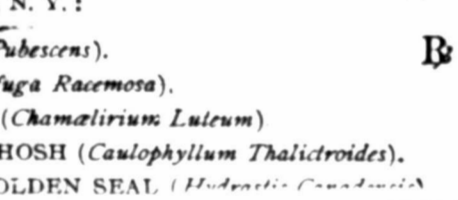

MECHANICAL DEVICE DESIGNED TO DISTRIBUTE THE WEIGHT.

Nearly all the civilized nations as well as the savage tribes have some characteristic manner of carrying the infant which is far superior to that which is generally followed in this country, namely, of embracing the child in such a manner that its weight falls principally on the hands and arms of the nurse or parent. The Japanese woman makes a sort of sling, which is thrown over the back and supported from the shoulders, and with this bit of apparatus tiny children are to be seen in the streets of the Japanese towns trudging along, but little hampered by the baby which they are carrying along on their backs. The Indian has the papoose. The women of some of the Oriental tribes relieve themselves of a great deal of work by teaching their infant offspring to cling to the neck of the mother. There are endless ways of transporting the baby, but that of holding it in the arms is the most uncomfortable of them all. Often it is positively painful.

An assistant for the nurse in the shape of a mechanical device to distribute the weight of the infant in arms has been designed by an inventor of West Hoboken, N. J., which is shown in the accompanying cut. This carrier, it will be seen, distributes the weight between the shoulder and the hip of the nurse, and in summer time has the advantage of being much more comfortable for the infant in that it is not distressed by the heat from the nurse's body.

People of Leipzig Reminded of the Fate of Jericho.

We have been hearing a good deal about the walls of Jericho lately, and, therefore, it is curious that we should have an actual example of the power of a trumpet-blast occurring in Europe to-day.

A short time ago, at Leipzig, the conductor of a brass band used to train his musicians in his garden, which was bounded by the old walls of the city.

One day, when they were practicing a grand march they came to a passage in which all the trumpets had to blow fortissimo, and, as they gave one final blast all together, they were astonished to see the old wall suddenly crumble and topple over into the fields outside.

Happily, the only result was that the cows in the meadows were frightened, but it is evident that the walls of Leipzig are even more unstable than were the walls of Jericho—Sketch.

Crow Shows Intelligence.

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FIVE A LUCKY NUMBER.

Universal Favorite With Those Who Throw the Dice.

"Dice seems to have a fancy for fives," said a clerk in a cigar store. "We get sets of them frequently that show many more fives than any other number. We call it running to fives. The players seem to know this, and they nearly always select fives when they begin to roll. I have never seen the dice show partially for any number other than fives, and I do not understand why this is. It is a fact, however."

"The five and six sides of a dice should be the least frequently thrown, for they are lighter, having more holes, but this does not seem to make any difference. The fives keep coming just the same."

"Of course, if one number shows oftener than another it means that the dice are not properly made; but it does seem curious that this irregularity should always make the five side come up instead of some other. Since I have been here we have had a number of sets of dice that ran to fives."

"Another peculiar thing is that nine men out of ten who roll the dice in this game choose fives or sixes. It is the rarest thing that any one takes one of the smaller numbers. It may be superstition, but if so almost all men are superstitious, for they will have nothing to do with aces or twos. And those who win almost always win with the larger numbers. Fives are the favorite, and are selected most often."—Louisville Courier Journal.

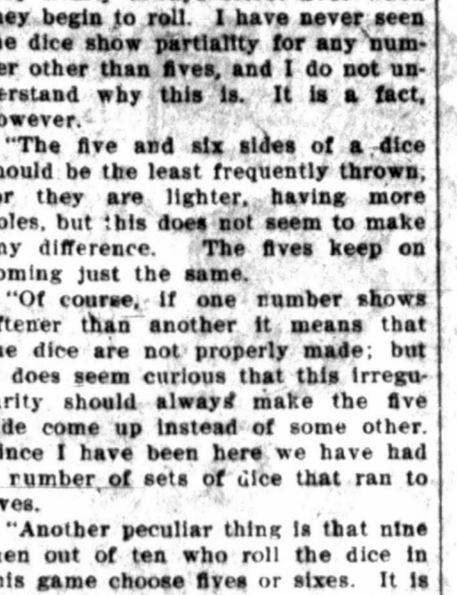
Sticks to Bank He Has Built Up.

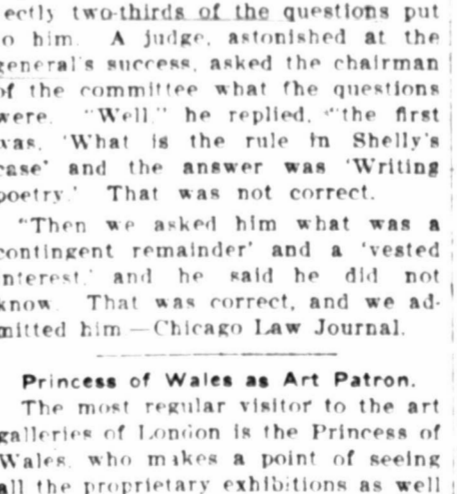

Say Pocahontas' Gravel Not To Be Found.

Gravesend, England, April 2.—The people of Gravesend do not believe the committee from Richmond, Va., or any one else can find the bones of Pocahontas in the big churchyard of St. George's parish church. The church which occupied the site in 1617, the year when Mrs. Rolfe died of smallpox in a vessel anchored off Gravesend, was destroyed by fire in 1727. The charred and nameless coffins that were removed from the vault and placed in the present churchyard are beyond identification.

There is a theory that Pocahontas was buried in the rector's vault, but it is based on nothing historical. Even if it were a fact, the location of the vault itself is not known. The new church covers it. While the Virginians are eager to find the bones of the Indian princess, the people of Gravesend are wondering why the Virginians forgot to send them a pulpit and a stained glass window for St. George's to commemorate the death of Pocahontas. Such a pulpit and window were promised two years ago, but neither has yet reached Gravesend, and the rector of St. George has had no advice that they have been shipped. Gravesend would willingly exchange the bones of Pocahontas, if they can be found, for the pulpit and stained glass windows if the latter can also be found.—Ex.
