The second election found two tickets in the field both claiming to be for prohibition, the one agreeing to resubmit the prohibition issue later. This last named ticket won, but the prohibition issue was never re-submitted, partly because some or all of the individuals composing this ticket had declared personally before their election that they would not re-submit the matter. Then it was known that the re-subnission proposition could in no wise be either legal or binding art—of the community had not and would not agree to it. An important Realty Deal

One of the most important realty deals on a small scale, which has ever been consummated in Portales Valley was the purchasing of a half interest in the Morgan orchard, eleven miles southwest of town, Tuesday. The parties to this purchase are W. A. Nicholas and Dr. T. E. Livingston. Of course Mr. Morgan will still have charge of this most splendid orchard; but a new regime will be immediate ly inaugurated in its manage ment. For example, yesterday, after the purchase, we understand that the surveyor went out and located the place for the well. And that the well driller is to follow immediately and sink a large well to a depth of 300 feet with a view of striking the large semi-artesian strata en countered on the Jno. R. Hop per place near town on the same side of the Valley and which rises near the surface of the ground. Then, it is planned to at once instal a private pumping plant which will water the entire 160 acres. Next year, moreover, the orchard will be thoroughly equipped with smudge pots. In short these men believe that in one more year they will have an orchard here which will do three things: yield magnificent dividends on their investment; demonstrate conclusively what every one here believes, viz: that no better soil or climate can be found anywhere for the growing of a real and bountifully yielding orchard, and present one of the best orchards in the United States right here in our community. May God speed your enterprise, gentlemen. If Dr. Livingston will bring the rest of the Nicholas family to Portales Valley and a few more men as progressive as they are, we will be able to demonstrate soon what we mean when we speak of the "Big Four of Portales Valley," Alfalfa, Sugar Beets, Fruit and Berries, and last but not least, the Market Garden.





creased. Even in this case, however the addition of succulent clover or alfalfa hay is beneficial. Root crops play an important role in the dietary of poultry. Mangels may be fed entire once a day in troughs. Cabbages are best fed by suspending them by cords to keep them clean. An additional advantage is obtained here through the extra exercise necessary for the fowl to secure the feed. Where available sprouted oats can be fed. Carrots in small amounts are very palatable and tempting to the flock. Clover chaff can be fed wet or dry and is a very economical egg producer. Begin to feed the green stuff and mangles as early in the autumn as pos-Clover Good for Poultry.

Steaming clover hay increases 'its palatability greatly. If free from long fiber, clover is an excellent feed to mix with bran, table scraps, or with a regular mash. A convenient way of handling the poultry flock is to thoroughly bed down the house with straw in the fall and then to add a forkful of clover or alfalfa hay every day until the litter begins to get dirty. The house should then be cleaned, the straw replaced by clean litter, and the daily forkful of clover or alfalfa continued.

The importance of litter cannot be overestimated as a means of com-pelling the birds to exercise in obtaining their food. A generous allowance of corn mixed with the litter works out excellently for winter feed-

ing. Corn may be fed either shelled or on the ear-broken into small

It is of great importance that little grain be left in the litter over night so that the hens have some thing to eat immediately after leaving their perches in the early morning. This accounts for the generous allowance of grain which is absolutely nee essary in the litter. If no grain is left in the litter the birds should receive their first feed by daylight for best returns. A very detrimental practise on the general farm is to finish all the morning chores before feeding the poultry. The hens as a result remain on their perches too long, so no in-centive urges them to get down and exercise. This common mistake is one of the fundamental errors which results in a diminished egg produc

Grit for the flock should be fur nished by putting a load of gravel in the house each year. Oyster shell should also be constantly accessible for the flock. It may be placed in an inexpensive hopper where the birds can easily reach it. Charcoal is another article of indispensable value around the poultry house. Clean, pure water in sanitary dishes should al-ways be available for the fowls.

Feed a Generous Ration.

An essential factor in poultry feeding is to furnish a liberal, correctly balanced, fattening and growing ra-tion. To merely supply the flock with a maintenance ration is not sufficient Besides maintaining bodily vigor and health the hen must produce eggs and on this account requires an amount of feed in excess of that required for mere maintenance. Where a well balanced ration is supplied in abundance, and where the flock have plenty of excess the birds will not become excess. ercise, the birds will not become over on feed of a light, well-scattered wet fat, but will maintain good thrift and will produce a quantity of good qual-



Aid in Cholera Precautions



W ASHINGTON.—Dr. William R. Rucker of the public health and marine hospital service, recently left Ellis island for Boston to confer with Commissioner of Immigration George B. Billings, the port medical staff and officials of the state board of health regarding the new and comprehensive plan for guarding the United States against possible danger from cholera, suspects coming from Russia and Italy. This plan contemplates a surveillance of immigrants from the infected districts to their final destina-tion in the United States, even though it be in a remote settlement of the west. Surgeon General Walter Wy-man and his officers have worked days and nights perfecting the details and now believe that with the co-operation of state and municipal health authorities which they request, a cholera epidemic in the United States would be practically impos-

The bureau has prepared a blank for the use of the inspectors whereby a simple system of checking and the writing in of the name of the immigrant and the town, street and number to which he is going will make a complete record of his origin and

The state health official in return will be requested to mail the cards to the local boards of health. The theory is that should a case of cholera break out the local officials would immediately be able to identify it and take prompt measures, should the records show that the place harbored persons coming from a cholera infested district.

TREASURY clerks were thrown into a panic the other day by the publication in a local paper of a story describing in alarming detail how Prederick A. Cleveland, the business expert, has been whissing through the department of late, discovering inefficiency right and left and recom-mending discharges and salary reduc-tions at a wholesale rate. Not only on their own account, but on that of their relatives and friends throughout

The Portales Ball team played


