J. W. Pickett of Portales, before the Farmer's Institute in Roswell recently read a paper on fruit prospects, a selection from the same reads: As to Roosevelt county, I consider the fruit prospects good. I am for a farmer but a small stock man, and must honestly confess that I will be compelled to cut my number of cattle still lower, because the tide of immigration is upon us. We have battled honestly against this flow of humanity into the cowman's domain, realizing that it meant ruin to our business, that as the settler took the land the cow man must go. We believed that the settler could not make a living on the land, that it was simply ruining the cow range and to no purpose. The settler would starve out and have to go back whence he came. When I moved to Portales, it was as a matter of convenience as a shipping point. We came not to plant orchards and grow fruit. We had not more than got comfortable in our home when we realized what was upon us. Something had to be done. Should we round up our little band and take them to new fields? Circumstances forbid. We determined to stay and make the best of it, come what might. We began to look around to see what we could do. We thought of Roswell the cowman's paradise, the home of the red cheeked apple. That "aggregated fruit growing, to me a happy thought. This would beautify our home and enhance its value, and at the same time be profitable, but was it practicable? Was it possible? These were the questions that naturally arose. Upon an examination I found that we were in the midst of a fruit country which did not make it probable that possible that we should succeed. On our east eighty to a hundred miles we find fruit growing of all kinds in quantities and of a good quality. Northwest in a day's drive of Portales we find at the Horseshoe ranch an orchard of well grown trees with as fine fruit as one could desire. Then turn to the southwest 75 miles to the great apple orchards of Roswell. The stars and stripes do not wave over a territory or state which produces more delicious apples than Roswell or more delicious peaches than Roswell. Being thus surrounded by fine orchards all bearing fruit, what will hinder us from succeeding in Roosevelt county? We have only to plant and give proper attention as many have done. How to plant, without irrigation. Continued in the next Times.

ARBOR DAY PROCLAMATION.

Friday, April 3d, named by Governor Otero for planting trees.
Executive office, Santa Fe, N. M., March 14, 1903
Whereas, The laws of the territory provide that annually at the proper season the governor shall issue a proclamation designating a day to be set apart and observed by the people as Arbor Day, and that the same shall be a holiday in all the public schools of the territory, and school officers and teachers to have the schools under their charge celebrate the same by planting trees and shrubs for either ornamental or other use.
Now, therefore, I, Miguel A. Otero, governor of the territory of New Mexico, in pursuance of the law and by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby designate and proclaim
Friday, April 3d, 1903, as Arbor Day and urge that the same be observed as a holiday in our public schools of the territory and that the officers and teachers in charge of the same be admonished to require their pupils to observe the same by planting of trees or shrubs for the beautifying and adornment of the public school grounds and places, or in the streets or at their homes, and that such teachers prepare suitable exercises for the observance of the day, and I also urge that all territorial institutions and their regents:

FATHER OF THE HOMESTEAD LAW.

Galusha A. Grow retired from congress yesterday, and from public life, at the close of the 57 congress. None is held in higher esteem by his colleagues than Hon. Galusha A. Grow, representative at large from Pennsylvania. As a token of their regard for him, the members of the Pennsylvania congressional delegation, at a meeting attended by every member, adopted unanimously a preamble setting fourth in eulogistic terms the unusual character and duration of Representative Grow's services to his state and to his country and a resolution expressive of the regret felt by all on account of his retirement from congress. The preamble recited that his services began half a century ago and, while his name had been identified with many great public measures, the act which he is justly entitled to claim as his own is the free homestead law, under which the public domain has been turned from a wilderness into a world of happy homes.

Our Soil, Etc.
The soil varies from what is locally called sand, through sandy loam, to semi-adobe, a heavy, sticky soil, but not strictly clay. The so-called sand consists, not of silica, but of minute particles of lime and soil, which has disintegrated under cultivation. The sandy soil has, therefore, a tendency to become heavier with use. There is an abundance of potash and phosphoric acid in these lands for all crops; but in the raw land nitrates are deficient, and there is very little humus. These are characteristics of all desert and semi-arid soils. It is this lack of humus which gives the peculiar light appearance to the soil, so noticeable to the eastern farmer, who is surprised that anything can grow upon soil which looks like that. Rich in mineral base, the natural home of alfalfa, a proper rotation of crops insures increasing productivity with no call for costly commercial fertilizers, as is the inevitable fate of the less lasting soils of the rain belt, leached and water-soaked through countless ages, but still full of vegetable mold and humus unavailable for plant food.

