Fulfing Two Care.

Denver, Colo., Aug. 9 .- The result the exhaustive search conducted sterday by the rescue crews sent om Denver and other nearby cities liscloses the fact that fully 100 human beings met death in the wreck of the Denver and Rio Grande express which plunged over a bridge near Eden Colo. Sunday night while on its way to St. Louis. Eighty-three bodies have already been recovered and postively identified, thirty-five are reported missing, and there are ten bodies lying in the morgue at Pueblo that have not yet been identified. The corpse of Engineer Hinman was one of the first to be found by the searchers, and the conductors of the illfated train besides the two other members of the crew, are known to have perished in the roaring torrent which descended upon the stanch trestle with such awful effect.

Eight miles from the scene of the disaster bodies have been recovered, and even in the heart of the city of Pueblo one body was taken from the stream. The fireman of the engine, David Mayfield, had a miraculous escape from death. He was examining gauge lamp over the boller when the engine came upon the bridge. A terrific crash warned him of danger and he leaped through the window beside him, landing in the turbulent stream, and escaped serious injury. It was the fireman who first gave the alarm at Eden, one mile away.

The engine and tender, chair car and smoker plunged into the water, the two Pullman and dining cars remaining on the track. A porter on the forward Pullman preformed heroic service by braking his car and preventing the rear section of the train from following the forward cars into the ditch. The chair car contained nearly 100 persons, and the top of the car was wrenched off by the terrific force of the water, allowing a very few of the unfortunate persons to escape. Those who could not get out were caught like rats in a trap and either beaten to death or drowned where they sat in their seats.

Radical measures will be resorted to in order to cripple the packers as much as possible and force the public and city officials to bring the packers to

Cass C. Smith of San Francisco first vice president of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen, arrived yesterday. His advent is regarded as having peculiar significance. San Francisco is absolutely in the hands of union labor, and it is believed the methods obtaining there will be brought into play here.

Michael Donnelly, president of the striking butchers, announced today that he was a Socialist. He said this strike was turning all union labor men from other political faiths to Socialism of the active sort. Organized labor will demand the head of Edward Tilden, a member of the Board of Education, who said children should be permitted to work in the packing houses if their parents needed their

The practical survey is however what we want. This kind of a survey is being made in Illinois, where, in addition to the geothe ability of the soils to produce certain crops. The state of Illinois has appropriated a large sum of money for the carrying on of this work, but it is safe to say that the money is coming back to the state several times over. The examinations of the The Japanese have occupied Louisa soil in the southern part of the state are bound to work a revolution in the farming of all that section. The discovery of the acid condition of the soil and the ease by which it may be cured is worth many millions of men that will yet invest their money in those lands. It is also almost certain that as a result of this work there will be a steady shifting of the population toward the southern part of the state, where the winters are mild and the climate good. The same kind of a practical soil survey should exist in every state. It takes money to carry on a work of this kind; and if the other states do not take hold of the matter in earnest they will find their own interests being injured by the growing importance of Illinois agriculture. The truth should be patent to all that there is no "cure-all" for any disease or insect. Saving Irrigation Water.

The application of water to soil for irrigation purposes is a matter that is but poorly understood. The building expensive canals and the application to the work of the science of the practical civil engineer have been all elements of cost in the past. At the present time a good many other methods of applying water are being tried. ditches, but as a practical method has not yet been fully worked out. Perhaps the matter has not yet been good deal of water wasted in the past, Last year in California trials were made irrigating in ditches one foot deep and irrigating by help of ditches three inches deep. To the surprise of the investigators it was found that in irrigating in ditches three inches deep at least one-third more water was reoutred. As the three-inch ditches are quite generally used in some sections. it is evident that in such cases 25 per cent of the water has been thrown








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
