Joseph W. Wallace, a lifelong friend of Admiral Dewey, and his shipmate in the civil war, is dead at his home at Worcester, Mass. He was seventy-four years old.

The State department has been officially informed that mines have been placed in Kelling Harbor, northeast coast of Formosa, and that shipping has been notified.

A British steamer rescued an American Captain and five of the crew from a sinking schooner in mid-ocean.

Joseph Folk, governor-elect of Missouri, has accepted the invitation of the Missouri Society of New York and will be the guest of honor at its annual banquet March 16.

At Lyman, Miss., Richard Feider, aged 27, was instantly killed while twisting a revolver on his finger.

A still-born child weighing twenty-five pounds and being about two feet long was born to Mrs. Thorwak, a Pole, in Collinsville, Conn., last week.

The Cunningham Milling Company's plant and Little Rock Furniture Manufacturing Company, the latter owned by Memphis people burned Friday morning. Loss was \$150,000.

A Shanghai correspondent says the Chinese Government is discharging the German military instructors throughout the Yangtze region and replacing them with Japanese.

For the first time in years not a suit for divorce was begun in Chicago Tuesday. Often as high as forty such actions are brought in a day.

James F. Secor, builder of the Merle Island navy yard in San Francisco, the Pensacola navy yard and many of the monitors, ironclads and dry docks which contributed so largely toward putting an end to the civil war, is dead at his country home in Pelham Manor.

Will Files, an Alabama negro convict, being conveyed from one camp to another on a train with 130 other convicts, exploded a stick of dynamite, hoping to make his escape.

Rumors to the contrary notwithstanding, Charles F. Dodge, the man from Texas, who had such a sensational time between the State and United States officers, has made no sort of confession implicating a number of prominent people in a sensational scandal, so says his attorney.

Walter Weaver, the 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Weaver of near Allen, was accidentally shot, while a party of men and boys were rabbit hunting. The bullet entering the left leg necessitating amputation.

Lots of men who are inclined to be good keep putting it off till tomorrow. From Dec. 1 to Dec. 24, the night before Christmas, no less than 334,684 international orders were forwarded to other lands from New York City and these orders called for \$4,667,620.90.

In the Pawhuska Federal Court Judge Yates held Amanda Claremore under \$5,000 bond on the charge of killing her infant child by burying it alive. The defendant is a wealthy Osage Indian squaw.

James Robinson was sent to jail at Mobile, Ala., for thirty days for kissing a young lady at Bayou la Batre, during a party, against her will.

Six buildings in the heart of Birmingham, Ala., were burned Wednesday; loss \$75,000.

May Irwin, the actress, has offered to furnish bail in any amount up to \$50,000 for the release of Nan Platter, one from the Tomba prison, where she is now held charged with the murder of Caesar Young.

Miss Maud Farmer of Lawton, Ok., has filed in the office of the District Clerk a suit for \$10,000 damages against Oliver M. Powers on an alleged promise of marriage. Mr. Powers is manager and part owner of the Woods addition.

Thomas Spivey, aged eighty-four years, died Friday morning at his residence in Dallas. The deceased was a native of Georgia but came to Dallas twenty-eight years ago. He was a Confederate veteran.

PORT ARTHUR HAS FALLEN

Helpless and Hopeless, the Russians Yield.

APPALLING SICKNESS, WOUNDS AND MORTALITY

The Japanese, Brave and Daring in Initiation, Gallant and Stubborn in Defense, Are Magnanimous and Generous in Victory.

At 9 o'clock Sunday night Gen. Nogai, commanding the Japanese army of investment received from the Russian General, Stoessel, a note saying that he found further resistance useless and asking for a meeting to arrange terms of capitulation. The note was simple and direct, and the Japanese General immediately named commissioners to confer with representatives of the Russian commander. They met at noon to arrange the conditions of surrender.

The siege and the defense of Russia's stronghold in the Far East has been marked by bravery, gallantry and desperation unequalled in modern warfare, and hardly excelled in military history. The story of the operations around Port Arthur is one of the repeated fighting, both by land and sea, of the most desperate and thrilling character.

They have faced and scaled rocky heights crowned with batteries and crowded with defenders, suffering that which military experts say would have appalled any European army. In the doomed fortress the people have lived under a devastating rain of shell and shrapnel. On scanty rations, besieged on every side, knowing that hope of succor or escape was in vain, the garrison has fought with a stubbornness that has evoked the admiration of the world.

TERRITORY BURNS COTTON.

Asher, Oklahoma, Burns Several Bales in a Celebration. Shawnee, Ok.: Several thousand dollars' worth of cotton, gathered to gether in a huge pile in the little town of Asher, in the southern part of this (Pottawatomie) county furnished a huge bonfire with which to greet the new year.

