as beautiful as the naborhood can afford and by adorning the rooms with casts and prints of the best statues and pictures. This is not expensive. A house with good lines and simple dignity may even cost less than one which every day confronts the landscape, and casts and prints may be had for small prices. In the beautifying of the public school, there are two facts to have in mind. One of these is expressed in the phase, "the almighty hall." This was used by a great schoolmaster to emphasize the vast and abiding influence of our surroundings. Unconsciously an inevitably the looks of the building make a differ ence in the life of the people who live in it. The bare little white schoolhouse at the cross roads, whose only decoration is a flag pole at the gable of the roof, is a symbol of the dullness and monotony

of agricultural conditions. Both the conditions and the symbol of them may easily be improved. Cover the bare walls with vines and plant other flowers. The other fact is that children will re-

### IRRIGATED AND DRY ALFALFA.

When putting in a crop that is to be irrigated, it is important to have the field in the best possible condition and leveled thoroughly in order to expedite the flow of water later on Make the lateral ditches before the crop is planted and then sow between the ditches in order that no seed will get into them and cause the plants to come up and interfere with irrigation. Sow the seed as early as possible after the bed has been well prepared at the rate of from eight to twelve pounds of seed to the acre. Common practice is to use twenty pounds, but experience has shown this to be more than is necessary, so that eight to twelve pounds of seed are now regarded as quite sufficient.

As such weed seeds as dodder, sweet clover and narrow leaved plantain are likely to be mixed in with the alfalfa seed, it is important to get samples from the dealers and have them examined to determine the amount of weed seeds. These samples can also be tested to determine their germination. Simply place several hundred of the seeds in a moistened cloth or paper and keep moist for five to seven days. As this will supply all the conditions of germination, the seeds will sprout if they possess the vitality essential to growth.

### SUMMARY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THE ENABLING ACT

The qualified electors may hold an election which shall be called by the governor of the territory within thirty days after the approval of the enabling act by the president to elect delegates to the constitutional convention. This election shall take place not earlier han sixty days nor later than ninety days after the approval of the ct. One hundred delegates in all shall be chosen, they are to be pointed among the several counties by the governor, the chief stice of the supreme court and the secretray of the territory, acrding to the vote cast for territorial delegate in congress in the ection of 1908. Provided, that where a new county has been cred since the election of 1908, the delegates from such counties all be on a basis of the number of votes cast at said election in different townships included in said new county. Such ction shall be conducted in all things, including the qualification ote, as is now provided for the election of members of the terrial legislature.

The delegates to the constitutional convention shall meet in the of the house of representatives at Santa Fe at noon on the th Monday after their election, and said convention, when nized, "shall be the sole judge of the election and qualifications own members." The members of the convention shall refor their services the same pay and mileage as is now paid to nembers of the territorial legislature, but in no case shall they ve pay except for the time they are actually in session and not greater number of days than sixty in all.



It shall be the duty of the attorney general of the United States to bring and prosecute such suits as may be necessary to enforce the provisions of this act relative to the said lands herein granted and the products thereof and the funds derived therefrom.

The constitutional convention shall provide for the submission of the new constitution to the people at an election on a day named by the convention, which shall not be earlier than ninety days after the convention adjourns, at which the electors, who are qualified to vote for members of the territorial legislature shall be entitled to vote directly for or against the constitution and each provision of it which shall be separately submitted. If a majority of the legal votes cast at said election shall be againstraid constitution, the governor of the territory shall order the constitutional convention to convene a second time at a date not later than twenty days after the governor receives the documents showing the rejection of the constitution, and when so assembled, the convention shall form a new constitution, which shall be formed and submitted in the same manner as the first. If this constitution and the provisions which are separately submitted shall be accepted by the people of New Mexico a certified copy thereof shall be submitted to the president of the United States, and if congress and the president approve them, or if the president approves them and congress fails to approve them during the next regular session, then the president shall certify said facts to the governor of the territory and he shall, within thirty days, call an election at which all state, county and other officers for a full state government, provided for by said constitution, and two representatives in congress, to be elected at large, shall be chosen; said election to take place not earlier than sixty days and not later than ninety days after said call. The governor of said territory shall certify the result of said election to the president of the United States who shall immediately issue his proclomation and the said new state shall then be admitted to the union by virtue of this act on an equal footing with the other states. But until the state is so admitted and its officers are elected and qualified, the county and territorial officers, including the delegate in congress, shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices.

The said state when so admitted shall constitute one judicial district for the United States courts, and the circuit and district coults of said district shall be held at Santa Fe twice in each year. and said court shall be attached to the eighth judicial circuit of the United States. Said circuit, district and state courts shall be the successors of the district and supreme courts of said territory; and all cases pending at the time of the admission of the said state in any of the courts of said territory, which, if they had begun in a state, would be such as to be heard and decided in a federal court, shall be transferred to the proper United States court for said teritory, and all cases not so transferred shall be heard and decided in the proper courts of the state. All laws in force in said territory at the time of its admission, exept such as are changed or modified by this act or by the constitution, shall remain in force until changed by the legislature of the new state, and all the laws of the United States shall have the same force and effect as in other states of the union.

