





Fleet Apparently Want Fight

St. Petersburg, May 23 .--- The air of expectancy at the Admirality ed the important question when they which indicates that news of importance regarding Admiral Rojestven sky's fleet is awaited at any mo ment Japan is any war in which more than Officially no information regarding the admiral's whereabouts is volunteered the officers making no concealment o the fact that they are not in the secret of Rojestvensky's plans, but the mapority entertain no doubt that the Russitan fleet is now steaming toward its ultimate destination.

While there is no official confirma tion of a Hongkong report that the fleet has passed through the Bashee Channel, it is credited by those who have insisted from the beginning that Rojestvensky will give the Island of Formosa a wide berth to the westward. The admiral, it is claimed here, has had ample time to reach the Pacific since he left the waters of Indo-China. The dispatches received from the front are meager, but there are some indications that General Linevitch has taken a leaf out of Field Marshal Ovama's book at the Shahke River and at Mukden and that he is about to advance himself undertake a counter offensive, meeting the Japanese pressure against his left by advancing his right. It is early, however, to determine whether the moves thus far are more than feints.

The question of a general exchange of prisoners, on which there have been some negotiations, is still unset tled. The foreign office here is not sanguine that a general exchange is possible. A partial exchange covering the crew of the Russian volunteer fleet cruiser Ekaterinoslav, captured at the opening of the war, and the am working as steadily as before 1 crew of the Japanese steamer Sabu, captured by the Russians, has practically been effected.

WORTH REMEMBER

There are three entirely different kinds of ingredients used in making, the three different varieties of baking powders on the market, viz:-(1) Minal-Acid or Alum, (2) Bone-Acid or Phosphate, and (3) Cream of Tartar made from grapes. (1) Mineral-Acid, or Alum, is made from a kind of clay. This is mixed with diluted oil of vitriol and from this solution a product is obtained which is alum. Alum is cheap; costs about two cents a pound, and baking powder made with this Mineral-Acid sells from 10 to 25c. a pound.

(2) Bone-Acid, or Phosphate, is the basis of phosphate baking powders and the process is fully described in the patents issued to a large manufacturer of a phosphate powder. The U. S. Patent Office Report gives a full and exact description, but the following extract is enough:

"Burned bones, after being ground, are put into freshly diluted oil of itriol and with continual stirring and the following proportion," etc.

From this Bone-Acid phosphate baking powders are made: such powders sell from 20 to 30 cents a pound.

(3) Cream of Tartar exists in all ripe grapes, and flows with the juice from the press in the manufacture of wine. After the wine is drawn off the tartar is scraped from the cask, boiled with water, and crystals of Cream

of Tartar, white and very pure, separate and are collected. It differs in no respect from the form in which it originally existed in the grape. Cream of Tartar, then, while the most expensive, is the only ingredient that should be used in a baking powder to act upon the soda, as its wholesomeness is beyond question. Cream of Tartar baking powders sell at about 40 to 50 cents a pound.

Such are the facts, and every one, careful of the health of the family, should remember this rule:-Baking powders selling from 10 to 25 cents a pound are made of Mineral-Acids: those selling from 20 to 30 cents of Bone-Acid; and those from 40 to 50 cents of Cream of Tartar made from grapes.


KNEW WAYS OF TURKEYS.



The persistent manner in which Belgians cling to their medieval festivals and traditions is a characteristic national trait well known to those familiar with the Flemish and Walloon provinces. The survival of such popular fetes as that of the carnival ession of the dancing Gilles at Binche attests the innate love of Belgians for these picturesque vestiges of their forefathers' civilzation.

The festival of the dancing Gilles of Binche is in many respects the quaintest of these popular customs. This festival takes place on Mardi Gras at the Binche, a town of Hainault. Without the Gilles it would not be substantially different from that of Rome, Nice and other towns.

These Gilles, or dancing men, who form the glory of the Binche carnival, are characterized by their headdresses and humps. The headdress is most elaborate and striking. In shape it resembles the oldtime top hat of our great-grandfathers. The hat is surmounted with magnificent ostrich feathers from three to four feet in length, which give to the wearers the appearance of giants.

From each hat besides, flow several wide, variegated ribbons, while the Gilles' trousers are bedecked with trimmings of real lace and ribbons to match those of the hat. Every Gille wears a mask and a silk belt. from which hang small bells.

