
A. G. Trout has moved his insurance office into the east corner building of the Howard Block and is now a near neighbor of the Herald.



There were about 2600 acres of seed crop near Carlsbad last year and every pound of the seed sold as soon as threshed. The highest yield at Carlsbad was 792 pounds of the 2600 acres ran 250 pounds. In every instance the small yields were due to late planting.


