

The Portales Valley and Its Makers ITS FACTORS AND FORCES

Thus far the sketches under this heading have been confined those engaged in commerce as well as in agricultural pursuits nd, while these industries are absolutely indispensible and insepa able in our system of political economy, yet, we believe also that the professions occupy anything but a secondary place of importance the body politic. And, in this connection, it may be well to state at the profession of law is, by far, the most important branch of government and, also the one, apparently, least appreciated by se who have the most need of its protection in the peaceable pos ision of their goods and chattels but, also, by those who have hrough its intricacies and its technicalities, escaped many just and erited rebukes.

The law, like all of our institutions, has many shortcomings. et it is, today, the most perfect of all the manufactures of human rency. It has been broadened in its scope and made more liberal and simple in its application in the same manner and to the same **xt**ent that our civilization has broadened and our institutions have elt the enlightenment of added wisdom and maturer judgment. Its dvancement has been co-extensive with the progress of mankind nd the multifarious necessities for its application in the adjudica on of human disagreements and, almost, universal inclination to et and to keep all that belongs to us and, also, some things which nghtfully belong to the other fellow.

So much for the law as a profession. We now come to the con ideration of the man who professes, or practices, the law, and right here is where your humble servant feels his inadequacy to the task ssigned. He believes that he is entirely competent to do almost ny old thing better and more thoroughly than the delineation of he character of the subject of this sketch. For something more than seven years has this writer enjoyed the friendship and condence of this splendidly endowed and highly exemplary disciple of the illustrious Blackstone, and never, during one minute, or one raction of a minute, of this time has he had cause to censure or reproach him for unfaithfulness to himself, to his friends or to his fellowmen.



comforts and pleasures of this life are usually annexed without comment and with hardly a thought to the forces and things which make their attainment possible, the vicissitudes of life and the added effort of endeavor are made the subjects of much palaver and more or less grumbling and fault finding yet, through all the trials and tribulations attendant upon the launching of an enterprise of the magnitude of the Portales Valley Irrigation project, Mr. Reese was ever the same affable, capable and earnest counselor and supporter giving freely of his time and his money to insure the success of the enterprise, And it has been and is, at this time, a success, thanks to the patriotism and unselfishness of our energetic citizenship.





In theory, small cities and big villages which are composed largely of the residences of men who do business and earn their living in a great urban center which carries along and sus ains these suburbs, ought to be models of good government. They should be very efficiently guarded, supplied with whatever necessaries local officials are expected to provide, and kept clean,

well paved, well regulated and contented. Such communities are not too big for

wide-awake citizens to watch their public business closely. They are free from many difficulties which great cities must face, in the nature of their industries and commercial interests and the mixed character of their population. In theory, the suburbs have all the better of such comparisons with their big neighbors

The practical tests of experience do not work out that way Suburbs are often full of troubles. They have more than their share of wrangling and bitterness and discontent, in politics and The man who makes a cloak of government. Often the local administration in such municipalities is costly extravagant and inefficient.

Necessity for City Parks.

"It is a sin boarding on a crime says a writer in Cassier's, "to continue to construct cities extending over miles of territory in dense forma tion, without incorporating effective means for cutting off the course of a conflagration after it has escaped ordinary bounds and restraint.

"Cities should be divided into sections not exceeding one mile square by parks and wide parkways. These will not only serve as fire barriers but will add greatly to the health. comfort and happiness of the people and the beauty of the city. This system provides a break in the continuity of the building mass, thus making it practically impossible for a conflagration to spread over miles of territory before checked.

"It would be much easie" to stop a fire at the parks and parkways than in a solid mass of buildings. The cutting down of trees and shrubbery would be much easier, safer and more effective than the destroying a line of buildings, and the loss of a mile or two of the parkway's adornment would be a triffing matter in comparison with the loss which would be caused by the destruction of an equal area of buildings.


