Moscow, Dec. 26 .- The fighting, with rday morning, raged all day. Behind barricade and from wall and parpet every conceivable missle of death was hurled at the soldiers.

At an early hour Monday morning the essualties at Moscow were estimated at 5,000 killed and 14,000 wounded, with the fighting still proceeding.

From fragmentary reports received from Moscow, I gather that the civil war has brought no decisive action, but only a thickening of the blood cloud, and intensifying of the horrors and increase of prevailing bitterness.

The driving force behind both the troops and the rebels is no longer that of enthusiasm or of any human impulse. It is the force of superhuman hate, and the deeds reported are not the acts of patriots, soldiers or otherwise, but the enormities of mad men.

It is impossible to understand how any emotion, even of the extremes of despair or hate, can impart such fool-

For every barricade destroyed Sunday two or three appeared in other places. Orders were given by the revtroops until they lose patience.

In the meantime in their houses the bulk of the population cowers in the plosion of a bomb.

The most surprising thing of all is the loyalty of the troops, which nobody here anticipated.

Taiking with an intelfigent group of St. Petersburg revolutionists, I was informed that while they believed the strike would be victorious, they fully realized that they were staking everything upon the issue and that failure would set back their cause for several years. They said they were devoting their efforts to shaking the foundstions of Russian finance, in full confidence that once the existing regime was overthrown, they could as quickly build another, and that foreign Nations would be as ready to advance the autocracy. ## Roosevelt County,

Roosevelt county/New Mexico is just now receiving the greatest influx of settlers since its organization. Three principal reasons may be stated as the cause of so many people coming into this area.

First:-The large area of free public lands subject to Homestead and desert land entry. Roosevelt county embraces an area, for the most part, of level prarie land, bearing a good growth of mosquite and grama grasses and baving a deep sandy loam soil, easy of cultivation, presenting to the prospective farmer an attractive location.

Second:-The building of the New Mexico Eastern Railway through the county east and west from Texico on the east line to Sumner on the west line. At the time of the commencement of grade work on this railway line in mid-summer 1905, only a part of the land in the township next west from Texico had been filed upon. The railroad extending over free government land, took advantage of the provision of the United States law and reserved twenty acres for switch area at practically every ten mile distance. Thus giving the locating settler assurance of a convenient depot and shipping station, as well as the prospect of being near the postoffice and town. Adding the foregoing to the further and third cause, to-wit: That the people already here engaged in farming can show, for the year 1905, a product of agriculture quite as good as that produced in areas further east and north where prices of lands and rents are high and you have the reasonable cause for the unprecedented inflow of settlers.

Already along the line of the New Mexico Eastern Railway townsites have been laid out notably at Newman 16 miles west' of Texico, to which from Texico the public lands have been filed upon solidly for several miles north d south of the railway. At Brownhorn, 35 miles west of Texico, where the lands are now being taken up, a post office and general merchandise store have been established and at

Portales, where frequently as many as twenty applications are taken in a single day, and whole townships of land that but a short time ago were practically vacant are now covered solidly with filings. Last week in one day at the same time 59 homeseekers set out along the line from Texico hunting locations, some of these of course found suitable lands a few miles out from Texico, some near Newman and some in the vicinity of Sumner.
