DEMOCRATS IN CONVENTION.

The Official Minutes of the Delegate Convention Held in Portales, August 6, as Recorded by Secretary Steele

The convention was called to order at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of August 6th in the courthouse, Portales, N. M. by county chairman, C. M. Compton Jr. who stated the object of the meeting and called for nominations for temporary chairman. Dr. Evans of Elida and A. B. Seay of Portales were put in nomination, but before calling the roll for the vote, the secretary ascertained that all voting boxes in the county were under contest, so that it was first necessary to pass a motion to withdraw all contests save that on the La Lande box, which was done, and the vote being taken by roll call and only those boxes not contested participating, resulted in the election of A. B. Seay of Portales, the vote standing 21 for A. B. Seay and 18 for Dr. Evans. The chair declared A. B. Seay elected and called for nominations for secretary. T. S. North of Nobe and I. L. Steele of Perry School House were nominated, the vote standing 21 for Mr. Steele and 18 for Mr. North, whereupon the chair declared Mr. Steele duly elected and asked the temporary officers thus elected to take charge of the work of the convention. Chairman A. B. Seay, after thanking the delegates for the honor conferred upon him, took up the business of the convention. A motion, duly seconded, passed and carried, appointing Messrs. Coe Howard of Portales, J. W. Douglass of Midway and F. S. North of Nobe as committee on credentials. A motion was made and carried that a committee of three be appointed on

rules and order of business. Messrs. W. T. Wade of Taiban, E. P. Williams of Inez and J. B. Priddy of Portales were appointed on this committee. By motion, a committee of three, consisting of H. F. Jones of Portales, Dr. Evans of Elida and Horace Hawkins of Painter, were appointed as committee on platform and resolutions. By motion, convention then adjourned for work of committees appointed, subject to call of the chairman.

EVENING SESSION.
House called to order by chairman about eight o'clock. Committee on platform and resolutions made report which was read and adopted, the committee being discharged. Committee on rules and order of business next reported. A motion intending to strike out article four of this report was lost, after which, by a vote of 21 to 18, the report as a whole was adopted. By motion, it was determined that the convention should vote by roll-call. A motion carried that all proxies be filed with the secretary Saturday night. After some further delay and in the midst of considerable confusion, the credential's committee announced that it was ready to make a unanimous report, which report was then heard and recommended the seating of J. O. Wood as the proper delegate from La Lande and that Dereño box was without proper representation, otherwise that all delegates and proxies be seated. On motion, the report was adopted and the committee discharged. A motion to dispense with the convention and ask all candidates to make the race subject to the general election Sept. 6th was made and discussed and then withdrawn, the discussion growing very dramatic, heated and personal. The convention then adjourned to reassemble at ten o'clock Monday, August 8th.

MONDAY'S SESSION.
House called to order by chair-

man A. B. Seay. After some remarks by Judge McGill, F. S. North, Flue Anderson and Walter Brandon were appointed tellers. The following proxies were then presented: viz—Charlotte by C. M. Compton Jr., Taiban by Dr. Evans, Minco by J. C. Compton, Floyd by J. E. Morrison, Ingram by J. H. Martin. Of these proxies the secretary informed the chair that Ingram and Minco proxies were filed Saturday night while the three others were filed since, whereupon the chair, in accordance with the motion passed by unanimous vote Saturday night, ruled these last three proxies out. Meantime, Simon Lane came into the convention, so that the ruling of the chair affected only the boxes of Taiban and Charlotte.

THE C. C. C. BOLT.
Upon this ruling of the chair and without having recourse to a motion to rescind the motion Saturday night, and without appealing from the decision of the chair, seventeen delegates, along with Messrs. Compton and Hall and their followers, bolted the convention.

The next order of business was the nomination of candidates. G. L. Reese of Portales, W. W. Van Winkle of Rogers, and W. R. McGill of La Lande were put in nomination by H. F. Jones of Portales. Attorney T. E. Mears of Portales was nominated by E. P. Williams of Inez; Jim Hall of Elida, J. M. Jolly of Taiban were nominated by Roy Gore of Upton. The convention then recessed for several minutes, and on being reconvened, the names of Messrs. Hall and Jolly were withdrawn and the convention proceeded to vote on the three to be nominated. On the first ballot 22 votes were cast, W. R. McGill receiving 21 votes, T. E. Mears 9, G. L. Reese 19, W. W. Van Winkle 17. A motion was then made and passed that the convention proceed to ballot until three candidates should be selected who should receive a majority of all the votes of all the delegates in the county. In accordance with this motion, the chair declared W. R. McGill duly nominated on the first ballot. Balloting continued until the 13th ballot had been cast which stood as follows; Reese 17, Van Winkle 20 and Mears 7. Van Winkle was accordingly declared nominated. After the 20th vote the convention again recessed for a few minutes after which balloting was resumed and continued to the 28th ballot which stood as follows; Reese 21 and Mears 1. Reese was accordingly declared nominated.

