Cleanliness and Health

All very well to say "swat the fly," but the pesky insect is too artful to be swatted. Much better is it, therefore, to remove the filth and to use screens. Even children who can neither read nor write know flies transmit filth. Why, then, should not educated and refined persons take steps to eliminate the fly and thus insure both cleanliness and comfort?

Among the other cities which have been awakened to the necessity of getting rid of flies is Atlanta, Ga. The press of that stirring city is demanding that of the future. Atlanta be made flyless.

During the past two years the Georgia metropolis has made rapid progress in improving sanitary conditions. All earth closets-health menances-have been abolished.

According to the Constitution the rapidity with which Atlanta has cleaned up amounts to almost a revolution, and all because the campaign for cleanliness was carried on with intelligence and aggressiveness, and the mayor and other officials co-operated with the citizens.

The Atlanta law requires that all garbage be inclosed. It also requires the screening of food offered for sale. This law is being rigidly enforced, as it should be. Its observance means less sickness and a lower death rate. It means economy and comfort and happiness. We need something of that sort in Albuquerque-cooperation of city authorities and citizens in a determined effort to preserve the public health by eliminating the mosquito and the housefly and all disease-bearing insects and vermin.—Albuquerque Journal.



cial season is in full swing and the big balls, the official receptions and state dinners at the White House now follow one another in bewildering

A tradition, well-nigh as old as the republic itself, prescribes the four official receptions at the White House of which the first is given for the diplomatic corps, the second for the Supreme court, the third for the members of congress and the last for the officers of the army and navy. During President Taft's incumbency of the White House these receptions have acquired a significance which they have lacked for many years. By limiting the number of invitations and endeavoring to avoid asking the same persons twice, the receptions have been made more enjoyable and also far more brilliant.

State dinners at the White House follow the same order as the receptions, the first being given for the diplomatic corps. President and Mrs. Taft will this season add one dinner, and the reception to congress will be

of the house, a custom which will likely be accepted as a precedent hereafter. Each member of the cabinet, beginning with the premier, the secretary of state, and following in order of precedence gives a dinner for the President and Mrs. Taft. These dinners will be on Thursdays during the season. Previous to the Roosevelt regime the guests at the cabinet dinners were limited to the President and his wife and the cabinet members and their wives. Meeting the same small set of persons nine times during every winter proved a bit dull for all the guests, and when Mrs. Roosevelt signified that she would be glad if each cabinet hostess should ask whomever she chose when dining the President, there was general rejoicing. "At home" days of the women of the

official circle are also regulated by precedent. Society, for instance, has long accepted Wednesday as the day on which calls shall be made upon the wife of the vice-president the wives of the cabinet members and at the home of the speaker of the house of representatives. New Insecticide Law Now in Effect



THE insecticide act of 1910 is now in effect and joint regulations for its enforcement have been issued by the secretaries of the treasury, of asriculture and of commerce and labor. The act forbids the manufacture or sale in federal territory of adulterated or misbranded insecticides and fungicides, especially mentioning Paris green and lead arsenate. It also forbids interstate shipment of such articles and this is its most important

Under the regulations samples of insecticides and fungicides are to be collected by purchase by agents of the United States department of agriretary of agriculture may designate. If a sample then appears to be adulterated or misbranded a private hearsentative will be given to the party from whom the sample was obtained and to others interested who may appear personally or by attorney and may submit oral or written evidence. been violated the proper United States | 1910.

Provision is made for state officials to co-operate in reportine; violations to the secretary of agriculture.

Paris green is adulterated if it does not contain at least 50 per cent, of arsenious oxide; on the other hand it uble forms equivalent to more than 31/2 per cent. of arsenious oxide; and no substance may be mixed with it so as to lower its strength. Lead arsenate is counted adulter

ated if it contains more than 50 per cent. of water, or if its total arsenic is equivalent to less than 121/2 per arsenic in water soluble forms equivalent to more than .75 of a per cent. of arsenic oxide, or if any substance is mixed with it so as to lower its
