By that section, before a license to do business in a precinct, village, town or city having not more than 500 inhabitants, is issued, there must be paid by the applicant a tax of

Where the inhabitants of a precinct, town, village of city are over 500 and not more than 1,000, the tax is \$200. Where the inhabitants of a precinct, town, village or city are more than 1,-

000, the tax is \$400. The above section was amended by the last Legislature. See section 1, page 327, of the session laws of 1905, but this amendment does not affect the point involved in your inquiry.

Section 1305 of the Compiled Laws of 1897 fixes a uniform tax for keeping gaminb tables. It is provided that there shall be assessed and collected in the manner prescribed by law as in the cases of other licenses, a tax of \$200, for a period of twelve months, to be paid in advance upon each gaming ta-ble or apparatus whatever.

In answer to question No. 2. You are advised that the taxes on liquor and gaming licenses are collected by the sheriff and are turned over by him to the county treasurer, whose duty it is to dispose of the same as follows: Two-thirds thereof go to the school district from which the tax or license came or were paid, one-third goes to the general school fund if the county. See section 6, page 47, Session Laws of 1901.

In answer to question No. 3. You are advised that incorporated towns and cities have the power to issue a license and collect a tax for selling or giving away intoxicating liquors within the limits of the incorporation and also have the right to regulate gaming and issue a license and collect a tax for the same in addition to the license issued and collected thereon by the territory. have to say that under section 2406, this territory, renews its declaration Compiled Laws 897, all moneys coltected for a signated of an in-corporated town or city are to be paid

to the treasurer of the incorporation at such time and in such manner as may be prescribed by ordinance. I find no statute requiring the funds to be used in whole or in part for the public schools. The school board of any incorporated town or city is empowered to levy a tax for the support of the public schools in addition to the general levy made for school purposes by the county, but this has no reference to the tax paid on account the license granted by a town or city for selling intoxicating liquors

Fearful Massacres Took Place All Over

Russia. Et. Petersburg.—The revolutionary wave continues to subside except in the Caucasus. As details of what happened throughout European Russia during the upheaval arrive the stories grow more revolting. In the Baltic provinces, revolt and incendiarism prevailed. In Poland even the clergy, Catholic and Protestant, participated in the manifestations in favor of the autonomy of the ancient kingdom. In southwestern Russia hardly a city or town escaped Jewish massacres.

At Tomsk, Siberia, according to the latest reports received here, the whole population of 40,000 and the military stood by while 600 men, women and children were burned in a theater. The court house at Tomsk and the mayor's residence where the students and revolutionists took refuge from the mob, were burned and those who tried to flee were killed in the streets. Every one of the exaggerated reports of the affair received credence in many quarters and half the inhabitants of the capital believed that the mutiny was successful; that the troops sent from here had joined in the revolt, that the entire garrison of St. Petersburg would follow suit to-day and that the town of Cronstadt had been burned to the ground.



BALLOTS NOW UNDER GUARD

Spectacular Features of New York Aayoralty Contest-Election Board Compelled to Take Charge of Bal-

New York.—Attorney General Mayer stated Thursday night that he has re-ceived information of the recovery from the North river of certain ballot boxes used in the election of Tuesday last. He said the matter was under indigation. Mr. Mayer refused to discuss the reported finding of the ballot boxes in the river, further than to say that such reports had come to him, it being said the boxes were picked up

The contest over the mayoralty elec-tion inaugurated by William Randolph Hearst, the Municipal Ownership can-didate, developed interesting and spectacular features Thursday.

For twelve hours the boxes containing nearly 600,000 ballots cast in last Tuesday's election choked the streets in the vicinity of the headquarters of the Board of Elections in Sixth avenue between Forty-first and Forty-second streets. REVOLUTION IN BRAZIL.

Capital Garrison and Harbor Squadron Join Rebels.

Buenos Avres .- A revolution has just broken out in Rio de Janeiro against the Brazilian government. It is both military and naval. The entire garrison of the capital has rebelled and the squadron in the harbor has sided with the revolutionists and threatens to bombard the city. Hundreds of per sons have been killed in encounters in the streets.

One dispatch says that the trouble began with a mutiny of the garrison of the fort of Santa Cruz, due to the ill treatment of a sergeant by the officer in command. Col. Pedro Inc was arrested and Major Freire and an ensign were killed. Troops, were sent there to quell the mutiny,

At the Brazilian legation there is no news of the outbreak, but Brazilian residents here say that a revolution would not surprise them, as the chiefs of the last revolutionary attempt were recently pardoned, the principal leader being Lauro Sodre, who was very active.

Utah and Idaho Earthquakes.

Salt Lake.-An earthquake shock passing from north to south was felt in Utah and Idaho points Saturday afternoon. In this city the disturb rattled on shelves and in Ogden occupants of a high office building fled to the street, fearing a collapse.

The greatest disturbance was at Shoshone, Idaho, where two shocks followed each other in rapid succession at 8:45 Saturday night.

Members of the mob declared that it was known to them that he had made a confession to the County Attorney and Sheriff implicating the other four.

The belief of the officers was that the people were willing to let the law take its course.

The mob worked so quietly tonight that persons living 100 yards away from the scene of the lynching were not aroused from their sleep.

That brigade made its mark on every battlefield during the four years of conflict. No troops in the southern army fought with more courage than Judge Hunt's regiment. Judge Hunt served through the war with Stonewall Jackson always maintaining that bold courage that made the name of Jackson a terror to the enemy. 

PORTALES AND INLAND VALLEY

In Roosevelt County, New Mexico.

PORTALES.

PORTALES, the county seat of Roosevelt county is a town of 1200 or 1500 inhabitants near the center of the county, and in the heart of the famous Inland Valley. All lines of business common to a live western town are found here. We have several general merchandise and three drug stores, three coal and grain stores, two good, strong banks, 3 livery stables, local and long distance telephones and a good public school building. in length. Water of excellent quality and in inexhaustible quantity is found throughout this valley at from six to forty feet deep. In town and the larger portion of the country it is only 16 feet deep. We had a test made here of our water supply in 1903 with a 14-horse power gasoline engine and a rotary or centrifugal pump on an ordinary well in town and it furnished water to run pump at its full capacity of 600 gallons per minute for several hours. So we have the greatest opportunities for cheap irrigation by pumping to be found anywhere.

Roosevelt County is located on parallel 34 of north latitude and is on the west line of Texas. 


