PORTALES AND INLAND VALLEY

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In Roosevelt County, New Mexico.

PORTALES.

PORTALES, the county seat of Roosevelt county is a town of 1200 or 1500 inhabitants near the center of the county, and in the heart of the famous Inland Valley. All lines of business common to a live western town are found here. We have several general merchandise and three drug stores, three coal and grain stores, two good, strong banks, 3 livery stables, local and long distance telephones and a good public school building. Our school is conducted by a corps of seven excellent teachers and runs about nine months each year. We have just completed a splendid stone court . house and are now at work on a good stone jail and arranging to commence a \$25,000.00 school building which is urgently demanded by our rapidly developing town and county.

INLAND VALLEY

Is a broad valley about 100 feet lower than the surrounding plains country and it from six to twelve miles wide by forty to fifty miles in length.

Water of excellent quality and in inexhaustible quantity is found throughout this valley at from six to forty feet deep. In town; and the larger portion of the country it is only 16 feet deep. We had a test made here of our water supply in 1903 with a 14-horse power gasoline engine and a rotary or centrifugal pump on an ordinary well in town and it furnished water to run pump at its full capacity of 600 gallons per minute for several hours. So we have the greatest opportunities for cheap irrigation by pumping to be found anywhere.

Roosevelt County is located on parallel 34 of north latitude and is on the west line of Texas. 
