
## PORTALES IS MARCHING FORWARD IN BUILDING!

The Irrigation Plant Being Put Into Readiness for Use in May...Officials and Experts in Portales...More Building Enterprises Launched This Week.

#### IRRIGATION OFFICIALS HERE.

All the main construction officials of the Westinghouse Engine & Electric Co. of Pittsburg Pa. have arrived in Portales to help on the speedy and accurate installation of the first 5000 acre unit of our irrigation plant. These gentlemen include Ward S. Arnold of Chicago who is the gas producer expert for Westinghouse people and who has made two previous visits to Portales, helping and overseeing the final test of our water supply and other important things. Then we have W. G. McConnon, who doesn't deny being the Scotch-Irish man that his name indicates and who is an expert along the line electrical engineering. He will oversee the installation of the electrical features of our plant which is one of the largest and most important parts of the plant now going in. Along with Mr. McConnon comes A. E. Van Deinse who is a traveling salesman for Westinghouse Company. Then, Mr. Pyles has been here since Sunday and has charge of the engine department in particular. With all these experts on the ground at Portales and with the walls of the power house well nigh completed and with the good rains which enable our people to prepare the ground for the water, all things appear to be working out the speedy completion of the irrigation plant and a great crop for the farmers whose land will be ready for the water in May.

INVESTIGATING OUR IRRIGATION PLANT. W. E. Beall came in Sunday from Willard where the Western





Construction Co. is ready to install a pumping plant for irrigation similar to ours. Mr. Beall's mission to Portales was to see for himself how the plan of the Western Co. was working with us. After looking over our plant and over our country. Mr. Beall expressed himself as believing our plant was all and more than had been claimed for it. He will return shortly and help to push along the good work of installing a plant over there. Mr. Beall says that the best part of the shallow water area of Estancia Valley is at least 12x36 miles square and, therefore, quite as large as Portales Valley which is  $7\frac{1}{2}x50$  miles square.

MORE BUILDINGS LAUNCHED.

J. W. Tucker is the contractor for the new bungalow residence six miles west of Portales. This place has been bought by Virgil D. Randle of Greenville, Texas who is having a splendid home and other improvements built upon it.

The drawings for the R. M. Sanders building which will be erected shortly and which will close the gap between the Joyce-Pruit Co. and the C. V. Harris Co. buildings, have been accepted. The contract will be let some time this week by Mr. Sanders who has Fred Wagner as architect, and work will begin immediately.

The brick work of the Joyce-Pruit Co. building is going up, while the basement is receiving some finishing touches.

The W. I. Luikart residence is receiving the finishing touches and will be "a thing of beauty" and ready for occupancy by the end of the present week.

J. E. Dickson is building a splendid bungalow residence on his 320 acre homestead south of Portales next to the D. Z. ranch. Mr. Dickson is also installing a private pumping plant for irrigation on his place.

It is determined that the A. G. Monroe residence will be a seven room bungalow of concrete and stone with a pebble-dash finish.

In the Mimbres valley, an electric concern is extending its transmission lines out in every direction to enable the farmers to pump their water as cheaply for irrigation-with fifty cozy new farmhouses erected in the last few months. On the Las Vegas grant one of the biggest private irrigation enterprises in the country is being rushed. In the San Juan country immense reclamation systems are under way, they are building in a new transcontinental railway, and new farmers are coming in every day. Hundreds of thousands of actual money are being taken out of the mines in the south: an unending stream of coal is flowing out of Colfax county, new towns are springing up along the Pecos, and the development of the wilds of Socorro re flected in a big building boom at Magdalena, its shipping point has started on a big scale.

Over in the plains country they are planting twice as much

The board of commissioners of Chaves county have hit upon a novel yet simple plan of road making over the sands between the metropolis and some of the border villages. This plan will be watched with great interest to see what success will be made of the new project and if it brings the required results will probably be adopted by similar bodies who are put to the task of making roadways over the sands.



### **DRY FARMING** PROGRESS '09.

H. B. Henning, Secretary Territorial Board of Immigration Tells of Accomplishments of Conservationists.

The year 1909 has been the most important in the history of New Mexico, from the standpoint of development of agricultural resources. The year's development, has brought under cultivation not less than 200,000 acres of raw land, while approximately double that acreage has been laid out for cultivation during 1910. Of this very considerable total, about two thirds has been and will be dry farming land. Construction has begun on a number of important irrigation projects, which in the aggregate will reclaim many thousands of acres. These, however, are still in the development stage, while the dry farming lands are producing. Without any accurate statistics available as to actual yields it is difficult to give any very close estimate of what the year's development of dry farming lands has added to the permanent value and wealth production of the territory. The best method of securing such an estimate is to glance over the dry farming districts of the territory and see the development which has occurred in the centers of population, which exist because of the surrounding farms.



#### HOW TO HELP THE TOWN.

Some wise editor has written a code of instructions and rules to be followed by the man who wants his town and his fellow townsmen to prosper by the united efforts of the business men. The following are a set of commandments which have been going the rounds of some of the newspapers lately:

1. Thou shalt not go away from home to do thy shopping, nor thy sons nor thy daughters. 2. Thou shalt patronize thine own merchant, also the princer, and they shall patronize thee.



The best way to handle virgin sod is to plow carefully either fallor spring and then put the

land to immediate use, the exception being, persistent grasses and vegetation requiring constant cultivation to kill, but even such fields may be put into corn or other crops easy to cultivate. The best crops adapted to virgin sod are grains such as wheat and oats, or ninety day Indian corn. It has been said that Colorado is not a corn-growing country, but this idea may be dissipated as improved cultural methods are followed. Careful experiments seem to demonstrate that the effect of our cold nights is fairly compensated by a maximum of sunshine and that the altitude is overcome by extra good prices. The failures have occured thru attempting to grow corn accord ing to eastern methods. I have been experimenting with Indian corn for several years and in 1908 won special mention at the Nation al Corn Exposition at Omaha and in 1909, at the United States Land and Irrigation Exposition Portales Town Property Listed at Chicago. 

2nd. For installations of open molding or conduit wiring, first ten outlets or part, \$1.00, subsequent outlets 2.1.2 cents each.

3rd. For installations of motors, minimum, \$1.00, each motor above one 25 cents

4th. For installations of signs of fixtures, first 25 lights or fraction, \$1.00, subsequent lights, 1 cent each.

5th. Minimum charge for any inspection, \$1.00.

6th. For each re-inspection made necessary by faulty con tive audience.
