Looks Like Horseplay.

With Nothing at all to Do Some Members of the House Extend the Session.

Austin, Texas, March 30.—A staff correspondent of the Morning News, says today: "Boiled down, the House halting all day long. In other words, it exploited itself in the way of speeches and sparring for time that justification for drawing pay might be apparent to the masters, the public. The mileage and per diem bill was passed so that in the event any one might want his salary and his traveling expenses it would be ready for him as far as the House could make it ready for him, the Senate not even having considered this bill. That done, it proceeded to consume time in calls of the House, a dilatory tactic, and in motions to adjourn."

In the morning the Hogg memorial exercises consumed a part of the time. That was somewhat a relief to those who wanted, unlike Joshua, for the sun to hump itself in rising and setting.

A bill has to be read on three several days before it is passed, unless the rules are suspended. This particular bill, providing for a semi-blanket primary, could have been sent back to the Senate within two hours after its passage to third reading by the House if a majority of that body really wanted to get away, since it would have been highly embarrassing indeed inexcusable to draw a salary for a week's work. Besides, the pay for a week's work is larger than for two or three days' work.

Therefore, when the motion to suspend the rules and place the bill on its last reading and final passage was offered, it was fought by such dilatory tactics as a call of the House, motions to adjourn and the like.

Finally an adjournment was had and the bill went over.

GREATEST GAS FIRE QUENCHED.
After Burning Thirty-four Days Engineers Succeeded with Hood.

Independence, Kan.—The great Canyon gas well fire is out at last. The flames were extinguished at 5:23 o'clock Thursday afternoon. After Wednesday's failure it was announced that the hood method of fighting the fire would be abandoned, but it was finally decided to make one more attempt—the eighth. The second hood was used for the trial. The ground around the well was made wet and soft. Steam pipes from the several boilers were connected to the top vent of the hood, just over the gate valve. The hood was then successfully dropped over the well with the big crane. It sunk deep into the mud and the only fire was from the top vent.

Then yard after yard of heavy canvas was sewed together and soaked in mud and water, and first a layer of canvas and then a layer of gumbo was built around the hood until tons of earth and over one hundred yards of cloth had been used. Then the hood was anchored with guy wires and chains. A long arm was attached to the valve wheel, and to the end of this was arranged a big spool, around which was wound a large quantity of wire.

The subduing of this well is regarded among oil men as the greatest achievement in the history of natural gas. No other fire of equal size was ever extinguished. The well was struck by lightning about 5:30 on Feb. 23, and burned thirty-four days. It cost \$26,000 to shut it in and the valve of the gas burned was more than \$100,000.

Prominent El Pasoan's Sudden Death.
El Paso: John Kneale of El Paso, contractor for repairs on the courthouse at Pecos, was discovered dead in his bed at the Goodie House Thursday morning. He was a pioneer resident of this city. He came to this city in 1883. Three weeks ago he went to Pecos to take the contract for remodeling the courthouse. A letter received from him Wednesday showed that he was in good spirits and apparently in perfect health.

Timberman's Horrible Death.
Colmesneil: A terrible accident befell Edgar Shillings a few days ago at Moblesfort. Some parties were felling a tree, and thinking it would fall another way, did not give warning, and Edgar Shillings, who was standing by sharpening his saw, was struck by some of the falling limbs. Three of his ribs were broken, and the timber was driven in his back, making a fearful wound. The doctors say he can not live.

Big Store Burned at Terrell.
Terrell: Jacob Label's stock of dry goods was destroyed by fire Thursday morning. The fire spread over the whole interior of the store and completely ruined the entire stock, which is valued at \$1,600. The brick building in which the stock was located, is considerably damaged but no estimate has been made on it yet. The stock was insured for \$5,500. The building was insured for \$2,500. The origin of the fire is unknown.
