Railroad News.

Special from the Dallas News:
Snyder, Tex., Feb. 19.—A great deal
of talk pro and con has been heard here
lately concerning the Santa Fe Cut-Off,
which is proposed to build

from Coleman to Por-
tales by way of Snyder,
and great interest has
been manifested in the special to the
News concerning this line which have
appeared from time to time. The News
correspondent learns today, however,
that a company is forming here for the
purpose of building a road from Snyder
to some point in the southeast to a con-
nection with the Texas and Pacific.

The company is composed of the
strongest and most influential business
men of Snyder and Scurry county, and
sufficient capital has been subscribed
to acquire a charter, which will be pro-
cured at once, and the road will be
pushed to completion. It will be
known as the Snyder and Southeastern.
At the next meeting of stockholders
the board of directors will be given.