NEW ORGANIZATION PERFECTED.
The next order of business was the election of A. B. Seay as county chairman of the democratic party and Walter Brandon as secretary, after which the newly elected precinct chairmen were enrolled by secretary Brandon. Remarks were then made by Messrs. McGill, Reese and Mears. The convention then adjourned.

TOWN POWER PLANT NEARING COMPLETION.

What will be one of the hand-somest, most substantial and complete town power plants in the West is being brought to completion for the light, water and sewer systems of Portales. Deferring a complete description until the plant has been completed, we are glad to announce that all the outside work except about 360 feet of sewer pipe has been installed complete. The brick-masons have closed the openings left for installing the machinery. The gas-producers are installed and ready for use. The big elevated tank is being filled preparatory to starting one of the two big 100 horse-power engines which is also installed and ready for use. Besides, the switch-boards and dynamoes for the light plant have been set up. The second engine is now on the concrete foundation, and it looks to an outsider that two weeks work would be ample time in which to complete the plant and have it ready to operate.

BAPTIST SERVICES.

Pastor E. P. Alldredge left Wednesday for Lake Arthur where he attended the Pecos Valley Association. He returns tomorrow or Saturday and will fill his pulpit Sunday morning and night. Sunday school at 10 a. m. Every one is invited to these services.

VINEYARDS IN PORTALES VALLEY.

Mr. Rowell, out three miles north of town, has a living demonstration in this line of what can be done without irrigation. While a dozen other farmers have splendid showings of what can be done here by means of windmills. Among others here in town, we call attention to the garden spot of Joe Howard who brought in a sample of his grapes this week to the Herald office; also to the garden of J. B. Priddy, a sample of the grapes from which the editor was presented with this week. Mr. Roberts and others in the county, too numerous to mention, have succeeded beyond their hopes or efforts. Why may not all the farmers profit by planting a vineyard?

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

In the midst of the heaviest down-pours of rain this immediate vicinity has witnessed within two years, the past Monday after noon late, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Huffine, who live one and a half miles south east of Portales, who had left her grand mother's home, and was riding to her own home was instantly killed by lightning, as was also the horse she was riding and what was even more pathetic, the mother supposed the little daughter had remained for the night with her grandmother while her grandmother felt equally sure that the little one reached home safely, and neither the mother nor the grandmother knew of the child's death, until J. W. Williams came along early next morning and found the child and the horse dead in the road with the unmistakable signs of a fatal stroke of lightning upon them. Mr. Huffine was not at home at the time. The whole community sorrows with loved ones in there great loss.


GRADING THE STREETS

A half dozen or more teams were set to work Monday morning upon the streets of the town square and will continue the work of grading until they present at least a passable appearance. This work has been made an immediate necessity on account of the excavations made in putting in the water mains and the city dads hit upon the plan of applying the road tax fund to this purpose. Sheriff R. A. Bain and Deputy C. T. Duncan have very generously agreed to donate their services in supervising the work and operations will be pushed as the fund accumulates. Mr. Bain said to a Herald reporter that every male person eligible to road duty will be given the opportunity to either put in the assessment in work upon the streets or else pay \$3.00 and have the work done by some one else. This is a laudable enterprise and no man should want to shirk his duty in the matter.

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The Herald is not anticipating the ruffe of a single feather of the democratic rooster in making the prediction that as far as Roosevelt county democrats are concerned there will never be another convention held for the purpose of nominating candidates to elective offices. In the light of the events of the past week it has been amply demonstrated that the C. C. C. & Co., don't want any more of 'em and as far as the contingent of the party who have held out first and last for a primary are concerned they have never wanted a convention, though the latter were compelled by the former to make nominations of candidates for the constitutional convention by the convention method. So then it may safely be said that the democratic party in this county has been purged of the convention evil—though as by fire. It means a better day in the county politics.

The C. C. C. Beaten and Bolted.

No more crucial time ever came to the democrats of Roosevelt county than the present. A faction in the party, after installing the corruptions of a convention combine upon the people and then finding themselves defeated by the very convention they created, bolted the party last Monday and went out and set up independently. So that we not only have the regular democratic nominees in the field, including Wm. R. McGill of La Lande, G. L. Reese of Portales and W. W. Van Winkle of Rogers, but a bolting independent ticket, besides a regular socialist ticket, and now a regular republican ticket.

Rumors, hints and even declarations were made early last week, before the convention met, that unless the convention favored those who run it over the people instead of the primary, that at least one of the C. C. C. & Co.'s candidates would bolt and "run it out at the polls." Then later on in the forenoon of Saturday, before the convention was called, it began to look like the C. C. C. & Co. had lost the battle. Accordingly, it was arranged to put a sufficient number of contests on the delegates known to oppose the C. C. C. & Co. as would enable this political octopus to get control of the convention, install their own chairman and credential's committee and seat a sufficient number of the contesting delegates to nominate their candidates on the first ballot. For this reason and this reason only, they determined to put Portales and other boxes opposed to them under contest. But their game was overheard and leaked out and as soon as contests could be made out, all their own boxes were put under contest, which brought the convention to a standstill at once, as not one vote could be taken. Upon this, and when it had time to "soak in," that the other side was on to and had blocked their desperate and high-handed methods, Judge H. F. Jones moved that all contests be withdrawn save that of La Lande—which was the only one having even a suggestion of fairness in it. This motion passed and with it the first crucial moment of the convention; for by a vote of 21 to 18 the C. C. C. & Co. lost the organization of the convention and also the coveted power of appointing the credentials committee.

