Roots of Plants.

For a long time the foots of plants have been studied, and the longer the study is carried on, the more surprising are the results. All the theories as to how plants should root have been destroyed by the actual facts being brought to light. Thus, it has been assumed that plants that bearpods and are assisted by tubercles on the roots to gather nitrogen from the air would be rather shallow rooters, but would have a large root system. On investigation, we find that this is true in some plants and not true in others. There seems to be as great a divergence of processes of rooting in the leguminosae family as in any others. Thus the alfalfa plant sends down its roots to an immense depth, sometimes 30 and even 40 feet. 
