Document Deals Voluminously with Questions of State---Tariff Left for Future Communication---Position of the Government Toward Organized Labor---Dealing with Illegal Combinations.

short session of that body, deals voluminously with questions of state. The subject of tariff revision is left for a further communication. Substantially the message is as follows: To the Senate and House of Representatives:

The nation continues to enjoy note worthy prosperity. Such prosperity is of course primarily due to the high individual average of our citizenship, taken to gether with our great natural resources; but an important factor therein is the working of our long-continued governmental policies. The people have emphatically expressed their approval of the principles underlying these policies, and substantially unchanged, although course applied in a progressive spirit te meet changing conditions

Caution Against Extravagance The enlargement of scope of the func tions of the national government required by our development as a nation nvolves, of course, increase of expense and the period of prosperity through which the country is passing justifies expenditures for permanent improvements far greater than would be wise in hard times. Battle ships and forts, public buildings, and improved waterways are investments which should be made when we have the money; but abundant revnues and a large surplus always invite extravagance, and constant care should be taken to guard against unnecessary increase of the ordinary expenses of gov

Capital and Labor In the vast and complicated mechanism of our modern civilized life the dominant note is the note of industrialism; and the relations of capital and labor, and espelabor, to each other and to the public at large come second in importance only to

President Roosevelt's message to cause more than one state pursues the Congress, read at the opening of the policy of creating on easy terms corporations which are never operated vithin that state at all, but in other states whose laws they ignore. The national government alone can deal adequately with these great corporations. To try to deal with them in an intemperate, destructive, or demagogic spirit would, in all probability, mean that nothing what ver would be accomplished, and, with absolute certainty, that if anything were accomplished it would be of a harmful nature. The American people need to centinue to show the very qualities that they have shown—that is moderation. good sense, the earnest desire to avoid doing any damage, and yet the quiet determination to proceed, step by step without halt and without hurry, in earninating or at least in minimizing what ver of mischief or of evil there is to interstate commerce in the conduct of great corporations. They are acting in no spirit of hostility to wealth, either individual or corporate. They are not against the rich man any more than against the poor man. On the contrary, they are friendly alike toward rich man and toward poor man, provided only that each acts in a spirit of justice and decency toward his fellows. Great corporations are necessary, and only men of great and singular mental power can manage such corporations successfully and such man must have great rewards. But these corporations should be man nged with due regard to the interest of the public as a whole. Where this can be done. Where these laws come short others should be enacted to supplement

Postal Service. In the Postoffice Department the serv-ive has increased in efficiency, and conditions as to revenue and continue satisfactory. The increase of revenue during the year was \$9,358,181.10. r 4.9 per cent, the total receipts amounting to \$143,382,624.34. The expenditures were \$152,362,116.70, an increase of about per cent over the previous year, being \$8,979,492.36 in excess of the current revenue. Included in these expe ures was a total appropriation of \$12,-956,637.35 for the continuation and extention of the rural free delivery service which was an increase of \$4,902,237.35 over the amount expended for this purose in the preceding fiscal year. Large as this expenditure has been the benefient results attained in extending the free distribution of mails to the residents of rural districts have justified the wisdom of the outlay. Statistics brought down to the 1st of October, 1904. show that on that date there were 27,138 rura routes established, serving approximately 12,000,000 of people in rural districts re mote from postoffices, and that there were pending at that time 3,859 petition Unquestionably some part of the general increase in receipts is due to the creased postal facilities which the rural service has afforded. The revenues have also been aided greatly by amendments in the classification of mail matter, and the curtailment of abuses of the secondclass mailing privilege. The average increase in the volume of mail matter for the period beginning with 1902 and ending June. 1905 (that portion for 1905 being estimated), is 40.47 per cent, as compared with 25.46 per cent for the period immediately preceding, and 15.92 for the four-year period immediately preceding

Within the last three years the United States has set an example in disarmament where disarmament was proper. of one hundred thousand and a minimum of sixty thousand men. When there was insurrection in the Philippines we kept the army at the maximum. Peace came in the Philippines, and now our army has been reduced to the minimum at which it is possible to keep it with due regard to its efficiency. The guns now nounted require twenty-eight nen, if the coast fortifications are to be idequately manned. Relatively to the nation, it is not now so large as the poice force c. New York or Chicago relaively to the population of either city. We need more officers; there are not enough to perform the regular army work. It is very important that the offiers of the army should be accustomed to handle their men in masses, as it is iso important that the national guard of the several states should be accusomed to actual field maneuvering, esperially in connection with the regulars for this reason we are to be congratuated upon the success of the field ma nuvers at Manassas last fall, maneuvers which a larger number of regulars end national guard took part than was ver before assembled together in time of peace. No other civilized nation has, elatively to its population, such a di nicutive army as ours; and while army is so small we are not to be exused if we fail to keep it at a very high grade of proficiency.

The Philippines. In the Philippine islands there has een during the past year a continuation f the steady progress which has got the upper hand of the insurgents. The Philippine people, or, to speak more occurately, the many tribes, and even aces, sundered from one another more or less sharply, who go to make up the nents which we have a right to hope utterly incapable of existing in indelization of their own. I firmly believe that we can help them to rise higher and higher in the scale of civilization and of capacity for self-government, and I nost carnestly hope that in the end they will be able to stand, if not entirely alone et in some such relation to the United States as Cuba now stands. This end definitely postponed if our people are polish enough to turn the attention of the Filipinos away from the problems of schieving moral and material prosperity. of working for a stable, orderly, and just government, and toward foolish and dannce for which they are as yet totally

On the other hand our people must keep steadily before their minds the fact that the justification for our stay in the Philippines must ultimately rest chiefly slands. I do not overlook the fact that the Pacific ocean and alone its coasts the Philippines have played and will play in important part, and that our interests have been served in more than one way by the possession of the islands. But our chief reason for continuing to hold them must be that we ought in good faith to try to do our share of the world's work, and this particular piece of work has been imposed upon us by the results of the war with Spain. problem presented to us in the Philipfor their welfare. All that this coun- i pine islands is akin to, but not exactly like, the problems presented to the other great civilized powers which have pos-sessions in the Orient. More distinctly than any of the powers we are endeavoring to develop the natives themselves o that they shall take an ever-increasing share in their own government, and as far as is prudent we are already admitting their representatives to a governmental equality with our own. There tre commissioners, judges, and governors n the islands who are Filipinos and who ave exactly the same share in the government of the islands as have their col eagues who are Americans, while in the ower ranks, of course, the great majorof the public servants are Filipinos Within two years we shall be trying the xperiment of an elective lower house in e Philippine legislature.

Meanwhile our own people should reember that there is need for the highst standard of conduct among the Amer ly among the public servants but them. It is because I feel this so . ply that in the administration of these ands I have positively refused to per nit any discrimination whatsoever choosing the public servants considyouth of the men chosen and to the needs of the islands. There is no highbody of men in our public service han we have in the Philippine islands So far as possible these men should be given a free hand, and their suggestions bould receive the hearty backing both of the Executive and of the Congress. There is need of a vigilant and disinterested support of our public servants in the United States. The Country's Fruit Crop.

The annual fruit crop of the United States has a value of \$132,000,000. The orchard fruits produced each year have a value of \$84,000,000 and citrus fruits. grown principally in California and Florida, \$8,549,000. The seven great fruit growing States in the order of production are California, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Illinoia and Indiana. The products of New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio are marketed mainly in the East, but the surplus products of the other four States are marketed mainly in Chicago, as are the fruits of Iowa (\$2,894,000), Kansas (\$2,431,000, Nebraska (\$857,-000), and other Western States.






