DAMAGE IS TREMNDOUS.

Some Thirty-Five Lives and Thousands

in Property. Gainesville, Tex., July 7 .- Since cyclone Wednesday afternoon the death roll has grown to between twenty-five and thirty. About half of these deaths were people who were seriously injured in the storm and succumbed to their wounds. About fifteen were killed outright.

The cyclone formed west of Barrel Springs and traveled in a southeasterly direction for seven or eight miles quarters of a mile wide and everything was destroyed. Some fifteen houses were demolished. The storm was preceded directly by an hour of cool breezes which succeeded a day of very great heat, when the wind very quickly but not suddenly increased in velocity until the force of the storm was on at about 3:30 o'clock. toes always at a very low level. Potatoes are also a considerable output of the truck farms of Michigan. their normal market being obtained in and through Detroit and Chicago and other communities of that region.

Not many years ago favoring sun and rains brought a tremendous yield of potatoes from the Michigan fields. At normal rates and prices there would have been a glut of the customary markets and the potatoes would have rotted on the farms. To help the potato growers the railroads from Michigan made unprecedentedly low rates on potatoes to every reachable market, even carrying them in large quantities to a place so remote as Boston. The Aroostook growers had to reduce the price on their potatoes and even then could not dispose of them unless the Boston and Maine Railroad reduced its already low rate, which it did. By means of these low rates, making possible low prices, the potato crops of both Michigan and Maine were finally marketed. Everybody eats potatoes, and that year everybody had all the potatoes he wanted.

While the Michigan railroads made rates that would have been ruinous to the railroads, had they been applied to the movement of all potatoes at all times, to all places, they helped their patrons to find markets then. The loston and Maine Railroad suffered a decrease in its revenue from potatoes. but it enabled the Aroostook farmers to market their crop and thereby to obtain money which they spent for the varied supplies which the railroads rates were subject to governmental adjustment such radical and prompt action could never have been taken. because it is well established that if a rate be once reduced by a railroad the red tape of governmental procedure.