In a short time after the movement was begun considerable cotton had been unspined in the pile, which increased in size as the enthusiasm spread and soon assumed the proportions of a small mountain. One man contributed two bales, many others a bale each.

Fire at Glen Rose. Glen Rose: Fire Monday destroyed the restaurant of C. W. Campbell, loss \$700, with no insurance. Other damages as follows: Hancock & Reeder, blacksmith, loss \$400; no insurance. T. J. Bryan, warehouse, loss \$100; insured. The stable of T. B. Campbell and a shed belonging to him caught, but were extinguished. The postoffice and several other buildings were saved by the volunteer fire department.

The Victim of the Toy Pistol. Houston: Elmer Joseph Sharp, the third Christmas victim of the toy pistol, was buried Monday in the German Cemetery. He was 15 years of age, and the son of Judge and Mrs. C. W. Tharp. The boy was accidentally burned in the discharge of a toy pistol during the progress of his Christmas celebration. Several days afterward lockjaw set in and on Sunday death ensued.

COTTON CRASH AGAIN.

The Truth About the Greatest Crop Coming Out. New Orleans, La., Dec. 29.—There was another crash in trading at the Cotton Exchange yesterday when average months lost \$3 per bale and margins were again swept to the winds, caused by the posting of the Government Census Bureau's ginner report at 11 o'clock.

The stampede about the ring was scarcely less than it was when the Sully failure let loose a bunch of bombs that blew many skyward. The slump of the Hyde report was not so great on Dec. 3 as the slump caused by the ginner's report yesterday.

The farmers through their representatives in Washington, have already on foot plans to investigate the reports made by John Hyde of the Agricultural Department. It was a day of local cotton sensations and conservative brokers now fear the worst.

By 12 o'clock the total decline had averaged about 55 points on three active months, or between \$2.50 and \$3 per bale. January went down to 6.40c from 6.86c March went down to 6.57c from 7.02c, and May went down to 6.62c from 7.17c.

The most bearish prediction had been 11,750,000 bales. The actual figures of the report showed 11,848,259 bales from 737 counties of the cotton belt. Local cotton factors declared that they are now convinced the present crop will be the greatest in all the history of cotton.

New York, Dec. 29.—The cotton crop broke 30 to 35 points yesterday on the Census Bureau's Ginner's report indicating a crop in excess of the Government's estimate. There was very heavy trading on the decline.

As soon as the report was made public cotton operations dropped sharply. March, which sold just as the report was issued at 7.08c, dropped in a couple of minutes to 6.96c, and shortly afterward sold at 6.83c. January dropped from 6.99c to 6.66c and May fell from 7.28c to 6.96c.

In a pistol duel at Monroe, La., Tuesday night, Phil Semansky of Shreveport, was killed and Jewell Webb of Monroe slightly wounded in two places. Both are well connected.

SPRIT OF UNREST.

A Slumbering Volcano Shows Signs of Life. St. Petersburg, Dec. 29.—It is evident from the reports received from the interior that the fairly good impression produced by the imperial manifesto on the subject of reforms may be more than offset in many places by the effect of the government note of warning to the Zemstvos. Private dispatches from Moscow especially indicate that much excitement prevails there and the gravest fears are expressed that the National capital may be the scene of bloody excesses.

A banquet arranged to take place there last night on the anniversary of the Troubitski revolution was stopped by order of the police and the Moscow Zemstvo adjourned sine die with a protest against the government note and the return of Grand Duke Bergius, the Governor General of Moscow. The Grand Duke is held to be responsible for the note, which may be a signal for a renewal of terrorism.

The big strike at the Baku oil fields, coming at this time, is another cause for anxiety as possibly forming a rallying cry for the workmen's organization. The Troubitski banquet at Moscow was only broken up at 3 o'clock this morning. Among those present were popular writers, professors of the university, mining school and the Technical institute, editors and socialist workmen. M. Kedrine, the well known lawyer and member of the St. Petersburg municipality, presided. The text of the resolution, which was carried by 766 to 7 votes after many fervid speeches, was as follows:

"In view of the horrors of the war, which is devoid of sense, and in view also of the sacrifices and ruin in which the country is being involved, we, representing the liberal professions and working classes, protest against the war into which the Government has engaged the Nation without consideration for the opinions or interests of the Russian people, and we express our profound belief that only the Nation itself can save Russia from her difficulties through free representatives of the people elected by secret ballot on the principle of equal rights.

