Jack Henton Killed.

Last Tuesday night about nine o'clock a man by the name of Jack Henton was killed by Willis Large, a young man about 18 years old, at the home of Large's father, about four miles from Poortales.

Early in the evening Henton went to his home, drinking, and when he got there said something to his wife about trouble of somekind and asked where his winchester was, and Mrs. Henton would not tell him, but finally he found it and proceeded to snap it at Mrs. Henton, but she had very wisely taken the cartridges out and hid them prior to his coming and when he found the gun empty he went for his steel-jacket rifle, saying that he would kill her, and while he was finding it Mrs. Henton ran and mounted the horse he had ridden home and rode to her father's (Mr. Large) place some distance away and informed him of what had taken place. He told her he had no way to protect her there and that she had better go and get one of the neighbors to come over. So she again mounted the horse and went after a neighbor to help protect her from the man who should have been her help in every trial. They came back by where her brother, Willis Large, was and brought him with them. In the mean time someone was sent to town after an officer but one could not be obtained on account of no warrant being issued.

Not long after the three arrived at the Large home, Henton pushed the door open and walked in, setting a winchester by the door, and removing his overcoat as he did so. He started toward Willis Large, saying, "you are the cause of all this." Large saw that he had an open knife in his hand and that there was no time to lose, an instant he drew his knife and had sent a bullet through Henton's brain, killing him almost instantly, thus ending the life of a man with a very checked career, and considered a dangerous man by those who knew him.

After Mrs. Henton returned from the neighbor's she remembered her children at home in bed, and the fear that Henton would murder them caused her to faint.

Large had an examining trial Wednesday morning and his bond fixed at \$500. The evidence given shows that he had killed his brother-in-law in self-defense and in protection of his sister.

The remains of Henton were interred in the Portales cemetery Thursday afternoon.

The watchman at the State capital says that 3,388 persons climbed to the dome that building during November, eighty-five were from foreign countries and other states.

The Dawes Commission is now rushing the work to completion in Indian Territory, and it is thought that it will finish by July 1, 1905, the time allotted by Congress for its expiration.

The body of Albert Cavitt, a negro, was found badly mangled on the International and Great Northern track near Hearne, Friday morning. On the body was found twenty-five dollars.

The Chicago Weatherford and Brazos Valley Railway Company, a local corporation organized for the purpose of building a railroad from Weatherford to Bridgeport, in Wise County, is taking steps to build.

The Postmaster General has appointed former Congressman James Ranking Young, of Philadelphia, superintendent of the dead letter office to fill the vacancy caused by the death of D. P. Leitner, last September.

Impressed by the need for an institution where money may be obtained at any hour, prominent New York financiers and commercial men have, it is announced by the Herald, organized the First Night and Day Bank and Safe Deposit Company.

Eight of twelve laborers employed in digging a trench for laying water mains in southwest St. Louis were buried Monday by a cave-in and it is believed all perished. The men were working close together when tons of clay fell on top of them.

There are now in the State Pasteur Institute several patients for treatment. One was discharged last Monday. In all ten patients have been treated and discharged, and no further cases have been heard of the treatment was entirely successful.

Mrs. George Henry Gilbert, the oldest actress on the American stage, died at her home at the Sherman House at Chicago, Friday, shortly after she had suffered a stroke of apoplexy.

Fred Wittrock, who fifteen years ago served a term in the penitentiary for taking part in a train robbery, is dead at the home of his mother at Leavenworth, Kan., of a grippe, aged 44. Wittrock had been in business here for several years.

The city authorities of St. Petersburg have decided to grant \$50,000 to the defenders of Port Arthur and their families and appeal to the whole Russian Empire to raise funds for the same purpose.

The University of Chicago is to be equipped with a set of chimneys, placed on Mandel Hall tower. The first step toward their establishment was taken by Coach A. A. Stagg, who with his wife, has donated \$1,000 toward their purchase.

Queen Alexandra celebrated her sixtieth birthday, Thursday, at Sandringham. Flags were everywhere, church bells pealed and the usual salutes were fired at the navy and military stations at home and in the colonies.

Senator Ockrell, of Missouri, has been offered a place on the Isthmian Canal Commission, on the Interstate Commerce Commission, as he may elect. The offer was made at a conference which the Senator had with the President.

Since Tuesday of this week officials of the Wells-Fargo Express Company and a force of special detectives have been seeking trace of \$15,000 in gold which disappeared from the company's office in San Francisco.

Palmer K. Potter, of Scranton, Pa., who was scratched on the hand recently while chloroforming a pet dog, which he believed to have hydrophobia, is dead after two days' severe illness. Nothing was thought of the disease at the time it was received.

RESIDENTS' MESSAGE READ TO CONGRESS

Document Deals Voluminously with Questions of State--Tariff Left for Future Communication--Position of the Government Toward Organized Labor--Dealing with Illegal Combinations.

