



AGED INVENTOR'S SUCCESS

The people who declare that a man has outlived his usefulness when he attains the age of sixty years and should be put out of his misery with a dose of chloroform, will have to ex-tend the limit if they wish to make a hit with the residents of San Jose, Cal., since it has become known that George Gates, a strangling seventy-year-old inventor of that city, will become a multi-millionaire through the sale to a syndicate of eleven of the greatest railway systems of the United States, of his patent rights in a con-crete railroad tie which he has in-vented. The price to be paid for the new tie is \$17.500.000. Gates has been working on the con-

crete tie for about ten years. He cast thousands and thousands of concrete ties in those years and was not disheartened when they failed to stand tests and crumbled and cracked under the vibration of heavy traffic.

One day about two years ago Gates

was leaning against a barbed wire fence. His measur funds were about good and he was almost ready to give up, but the barb wires suggested a means whereby he could reinforce the concrete. "I will just cast some of these barbed wires in the concrete." It was a happy idea, and one that afterward proved to be worth millions.

Ties were cast with barbed-wire strands running lengthwise. Tests showed that 36 strands twisted in a certain manner obtained the best results. A tie thus made will spring 1% inches and come back to line. And a single machine will turn out the ties at the rate of 3,500 per day.

Gates, who was born in Ottumwa, lowa, lives in a modest cottage in Ban Jose, Cal. He is a small, spare and unassuming. He presents the appearance of a typical Yankee workingman, and because he is out much in the air he is sunburned and does not look over sixty years of age.

An investigation of problems connected with the feeding of the Wisconsin College of Agriculture dairy herd, which has been conducted during the past nine years, furnishes additional evidence with regard to the proper protein supply of rations for dairy cows on Wisconsin farms and in other northwestern states. This investigation and practical feeding experience in this country have shown that a nutritive ration of 1:6 or even 1:7, which is wider than that of 1:5.4 recommended by the German investigators, can be used successfully. The teachings of many carefully planned and conducted experiments and the evperience of dairy farmers who have paid special attention to the question of the relative economy of the different kinds of feeds under their particular conditions indicate that a medium wide nutritive ratio is, in general, to be preferred under conditions of dairying in the northwest.

Medium Protein Rations Best.


This investigation mentioned above showed conclusively that the medium protein rations were more economical and produced better results than the high protein rations.
