**One of the curious things run across in Europe is the scheme of a Frenchman named Michael Breal, broached as long ago as 1886, and which is being again taken up.**  
It consists of a wholesale exchange, a swapping of children, from one family to another, says a recent report.

Here is a Parisian father in modest estate, with a son. This man has an ambition that his child shall have a thorough knowledge of German. The proper thing would be to place the child in some German family for awhile. But the difficulty for the father is to discover just the right sort of family—one who would receive the child, one that he could trust with the child, and, above all, one who had a child to swap. The Parisian father would be spending no extra money in housing the German child and teaching it French, while his own was eating at a German table. Meanwhile two nations were understanding each other better. It was a splendid scheme, if only it could be carried out.

What was needed was a baby broker, as it were, an exchange, a clearing house for children, an agency to keep tabs of families willing to swap children and to engineer the swap. A man named Tom Mathieu saw the chance, and improved it during the vacation period last year. He had prejudices to overcome. After a deal of letter writing he won the indispensable, not to say inevitable, sanction of college professors, of great authors, prominent lawyers and members of parliament. He even succeeded in placing an order of five children on trial. He devoted a whole year to booming the enterprise. And it was heart-breaking work. He would win the approval of a lot of English or German or Scandinavian families, only to find in his own land no readiness of trade. And yet, in spite of everything, he has succeeded in a measure. The scheme is working and Mr. Mathieu has decided to found a society and push the idea for all it is worth.

This society is to be known by the solemn title of "International Exchange for Children in the Study of Foreign Languages and Customs." For honorary president it is to have M. D'Estournelles De Constant; for acting president, Pierre Baudin former minister; for vice president, M. Firmery and Edouard Petit, Inspector general of public instruction. Mathieu himself will serve as general manager, with the backing of deputies of the chamber if necessary. Jules Siegfried and a lot of others will look after the financing.

An elaborate system of correspondence has been drawn up already. There is a precautionary exchange of photographs first and a severe cross-examination of all concerned. The closing details of the railroad journey, under suitable escorts in the case of girls, are easily looked after by the exchange.

Editor States-Graphic: NASHVILLE, TENN., Sept. 5, 1905.—I have just read Fell Jones' letter, published in your last paper. It stirs a thousand memories—many a pleasure, some of pain and regret, for it brings home to me that I am separated, probably for the balance of my life, from those whose associations I prized very highly and whose places can never be filled in a strange country, among acquaintances made in middle life. It brings back in memory, and again re-enacts the stirring and momentous events of the years that are gone, among the people of dear old Haywood.

Recently I was asked what made Joe Folk great, what sustained him in his splendid fight in Missouri? And I answered that he was reared among a people whose virtues and splendid manhood was inspiration sufficient to account for any excellency which he had developed. I doubt if any success, however, or any achievement can compensate for the separation from the friends of our youth. In later life and among a stranger people one may make many friends, but they are never so dear as those with whom we were reared, and whose fathers knew, and were friends to our fathers.

I never had much taste for writing for publication, but Fell Jones' letter disposes me to write this. You will remember well, Mr. Editor, the time when Fell Jones, Will Scott and a few other earnest, patient, fearless men represented all that promised redemption for old Haywood. I remember how they bided their time, patiently waiting, always working, counting no sacrifice too great to accomplish their purpose, namely, the redemption and control of your county. Was there a journey to be taken, money to be spent, risk and danger to be assumed without a murmur, these men responded to the demands of the occasion. I remember a convention of the white men of Haywood county, men wearied and angered by the then existing conditions, determined that patience had ceased to be a virtue, ready to assume any risk for a change, feeling that self-respect, as well as the well-being of the county and the material prosperity of its people, demanded an escape from conditions which had become intolerable.

Do you know who was responsible for the movement which resulted in the convention, and to whom all looked for guidance and direction, to whom we clung like shipwrecked mariners cling to the last plank when night and darkness are around? It was Fell Jones, Will Scott and one or two more, who enjoyed our confidence and lent their co-operation, a brainier, braver man, a more loyal friend, with a sweeter, kinder heart than Fell Jones never lived. To me, he has always been, and will always be, the noblest Roman of them all. By his side, close to him, in every way worthy of his friendship and love, stood Will Scott, cool, calm, brave, loyal, obliging, self-sacrificing, faithful always, even unto the end.

Were I selected to crown two men in Haywood county for the best service to the people of the county at a time when hope seemed almost to have departed, I would place the wreaths upon the heads of Fell Jones and Will Scott.

I wish I could be with you, as one of the manor horns, with all the rights and privileges of long ago, to once more hold up the hands of him who deserves so well of every man of the dear old county. Capt. W. M. Scott. FRANK P. BORD.

To all whom it may concern: In accordance with chapter 31, acts of the 30th Legislative Assembly of New Mexico, notice is hereby given that the Cattle Sanitary Board of New Mexico, on August 10, 1905, did determine from evidence and facts before it, that mange or scabies exist among neat cattle ranging and grazing within that district of country and upon the lands and pastures used for ranging and grazing neat cattle described as follows: All of that portion of the Territory of New Mexico lying within the boundaries of Roosevelt county.

Albuquerque, New Mexico, July 26th, 1905. To Inspectors and employees The following list of dips are recommended by the Bureau of Animal Industry. The stock owner is authorized to make the selection from the list, and Bureau employees can not discriminate in this matter. Animals must remain in the swim between two and three minutes.

Label should contain "Derby Nicotine Solution."

Tobacco Extracts. (Tob. & S.) Laidlaw & Mackill's Tobacco Extract and Laidlaw & Mackill's Nicotine Tobacco Powder, "Thistle Brand" (Containing 4 per cent nicotine) M.T.D. at Richmond, Virginia. Henderson's Tobacco Extract, M.T.D. at Henderson, Kentucky. Black Leaf, M.T.D. by Kentucky Product Co., Louisville, Kentucky. Burch's Tobacco Extract, M.T.D. by F. S. Burch & Co. Inc., Chicago, Ill. Label should contain "Burch's Tobacco Extract."

And during the continuation of said infected districts it shall be unlawful for any cattle belonging to or under the control of any person, firm or corporation within said infected district, to be removed therefrom, except for the purpose of being dipped and then only by written permission of a properly authorized agent of this Board. Provided, however, that cattle which have been properly dipped and certified to by an inspector of the Department of Agriculture, shall be entitled to free and unrestricted movement.