President Roosevelt's message to Congress, read at the opening of the short session of that body, deals voluminously with the questions of state. The subject of tariff revision is left for a further communication. Substantially the message is as follows:

To the Senate and House of Representatives:
The nation continues to enjoy noteworthy prosperity. Such prosperity is due primarily to the high industrial activity of our citizens, and to the good sense, the earnest desire to avoid doing any damage, and yet the quiet determination to proceed, step by step, without halt or without hurry, in maintaining or at least in minimizing whatever mischief or evil there is to be done. The great corporations, they are acting in no spirit of hostility to wealth, either individual or corporate. They are not against the rich man, nor are they against the poor man. On the contrary, they are friendly alike toward rich man and poor man. Their policy is to do each act in a policy of justice and equity toward his fellow. Great corporations are necessary, and only men of great ability and high character can manage such corporations successfully, and such men must have great rewards. But these corporations should be so managed that the interest of the public as a whole. Where this can be done under the present laws it must be done. Where it cannot, other steps should be enacted to supplement them.

Capital and Labor.
The vast and complicated mechanism of our modern civilization, the dominant note is the relation of capital and labor, and the relations of organized capital and organized labor, to each other and to the public at large come second in importance only to the intimate questions of family life.

Postal Service.
In the Postoffice Department the service has increased in efficiency, and conditions as to revenue and expenditure continue to be satisfactory. The increase of revenue during the year was \$9,585,181.10, or 6.9 per cent, the total receipts amounting to \$142,332,454.34. The expenditure was \$132,747,273.24, an increase of about 9 per cent over the previous year, being thus \$9,579,492.36 in excess of the current year's appropriation. The total expenditures was a total appropriation of \$12,964,637.35 for the continuation and extension of the rural free delivery service, and the amount expended for this purpose in the preceding fiscal year. Large results have been attained in extending the free distribution of mails to the residents of rural districts. The statistics brought down to the 1st of October, 1904, show that on that date there were 27,128 rural routes established, serving approximately 12,000,000 people in rural districts remote from postoffices, and that there were pending at that time 2,438 applications for the establishment of new rural routes. Unquestionably some part of the general increase in receipts is due to the inauguration of the rural free delivery service as afforded. The revenues have also been aided greatly by amendments in the tariff of duties on the mail matter for the curtailment of abuses of the second-class mailing privilege. The average increase in the volume of mail matter for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1905 (that portion for 1905 being estimated) is 40.47 per cent, as compared with 35.33 per cent for the immediately preceding, and 15.92 for the four-year period immediately preceding that.

The message here points out the need for improvement in our consular system, advises the creation of a national art gallery and suggests the enactment of a national quarantine law.

Rights of American Citizens Abroad.
Even where it is not possible to secure the rights of our citizens abroad, the principles which we accept as axiomatic, it is necessary for us firmly to insist upon the rights of our own citizens without regard to their creed or race; without regard to whether they were born here or born abroad.

The strong arm of the government in enforcing respect for its just rights in international matters is the navy of the United States. It must be maintained and it must be kept up to the needs of this country's position. We have undertaken to build the Isthmian canal. We have undertaken to secure for ourselves our just share in the trade of the Orient. We have undertaken to protect our citizens from improper treatment in foreign lands. We continue steadily to insist on the application of the Monroe doctrine, to the western hemisphere, and to similar matters in these and all similar matters to be a mere boastful sham we can not afford to abandon our naval program. Our navy is now being increased, and is so potent because we are not afraid of war. But our protestations upon behalf of peace would be of no avail if we do not have the slightest attention if we were impotent to make them good.

The Army.
Within the last few years the United States has set an example in disarmament which disarmament was proper. By law our army is fixed at a maximum of one hundred thousand, and a minimum of sixty thousand men. When there was insurrection in the Philippines we kept our army at a maximum of one hundred thousand, and now our army has been reduced to the minimum at which it is possible to keep it with due regard to its efficiency. Our new mounted require twenty-eight thousand men, if the coast fortifications are to be adequately manned, and the United States is not now so large as the population of New York or Chicago relative to the population of either city.

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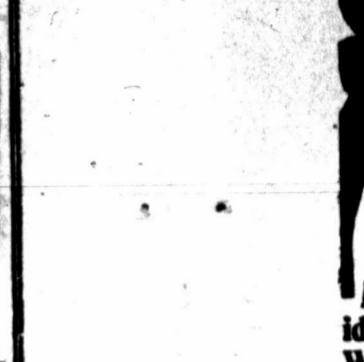

The Country's Fruit Crop.
The annual fruit crop of the United States has a value of \$132,000,000. The orchard fruits produced each year have a value of \$84,000,000 and citrus fruits, grown principally in California and Florida, \$5,549,000. The seven great fruit growing States in the order of production are California, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois and Indiana.