REPORT OF CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE.

Next after electing A. B. Seay of Portales chairman of the convention and I. L. Steele of Perry School House secretary, was the appointment of a credentials committee, a committee on platform and resolutions. This occupied but a few minutes when adjournment was taken to allow the committees time to prepare their reports. On coming together again at eight o'clock in the evening all committees were ready to report save the credentials committee. The report of the committee on platform and resolutions was read and adopted, when the second clash came over the adoption of the report of the committee on rules and order of business. A stipulation in this report requiring a two thirds vote in appealing from the decision of the chair was believed to be the "bug under the chip" and was fought strenuously by the C. C. C. & Co. but finally passed. No report coming from the credentials committee but some suggestions unfavorable to the C. C. C. & Co., certain defeat began to appear altogether too evident to them to be comfortable, and accordingly the great head of the convention combine arose and plead for the setting aside of the convention and allowing all candidates to "run it out at the polls September 6th." This suggestion was erroneously taken to mean the adoption of the primary which the people have wanted all the while, and there was almost a stampede toward adopting the suggestion. It was left for Judge McGill to expose this daring attempt to bring defeat to the party. Attorney T. E. Mears also spoke against it as did Mr. Hall of Elida who preferred defeat, he said, to the adoption of this scheme which was certain to mean the election of one republican. In the midst of the clamor, the announcement was made that the credentials committee was ready with a unanimous report. This report was then heard. It recommended the seating of J. O. Wood as regular delegate from La Lande and declared Dereno without proper representation. This report was adopted with but few dissenting votes—though it struck a death knell to the hopes of the C. C. C. & Co. A motion was then made that all proxies be handed in Saturday night, and the convention adjourned to reconvene Monday at one o'clock.

THE FINAL CLASH

Charges of unfairness and more rumors of bolting came thick and fast Sunday and Monday morning; and there were unmistakable signs of a pre-concerted plan on the part of the C. C. C. & Co., to bolt on the first provocation. This came when the proxies of Floyd, Charlotte and Taiban were filed with the secretary upon roll-call and in defiance of the motion unanimously passed at the session Saturday night asking all proxies to be filed Saturday night. These the chair ruled out, though the delegate from Floyd came in at the last minute, so that the ruling affected only Taiban and Charlotte, the proxies of Minco and Ingram having been filed Saturday night. Upon the decision of the chair and without having recourse even to a motion to rescind the motion passed Saturday night, the C. C. C. & Co., repudiated the convention which they had by all sorts of methods, installed upon the people and got up and walked out, carrying with them 17 delegates or proxies and leaving

22 in the convention proper. We heard that they gathered in the Citizens National Bank building and nominated the self-appointed candidates of long standing, denounced the Herald and all creation opposed to the C. C. C. & Co., and went away rejoicing that whether they got elected or not they have the satisfaction of having installed a convention upon the people, then when defeat appeared certain, repudiated it and went out to run independently and make it possible, if not absolutely certain, that the party will be split from end to end and a republican elected.

WHAT IT MEANS

Now what does this bolting of the convention mean? It means that certain men believe that they ought to have the nominations, regardless of what the people think or plan, and therefore that it is perfectly justifiable in them to get together and hatch out the scheme of this convention combine and by all sorts of methods run the convention scheme over the people; and then, when it is certain that they are going to be defeated by the very convention they installed upon the people, they believe that they have the right to bolt their own convention and go out and set up independently and thus split the democratic party all to pieces and make it certain that at least one republican will be elected. Is it right? Is it fair? Is it democratic? Will the democrats of Roosevelt county support such high-handed and ruinous methods? Can any good come of it? Can any good democrat afford to aid these men in splitting his party wide open and bringing it down in the dust of defeat?

From the Missouri to the Pacific is the land of alfalfa. It spreads the dominion of possible homes. It builds houses of comfort and great barns. It is the fortune's purse of modern agriculture. It sends Sam to college and Mary to the Normal school. It helps mother in a hundred ways and puts a flash of independence if not imprudence in dad's eyes.

It relieves the tension of unending toil, pays the mortgage, improves the stock, adds to the returns from the stockyards and creamery, makes the farmer a depositor, not a debtor in the bank, buys automobiles and pianos for the family, links the farm houses by telephone with neighbors and the world. What the Bessemer patent was to iron industry thirty years ago, alfalfa promises to be to the western farmer.
