They denied to the people of the several precincts the right to elect their own precinct chairman and ordered the appointees of the convention combine to go down to their several precincts and take charge for the next two years and run the democratic party according to the machine, whether the people wanted them or not! Now there it is, -a bold brazen despotic hand of the machine, denying and defying the people. In God's name, have we come to that? Yes, and there is just one way to escape it, -on the last Saturday in July when you hold your precinct mass meeting, defy the machine and elect your own precinct committeemen-a man who is the choice of your community-elect him openly; then elect your delegate to the county convention; instruct him to vote against these machine men first, last and all the time. Do that and Roosevelt county is free; fail to do it and you are but helping the machine in its despotic defiance of the people's right to rule.

The Herald's Position

The Herald wants every voter in Roosevelt county to know our position on the present campaign for the nominating of our three delegates

1. We have no war to make on any man personally or any set of men; personally nor are we out in an effort to boost certain candidates,-we propose to leave this last duty to the people and the candidates themselves.

2. But we are opposed to three or four men getting together and making a combine to get themselves nominated, and in order to carry out their scheme, running a convention scheme over the people and thus taking the nominations out of the hands of the people and putting it in the hands of forty delegates, and boldly coming out and saying that they have the nomination "cinched." That is not democracy; that is high-handed, despotic ring-rule; and we propose to fight it and to fight the men who are behind it.

3. We believe that each precinct ought to elect its own precinct Howell. committeemen to serve for the next two years, for the reason that the present cammitteemen (all but seven of them) are appointees selected by county chairmen C. M. Compton Jr. assisted by his father who is not only a candidate but the father of the convention scheme; and all these precinct committeemen were appointed as

temporary officers to arrange for the coming primary (or convention which has been substituted for the primary) and their work is now done. No set of men appointed by any county chairmen or otherwise have the right to install themselves on the people for two years or two hours without the consent of the people of the precincts. Let the different precincts, when they come together to select their delegates to the county convention, there and then elect their own precinct committeemen. Aren't you a free people? Haven't you the right to say who your precinct committeeman is to be?

4. We believe the people should fight this convention combine which was fathered by and is supporting Mr. C. M. Compton and Mr. W. A. Gillenwater from Portales and Mr. Jim Hall from Elida because other sections of the county have a right to have candidates. But we do not propose to tell the people whom to vote for, as we believe that there are worthy men who are free from the C. C. C. Co's. (that is, the Compton Convention Combine Co.) who can put their cases struct their delegates for these untrammelled American citizens. This is our position and we expect to contend for it.

What Do They Mean?

What does the convention combine mean by refusing the people of the different precincts the right to elect their own precinct chair. men? They say that it is because the primary was done away with. But who did away with the primary,—was it not this same convention combine? Suppose that two years from now, this same combine gets in the saddle and runs a convention over us again? When will the voters have another chance to elect the precinct chairmen of their own? "Two years after that," you say? That depends, Mr. Voter, on whether or not you have in meantime put down this convention combine and buried this despotic machine. 

ORDINANCE NO. 31.

An ordinance prohibiting the keeping of intoxicating liquors within the town limits of the town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico, with the intent to sell, barter, give away or otherwise dispose of same and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales. New Mexico.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep at any place of business, office, club room or hall or elsewhere excepting as hereinafter provided, within the corporate limits of the town of Portales, any intoxicating liquor of any kind with intent to sell, give or barter the same in violation of the provisions of ordinance No. 4 of the town of Portales, and possession of any such intoxicating liquor at any such place, within the corporate limits of the town of Portales by any person and the presence of such liquor upon such premises of any person shall be prima facie evidence of an intent to unlawfully dispose of such liquor by such person in violation of this ordinance and in violation of the provisions of said

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, or his bailee or agent, engaged in the business of a common carrier, to knowingly ship, transport or convey or hire or otherwise, any package of or package containing any spiritous, vinous, malted or fermented or other intoxicating liquor of any kind, from any point within the corporate limits of the town of Portales to any other point within the limits of said town, or to knowingly make delivery, in any manner whatsoever, of any such intoxicating liquor to any person, unless such package be so labeled on the outside cover thereof so as to plainly show the name of the consignee, the nature of the contents, and the quantity contained therein, and such person transporting, covneying or delivering intoxicating liquors as aforesaid shall keep a record of such transportation, showing the name of the consignee, the nature and quantity of such liquors and the date of delivery thereof which record shall be permanently preserved in a book kept for that purpose only, and shall be open to the inspec tion of any citizen of Portales during all business hours.