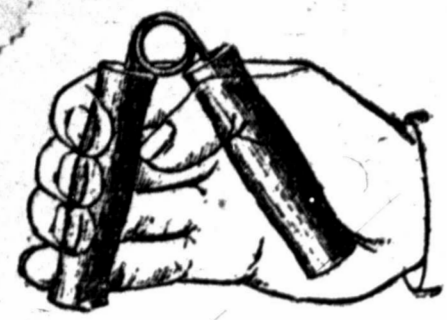

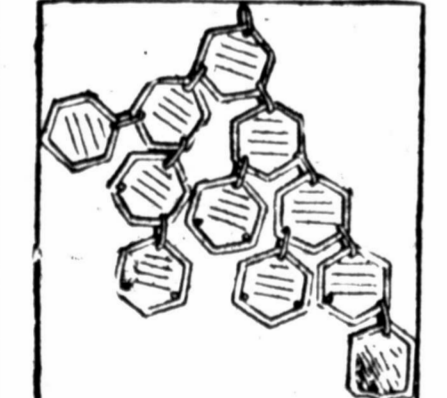

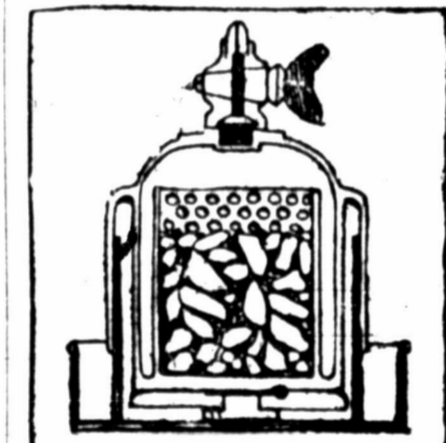

LONNY HORN The remains of Lonny Horn were laid away in the Masonic cemetery on the 9th inst., the Masonic fraternity conducting the funeral service at the grave. Mr. Horn was a member of Las Animas Lodge No. 28, A. F. & A. M., and of Trinidad Commandery, both bodies being largely represented at the funeral. The first services were held at the residence of Senator Wood on East Second street, and were conducted by Rev. V. O. Penley, rector of the Episcopal church. Music was furnished by the choir, one of the hymns, "Abide With Me," being beautifully rendered. Great numbers of friends, including pioneer residents, paid their respects to a man whom they held in such high esteem. There were many beautiful floral offerings, among the number being a large and very handsome piece from both the Masons and Elks. Mr. Horn was born in Texas in 1854 the year before the Lone Star state was annexed to the United States. He was engaged in the cattle business in that state, in which business he continued all his life. He drove a herd of cattle through from Texas to Colorado in 1870, being one of the first men to make such a trip, and located the first ranch in Colorado, his ranges at that time being on the Chauquagua. His family joined him in Trinidad in 1871, and continued to reside here until 1884, when they removed to Kansas City. That year Mr. Horn bought the Bank of Southern Colorado and soon thereafter organized the present Trinidad National Bank. In 1887, in order to be nearer his business interests, he moved his family to Denver. The same year he organized and took a great interest in the Lonny Horn Hose Team of Trinidad, composed of boys under 16 years of age. In 1888 he took the team to Denver, and they had the honor of taking first prize in a contest with a number of similar organizations of the state. In 1891 the family came back to Trinidad and remained until 1900, when Mr. and Mrs. Horn moved to their ranch at Portales, N. M., where they have since made their home. Lonny Horn was charitable to a fault and had an unusually bright disposition. He was a friend to a person but once, and that for always. One thing he was especially proud of and that was that he had never cast a vote outside this city. He never held but one public office—that of county commissioner. He leaves his widow and one daughter, Mrs. Guy Fuller of Bonham, Tex., one grandchild, Lonny Horn Fuller, and one sister, Mrs. T. B. Collier of El Paso, Tex. By Mr. Horn's death the last of his name is gone, and his body now lies beside the dust of his four children. He was married 35 years ago the 27th day of last February.
