R. C. Reed Interviewed as to the Pros pective Towns Along this Line.

Mr. R. C. Reid of Roswell and right of way agent for the Santa Fe Railway company, was in town a few days since on legal business and while here the Times man had the following interview

with him: When Mr. Reid was seled what would be the division point on the Eastern Railway he replied "I cannot say exactly where it will be for the reason that it has not been finally determined, it will be at some point however between Texico and the Pecos

Mr. Reid was then asked whether or not Texico would be a division point and he replied "No, it is certain that fexico will not be a division point for the reason that it is only ninety-five miles from Amarillo and the trainmen's schedual calls for a hundred miles pay for this run and the company could not afford to make a ninety-five mile division and pay for one hundred. The first division west from Amerillo is practically level and will in all probability be made longer than the next

one which is about all maximum grade' What about the towns along this new road was then asked. "Well they largely depend upon what the people choose to make them.