Section 3. That any liquid drink or beverage whatsoever containing any percentage whatever of any intoxicating, malt, vinous, mixed or fermented liquor shall be included and covered in the preceding sections of this ordinance although the same may be called "Mead," "Vi Vi-tone," "Hop-beer," "Hop-tea," or any other name whatsoever

Section 4. That upon the filing of a complaint or information by any person or persons, that intoxicating liquors are kept upon the premises and described in such complaint, by the person named in the complaint, with intent to violate the provisions of this ordinance, a warrant shall be issued by the Justice of the Peace or the Police Judge of the town of Portales, commanding the town Marshal of the said town to arrest the person or persons charged or described as keeper or keepers of such premises and to search the premises described in such complaint or information and to seize and to take into custody all intoxicating liquors found in or upon such premises and safely keep the same subject to the order of the court. Such complaint or information shall describe the place to be searched with such particularity as will identify the same and shall describe the intoxicating liquors alleged to be on such premises as particularly practicable; but not any description, however general, that will enable the officer executing the warrant to identify the property to be seized shall be sufficient but no such complaint or information as herein provided shall be made, except the person or persons making same shall have information or evidence which leads him or them to believe that intoxicants are kept upon the premises in violation of this ordinance.

Upon return of the warrant and the trial of the cause upon such complaint the Justice of the Peace or Police Judge shall determine the cause as provided by this ordinance and according to law and shall, when such liquor is seized upon such warrant, if he finds upon trial of the cause that such liquors were kept upon such premises as charged in the information or complaint, order that the same be destroyed.

Section 5. The term "person" as used in this ordinance shall mean all natural persons, corporations, firms, partnerships, associations, and all joint stock companies whatsoever.

Section 6. Before any license shall be issued to registered druggists or pharmacists authorizing such druggists and pharma liquors within the town of Portales as provided in section 2, ordinance No. 4 of the town of Portales, he shall execute and deliver good and sufficient bond to the town of Portales in the sum of \$2,000.00 to be approved by the board, conditioned for the obser vance in good faith of all and every of the provisions of the said ordinance No. 4 as the same are applicable to registered druggists and pharmacists and upon conviction of the offense of violating any of the provisions of the said ordinance No. 4 relative to the sale of said liquors by registered druggists and pharmacists such bond shall be forfeited to the town and such registered druggists or pharmacists so offending shall in addition to the penalty of such bond and forfeiture and the penalties following therewith, be forever prohibited frem selling or dispensing liquor under and by suthority of said ordinance No. 4 and further upon his conviction of such offense the license issued to him as herein and in said ordinance No. 4 provided, shall be forfeited and become and be of no

Section 7- Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or who shall fail to comply with any of the provis ions thereof shall be deemed guilty of an offense against the town of Portales and upon the conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not under \$25.00 nor exceeding \$100.00 or by imprisonment during not under 10 days nor exceeding 30 days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the cause.

Section 8. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect up on and after its passage and due and lawful publication and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby

SOME TIMELY BREVITIES

This is such a free country that anyone who wishes to can act a fool, but all who are disposed to do the acting will do well to remember that there is a big expense account attached thereto and in value annually. Yet there are numerous mining regions that they themselves will have to foot the bill.

A man who is willing to damage any good interest in his town for the sake of making money is pronouncedly one of Mr. Roose velt's undesirable citizens. Undoubtedly the room of such a man would be worth infinitely more than his company.

Presumably it has always been a question among right thinkcists to buy and sell intoxicating, malt, vinous, mixed or fermented ing people how far a man can go wrong morally and be entitled to their respect. There is evidently a dead line somewhere, beyond which if a man or woman goes, all people are absolved from all obligation to them. Wise people will keep just as far away from this dead line as possible. The others will go right on over it and when in deep trouble will blate like dying calves.

> Young ladies are to be commended when they give themselves to reform work, but when they make up their minds that they want to keep house for a drinking man they had better let the contract take effect after the work of reformation is completed.

Not every man who says he wants to help build up his town really helps in the matter. His ideas may run on a down grade plan. For example, any man who thinks the condoning of immoralties helps in the building of a great town or city really stands for disintegrating forces in social and business life.

The man who is willing to graft on the moral, social and business life of a town, defenseless immoralities is by no stretch of language a constructionist but he is a destructionist, working right at the heart of the community life.

The voter ought never to cast his ballot for any man for official position when he would not sit down and give deliberately written recommendation. If every man who votes were to become by his ballot, the bondsman for the man he votes for, much of the reckless voting now-a-days would be at an end.