The entire Gille's outfit costs from \$40 to \$50, a large sum for the peasant youth, generally ----eted by the car-

Dyspeptics whose thoughts are centered on their stomachs, often unonsciously lead with the waist line just over the offending organ. Occasionally a weak-willed person permits the knees to lead. When a thin, bad walker moves rapidly, there often seems to be a race between nose and knees, and you watch to see which

will arrive at the goal first. When a young woman's skirt and a young man's trousers show a bulging shape over the knees, their owners are leading sedentary lives or have never learned to walk correctly. This part of the lower limbs should be kept straight, and the ball of the foot, not the heel, should touch the ground first. 



In the afternoon of Mardi Gras the Gilles, in full uniform, 200 strong, preceded by the local brass band and musical clubs, appear in procession and march toward the Grande place. The Gilles proceed by dancing to the tune of the band.

At every few steps they stop, bend and unbend, to heighten the effect of the ringing from the bells worn at their belts. Their streamers float to and fro, and envelop them in a rainbow of ribbon. At the same time the simultaneous ringing of bells and thumping of wooden sabots on the cobblestones sound like the echo of a cavalry charge.

The Gilles each have a straw basket hanging to one side from the belt. and filled with oranges. With these they bombard the spectators as they dance along. As soon as emptied, the baskets are filled again by men from behind, appointed for this duty. A general battle of oranges then takes place between the Gilles and the carnival merrymakers.

Finally the procession reaches the town hall, in front of which, seated on a platform, is the mayor, surrounded by the municipal officials. The Gilles then terminate the day's festivities by a general war dance, giving a prolonged exhibition of their capabilities.





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The Looked For Settlement Knocked Out by Shea.

Chicago, May 19 .-- Peace in the teamsters strike is still hanging in the balance and although it is generally expected that a settlement will soon be reached it seems further away than

It was confidently asserted by the Team Owners' Association that the teamsters had consented to arbitrate with them the question of whether or not union teamsters should make deliveries to the boycotted houses. President Shea of the teamsters upset this arrangement entirely, declaring that he had never agreed to any such proposition. Members of the Team Own ers' Association however, stated just as positively that the officers of the union had agreed to such arrange-

This misundrestanding caused halt in impending settlement, and a meeting was arranged for tonight between the Team Owners' Association and the Teamsters.

At the headquarters of both organiza tions it was denied that such a meeting was to be held ,but it is positively known that arrangements were made for the conference.

For the first time in several days the spirit of riot broke out and there were numerous fights between nonunion and union teamsters. One of the disturbances at Twenty-Second street and Indiana Avenue blocked all traffic and delayed street cars half an hour. The police were compelled to use their clubs vigorously in order to disperse the crowd and made several arrests. A nonunion driver for the wholesale grocery house of Steel, Weddels & Co., who was the original cause of the outbreak through no cause of his own, was badly beaten before the police could save him.

In some portions of the south side vigorous antagonism to union men has developed and the teamster wearing a union button and driving through those sections meets with about the same treatment as a nonunion man does when passing the teamsters readquarters. Several union teamsters were attacked yesterday near Twenty-Sixth street and Wentworth Avenue and their union buttons torn off.

The union men were also vigorously punched before making their escape. President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor who has been in Chicago for the past two days negotiating for peace in the present trouble, left of Dayton, O., last night. medicines. Sun Spots and Magnetic Storms. The discovery of the periodicity of magnetic storms has been explained by Mr. Walter Maunder to the British Astronomical Association. By the discussion of some hundreds of Greenwich Observatory records Mr. Maunder was led to the inference that magnetic storms occur at intervals of twenty-seven days eight hours-which is the period of the sun's revolution on its axis with respect to the earth. A magnetic storm is one that perturbs the compass needle, interferes with electric currents and impedes telegraphy, and Mr. Maunder's discovery amounts to this, that when a particular part of the sun's surface is turned toward the earth-say a sun spot-it may cause a magnetic disturbance. which will probably be repeated twenty-seven and one-third days later, though there may be periods of no disturbance. The magnetic storm consists, Mr. Maunder believes, of material particles, doubtless electrically charged, shot from a sun-spot region, in streamers, like water from a hose -or like the rays emitted from radium. If this be so, then the earth's atmosphere must be subject to solar combardments-which has for some time been believed-and certain areas or spots of the sun's surface must be scenes of special forms of activity. more or less continuous.

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
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

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
