SEA PIGEONS IN MILLIONS

Traveling in immense hordes which

over the water, millions of sea pigeons came in from the sea last week, close in the wake of mammoth schools of sardines, which they were intently asphyxia in places where it would othoursuing. Thousands of the birds became entangled in the mesh of the fish trap leads at high tide, and the weight of their bodies is a serious menace to the gearing.

At sea the pigeons can generally be found where the sardines exist, but they come to the river every summer. Their usual custom is to follow schools of whale, which also feed upon the sardines. Waiting till the sardines are surrounded and the whales are about to rush upon their victims, the pigeons slip in and gorge themselves apon the fish.—Ilwaco Journal.