Production of Iron.
Production of raw iron, which in 1901 was 39,940,000 tons, increased to 48,490,000 tons in 1902 and reached 48,490,000 tons in 1903. The United States stands at the head with the production of 18,010,000 tons against 17,820,000 tons in 1902 and 15,800,000 tons in 1901. Germany wrested the second place from Great Britain in 1903, its production being 10,990,000 tons, against 8,400,000 in 1902 and 7,990,000 in 1901. Great Britain occupies third place with an output of 8,810,000 tons against 8,520,000 tons in 1902 and 7,850,000 in 1901. The output in France, which in 1903 amounted to 2,830,000 tons, has increased by 400,421 tons as compared with 1902 and by 427,428 tons as compared with the production of 1901. Belgium produced 1,300,000 tons in 1903, an increase of 196,301 tons over 1902 and 533,701 tons over 1901. Spain's production amounted to 380,284 tons. The output has decreased in the following countries: Russia, 409,000 tons, or 118,404 tons less than in 1902 and 382,065 tons less than in 1901; Austria-Hungary, 1,320,000 tons, or 108,814 tons and 82,145 tons less than in 1902 and 1901, respectively; Sweden, 499,700 tons; a decrease of 24,300 and 23,600 tons from the amounts produced in 1902 and 1901, respectively.

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Australia's Wheat Crop.
(Since the opening of the present season, at the beginning of December, the exports of Australian wheat and flour have reached the total of about 23,995,325 bushels of wheat and \$18,579 sacks of flour. Reducing the total by the equivalent in wheat, the totals together are equal to \$3,820,004 bushels of wheat. Of the total amount (\$3,820,004 bushels), 27,020,586 bushels shipped to Europe, 5,125,183 bushels to South Africa, and the remainder, 1,226,735 bushels, to various other destinations. The value of the exports is estimated approximately at \$26,719,462.

Japs Really Good Sized.
The Japanese surgeons during the war have made measurements of the mikado's army which show that the smallness of stature is due entirely to an almost dwarfed condition of the legs. This is undoubtedly due to the fact that from early childhood a really unnatural way of sitting upon the legs is practiced. The adult Japanese is accustomed to sit with his legs bent under him, and as soon as a child is old enough to be set upon the floor his legs are bent under him in imitation of the custom of his elders. This in time dwarfs the growth of the limbs. Actual deformity is less common among the peasants than among the scholars, merchants and those of sedentary habits. Undoubtedly the coming type of Japanese will be one whose ancestors have realized the defect in stature, found the cause and profited by the knowledge to change his habit of sitting upon the feet.

Old London Town.
The city of London—the lord majority (old London), St. Paul's church being near the center—contains 671 acres, with a night population of about 31,000 and a day population (the heart of greater London) of about 350,000. It has a separate and distinct police organization from that of the metropolitan district as follows: One superintendent, one superintendent of detective department, three chief inspectors, fifteen district inspectors, seventy-four sergeants, seven deputy sergeants, and 865 constables (patrolmen). There are besides two courts of justice (Guildhall and Mansion house) where the lord mayor and aldermen reside.

The White House Christmas turkey shipped as usual in cold storage seems to have escaped the attention of the Boston correspondent this time.

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The presenting, by Judge Pope, of a portrait of President Roosevelt, to the county of Roosevelt, during the recent session of court there, was a very graceful act, both upon the part of the President and the Court. When the suggestion was made to the President by Judge Pope he very readily acquiesced, and the result is that Roosevelt county bears a distinction not enjoyed by any other county in the Territory.—Carlsbad Argus.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 25.—Gen. Lew Wallace, who was once Territorial Governor of New Mexico, is exercised over the project to unite New Mexico and Arizona into a State, and today spoke his mind freely on the subject. He declared that he would advise the people of New Mexico not to accept the bill and not to take any part in making it operative by electing Representatives and Senators. Though the General is very feeble, he declares that he will go to New Mexico and fight against the statehood bill. He says:

"This thing will never be brought about as long as I can fight it. I love the people of New Mexico. I lived with them two and one-half years as Governor, and I know their condition and their needs. The bill now advocated by Senator Beveridge is bad. It means the practical disfranchisement of the whole people of both Territories.—Dallas News.

Will Not Prove Much Of A Bail.

"If the amendment to the statehood bill allowing \$5,000,000 for the public schools of the new state of Arizona passes, Roswell's share, computed on basis of the number of children in school, will be in the neighborhood of \$50,000. We could use it."—Roswell Register.

The Register is mistaken. The \$2,000,000 to be appropriated under the Hamilton joint statehood bill for the public schools of the new state of Arizona to be composed of New Mexico and Arizona cannot be used in such manner. The principal will be kept in the treasury of the United States and three per cent per annum will be paid thereon. That would mean an income of \$150,000, which is indeed very good, but after all would only make about \$1.30 per year per each person of school age. If statehood must come, this favor will be gratefully received to be sure, but this paper thinks this appropriation will not prove the bait Senator Beveridge et al. intend to catch.—New Mexican.