To pay any and all kinds of expense connected with the election of delegates to the convention, the holding of the convention, pay of delegates, and for "all proper and necessary expense" for officers, clerks, messengers and printing the sum of one hundred thousand dollars is appropriated by the act, with the provision that if the expense exceeds that amount the excess shall be paid by the new state.

### SUMMARY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THE ENABLING ACT

The qualified electors may hold an election which shall be called by the governor of the territory within thirty days after the approval of the enabling act by the president to elect delegates to the constitutional convention. This election shall take place not earlier than sixty days nor later than ninety days after the approval of the act. One hundred delegates in all shall be chosen, they are to be appointed among the several counties by the governor, the chief justice of the supreme court and the secretray of the territory, according to the vote cast for territorial delegate in congress in the election of 1908. Provided, that where a new county has been created since the election of 1908, the delegates from such counties shall be on a basis of the number of votes cast at said election in the different townships included in said new county. Such election shall be conducted in all things, including the qualification to vote, as is now provided for the election of members of the territorial legislature.

The delegates to the constitutional convention shall meet in the hall of the house of representatives at Santa Fe at noon on the fourth Monday after their election, and said convention, when organized, "shall be the sole judge of the election and qualifications of its own members." The members of the convention shall receive for their services the same pay and mileage as is now paid to the members of the territorial legislature, but in no case shall they receive pay except for the time they are actually in session and not for a greater number of days than sixty in all.

After the convention is organized they shall declare on the part of the proposed state that they adopt the constitution of the United States, and they are then authorized by the enabling act to form a constitution and provide for a state government. The constitution and government shall be republican in form, and shall make no distinction in civil or political rights of the people on account of race or color, and said constitution shall be agreeable to the constitution of the United States and the principles of the Declaration of Independence. The constitution shall also provide for perfect religious freedom, and that no inhabitant of the proposed state shall ever be molested in person or property on account of his or her religious worship. It shall also forever prohibit polygamous or plural marriages and polygamous co-habitation; the sale, barter or giving of intoxicating liquors to Indians and the introduction of liquors into Indian country, incluing lands owned or occupied by the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico. Except that the introduction of intoxicating liquors into lands of the Indian reservations which have been allotted, sold, reserved or otherwise disposed of shall be prohibited for a period of twenty five years after such allotment or sale.

The inhabitants of the proposed state agree that the title to any and all lands within the boundaries of the new state, not otherwise granted or appropriated, and all lands held by any Indians or Indian tribes which was acquired through the United States, shall so long as the same remains the property of said Indians or Indian tribes, be under the absolute control of the congress of the United States; thot no land or other property belonging to the citizens of the United States who do not reside in said new state, shall ever be taxed at a higher rate than property belonging to the resideuts of the said snate; that no tax shall be laid upon lands or other property belonging to the United States or reserved for its use; that all lands or other property of any Indian outside of any reservation or grant shall be subject to the same tax as other property except such as the national forest reserve in proportion to the amount of school shall be exempt by act of congress; that all debts and liabilities of lands within said said forests, whether same be surveyed or unsaid territory of New Mexico and the counties thereof which are valid surveyed. The constitutional convention shall provide for the submission of the new constitution to the people at an election on a day named by the convention, which shall not be earlier than ninety days after the convention adjourns, at which the electors, who are qualified to vote for members of the territorial legislature shall be entitled to vote directly for or against the constitution and each provision of it which shall be separately submitted. If a majority of the legal votes cast at said election shall be against said constitution, the governor of the territory shall order the constitutional convention to convene a second time at a date not later than twenty days after the governor receives the documents showing the rejection of the constitution, and when so assembled, the convention shall form a new constitution, which shall be formed and submitted in the same manner as the first. If this constitution and the provisions which are separately submitted shall be accepted by the people of New Mexico a certified copy thereof shall be submitted to the president of the United States, and if congress and the president approve them, or if the president approves them and congress fails to approve them during the next regular session, then the president shall certify said facts to the governor of the territory and he shall, within thirty days, call an election at which all state, county and other officers for a full state government, provided for by said constitution, and two representatives in congress, to be elected at large, shall be chosen; said election to take place not earlier than sixty days and not later than ninety days after said call. The governor of said territory shall certify the result of said election to the president of the United States who shall immediately issue his proclomation and the said new state shall then be admitted to the union by virtue of this act on an equal footing with the other states. But until the state is so admitted and its officers are elected and qualified, the county and territorial officers, including the delegate in congress, shall continue to discharge the duties of their respectve offices.

The said state when so admitted shall constitute one judicial district for the United States courts, and the circuit and district courts of said district shall be held at Santa Fe twice in each year, and said court shall be attached to the eighth judicial circuit of the United States. Said circuit, district and state courts shall be the successors of the district and supreme courts of said territory; and all cases pending at the time of the admission of the said state in any of the courts of said territory, which, if they had begun in a state, would be such as to be heard and decided in a federal court, shall be transferred to the proper United States court for said teritory, and all cases not so transferred shall be heard and decided in the proper courts of the state. 