Every officer who means to do his duty and not commit the rime of perjury has a clear-right to the support of every law abiding citizen in his community. Law breakers are always organized for the purpose of resisting officials and law abiding citizens ought to stand together right behind their conscientous and faithful officers. Officers often fail because they have not the support of law abiding citizens. Such things are a reproach to the citizenship of any community.

SOME THINGS ABOUT NEW MEXICO

New Mexico has an area of 122,469 squre miles, being large than the Kingdom of Italy, or than any State in the Un with the exceptions of Texas, California and Montana. In 1900 less than 250,000 acres of this vast area were under cultivation and that mostly in forage crops. The rapidity of recent proress may be judged from the fact that at the beginning of 1900 there were 2,500,000 acres under cultivation, and this year there will probably be nearer 5,000,000 acres. The public and private irrigation works now under construction will cost \$10,000,000. and will reclaim half a million acres of arid land. Of the 40,000 com acres of vacant public lands, it is estimated that at least 18,000.000 acres can profitably be dry farmed. Although regarded as a deal ert region, the territory has within its borders 7,000,000 acres of national forests. Possibly half of these consists of land that no stretch of the imagination can denominate forest land; but the are at least 8,000,000 acres of standing timber an area greater than that of Massachusetts, New Jersey, Vermont or Virginia, and three times as large as Connecticut.

The discovery that vast areas of the Southwest, heretofore regarded as useful only for grazing, and not very valuable even for that, may be farmed with profit, has led to a remarkable influx of settlers. Within the past two and a half years, nearly 45,000 entrymen have filed homestead entries upon 6,500,000 acres of the public lands, adding not far from 200,000 to the population. When the census of 1900 was taken, the population of New Mexico was only 195,000. It now certainly exceeds 450,000, and by some is estimated at half a million; and the present census will show it to have outdistanced Delaware, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Utah, Vermont and Wyoming, and to be closely crowding Florida, South Dakota and several other states. Of the entire population, not more than 20 per cent is of Spanish descent, and less than 10 per cent is unable to speak English. The territory expends \$1,000,000 a year, or one-half its income from taxes, for educational purposes.

EQUIPMENT FOR STATEHOOD.

It is claimed that more new postoffices were opened in New Mexico, during 1908, than in any State. The territory now has 125 newspapers, seventy banks, a university, an agricultural college, a military school, two normal schools, a school of mines, a blind asylum, deaf and dumb asylum, miners' hospital, reform school, asylum for the insane and other charitable institutions supported by the territory.

It is as an agricultural commonwealth, that New Mexico is destined to make its most important contributions to the wealth of the nation. The Rio Grande is sometimes called the American Nile, with particular reference to the fertility of the soil of its valley. Numerous irrigation projects are rapidly increasing the area to which intensive farming methods may be applied. One of these is the Elephant Buttes project, of the National Reclamation Service, which will provide water for 180,000 acres. An important private project is practically completed at Bluewater, and numerous others are under way. The chief agricultural products are alfalfa and other forage crops, corn wheat, vegetables, fruits, oats, beans, potatoes, peas, barley and sugar beets.

Next to agriculture, the territory's greatest source of wealth is stock raising. There are now on the ranges not less than 5,500,000 sheep, 1,000,000 head of cattle, 200,000 goats, and 200,000

horses, mules and donkeys.

New Mexico ranks as the oldest mining region in the United States, operations of this kind dating back to the early days of the Spanish occupation. The relative importance of the territory producer of gold and silver declined with the value of silver, until its present output of the precious metals barely exceeds \$500,000 require nothing but capital to develop them into important producers. The territory is traversed by the same mountain systems that are so highly mineralized in Colorado, Arizona and Northern Mexico, so that it is only reasonable to believe that systematic development will prove it to be rich in gold and silver as any of its neighbors. It produces ten million pounds of copper, four million pounds of lead, and half a million dollars' worth of sinc annually, with the mining of those metals not developed to a tenth of its possibilities. It has a thousand square miles of gypsum deposits. saline lakes whose shores are covered with thousands of tons of salt, mountains of iron ore, and the greatest deposits of alum and mica known to exist. Its production of turquoise is limited only by the demand, peridots, garnets, emeralds, sapphires, tourmsline, opals and other precious and semi-precious stones have been

However, the most important mineral resource of the territory is coal—anthracite, bituminus and lignite. According to the latest investigations of the Geological Survey, there are at least 8,584,000 acres of coal land, estimated to contain one hundred and sixty-four billions of tons of coal in workable seams—a natural resource of inconceivable value.—National Monthly.
