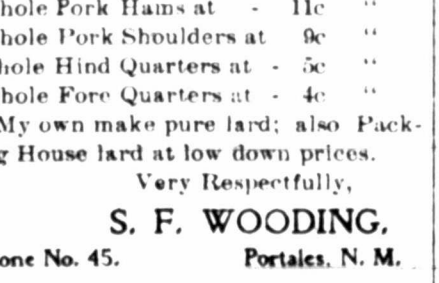

"NEW" POTATOES A FRAUD.

Westerner Said to Make Much Money by Shrewd Trick. "The wooden nutmeg of Connecticut was the first imitation food," said a grocer, "and then came the mean Bostonian who dried snow and sold it for salt. This year we have an imitation new potato."

"A Westerner put the imitation new potato on the market, and they say he has made about 80 per cent profit out of it. I am speaking seriously now, mind. Of course it was in a joking way that I alluded to the nutmeg and the salt."

"The Westerner, to accomplish his deception, plants on toward the end of the summer a crop of late potatoes of a kind that keep well. These ripen and are dug up just before the first frost. They are sorted, and all the bad ones are thrown out. Then the rest are buried in a field.

"The crop lies buried, preserved from all harm under the soil, till early spring. About two months before the first genuine potatoes have appeared it is dug up.

"A great bath of a solution of lye is prepared and in this bath the potatoes are dipped. When they emerge from their plunge their skins are pink and curly, and their flesh is hard and firm. In a word, they are to all appearances new potatoes, and they would deceive anyone.

"There are many imitation foods," the grocer ended. "We have imitation butter, imitation syrup, imitation jellies and jams, imitation coffee, imitation honey and imitation maple. Not one of these frauds, though, is as hard to detect as the imitation new potato."

has increased the expenditures, it has something to show for it, other than a larger interest bearing debt.
Now, what kind of administration is best for the country at large?

Senator William H. Andrews has done more for the laboring class in New Mexico than probably any other one individual. This fact cannot be disputed by the most ardent supporters of the opposing candidate for delegate to congress. Facts and figures stand like huge boulders, not to be removed by simple breath of wind.

When Mr. Andrews first suggested the building of the Santa Fe Central lines to eastern capitalists he was told that it could not be a success. His reply was characteristic of his entire personality "We will open up a virgin country to the farmers and raisers. By making it possible for them to labor with a market close at hand, the country will soon be built up and settled. Let us befriend these men, nurse their small industries and they in turn will become able to support a railroad. It may take years to make the road pay but the farmers will not forget to whom they owe their prosperity."

Today the Estancia valley is beginning to illustrate the truth of the senator's prediction. Towns are springing up where heretofore were but isolated ranches. Farmers are flocking to the country. Productions are now easily marketed when previously the cost of hauling devoured all profits. Hundreds owe a start in life to the position taken by Mr. Andrews before the magnets of the east.

Those, who through the present candidate of the Republicans of this Territory for Delegate to Congress, invested in the Santa Fe Central, now see that this position was correct. Plans are now matured for larger lines and the Santa Fe Central bids fair to become a power in southwestern railway traffic. Surveys are now completed and incorporations being formed which will bring New Mexico in rapid strides to the front. The Albuquerque Eastern, running from Moriarity to Albuquerque, is now under construction. This road also has a branch line to San Felipe, opening up immense iron and coal deposits of that section. The Willard, Las Vegas and Northern giving San Miguel County another outlet as well as bringing out the resources of Mora County, is another of these roads.

The El Paso Extension, connecting with the Central lines proper at Willard, gives a market to the products of the Territory. The Torrance, Roswell and Gulf road will be of inestimable value to Valencia, Lincoln and Chaves Counties and will bring joy to the heart of many a humble tiller of the soil or the owner of flocks, who has patiently awaited for years just such improvements. The Albuquerque and Durango line, which has been surveyed at great cost, is just what is needed to complete this net-work of railroads in New Mexico. This line will pass through a country which has been befriended by nature but isolated by man. Bernalillo, McKinley, Sandoval, Rio Arriba and San Juan Counties will be most directly benefited by this improvement.

By these roads thousands will be directly benefited and the entire Territory cannot fail to respond to the stimulant. Hundreds of men will receive employment in building these great connecting lines. Owners of teams and timber will have a ready market during construction. The capital of the east in fact will be placed in the pockets of the citizens of New Mexico.

It has not been a mere selfish aim that has caused Mr. Andrews to work in this manner for the laboring people. Instead it might be traced to a certain remembrance of the time when he began his life on a farm. He has remembered the struggle he had and knows that life is the same with others. The money market has never been so stringent, the work for the road's employes so scarce, that the senator has considered that he was warranted in decreasing his expenses by a diminution of his pay-rolls. Many men, section hands, grade scrapers and all, have been idle for months although receiving pay from the company, because Mr. Andrews not place them out of employment. "We will have work for them someday," answered the president to the objections of his subordinates, "and they probably will not forget that we have assisted them at this time." "Live and let live," has been his maxim.

Instances too numerous to mention have occurred where employes ill or having met with losses in their families have been assisted out of the private funds of the candidate. This was always quietly done without display, simply for a fellow-feeling toward those in trouble. Whenever an unfortunate man, in evident hard luck, enters the general offices of the company and the pay-rolls are already overtaxed with more men than there is work to do, word is passed along by the clerk, "Do not let him see the old man or we will have a little more expense on our hands." This trait is usually characteristic of a man who has done things and worked himself up from the bottom of the ladder. He remembers how once he was in a similar position.

Another point that should not be overlooked in this connection is the fact that entirely throughout the construction of the roads of which the Republican candidate is the president, and work in the mines, which he has opened up in various portions of the Territory, local labor, men who have their homes and families in New Mexico, have been exclusively employed. Attention has not been paid to those numerous applicants who always flock to any point where development is under way from the four points of the earth. "Give the people of New Mexico the preference," is the order of Senator Andrews. "We live with them and should patronize home people. As a consequence many men previously lacking employment or who were unable to secure that to which they were justly entitled, are now earning good salaries on the pay rolls of the companies.

When a man gives employment to many, makes farms valuable, increases valuations on real estate, starts hundreds in life anew and makes possible the development of the resources of this great Territory, he surely deserves considerate treatment at the hands of those whom he has so materially assisted.
