questions. Justice demands that we be held to the letter of our lawful contracts, lest the other party be damaged by our failure. Knowing this, we should apply a few common sense rules in our dealings with others.

First, let's take a look at the ordinary verbal agreement. Any terms about which you do not reach a specific agreement will probably be supplied by the customs of the particular business, or by a pattern set up by your previous dealings with the other party. Do you understand those customs? If not, talk it over. Have a clear conception of your obligations and the other party's duties. And be sure that he, too, understands fully.

If you have doubts concerning the integrity of the other party, why deal with him at all? If you feel compelled to deal with him in spite of doubts, try to complete your oral agreement in the presence of other, disinterested persons. Their version of the terms may be helpful later.

One of the greatest difficulties with verbal contracts is that of proving exactly what agreement was reached when an argument over terms later winds up in the courthouse. Human memories are faulty, and we have difficulty recalling the exact words spoken six months, or even six days, ago. A written memorandum signed by both parties at the time or even a simple exchange of letters assenting to the material terms, may prevent trouble.

When executing a written contract without benefit of legal counsel, take time to read and understand every word, even at the risk of being considered dull. Read especially the fine print, or regulations printed on the back forming a part of the contract.

Be wary when the other party offers a verbal explanation which seems at variance with the printed terms. When you get to court, you will probably find that the printed word means just what it says, and that the contradictory oral explanation will not be admitted as evidence.

### CONTRACT PRECAUTIONS OUTLINED

Since contracts may be entered into quite informally, many people fall into serious difficulties by binding themselves to agreements which they do not fully understand. It is very easy for the unvarying individual to obligate himself beyond his intent or ability to perform, and thereby invite litigation and consequent judgment of forced performances or damages in favor of the other party or contract.

Contracts are absolutely essential to the functioning of modern business. In order to plan for the future—to set up a business, insure a steady supply of necessary materials and goods, set a price and delivery date on what we have to sell, etc.—we know that the courts will, if necessary, enforce the contracts we make with others.

Only a minute percentage of the millions of contracts annually made find their way to the courts. But by seeing that the exceptional cases which reach litigation is settled justly, the courts make it possible for the remaining multitude of transactions to be conducted with a minimum of friction.

How can we minimize the possibilities of litigation over our contracts? How can we protect ourselves in the event we should later wind up in court? A clear understanding of all terms of every agreement entered into may prove the best answer to both

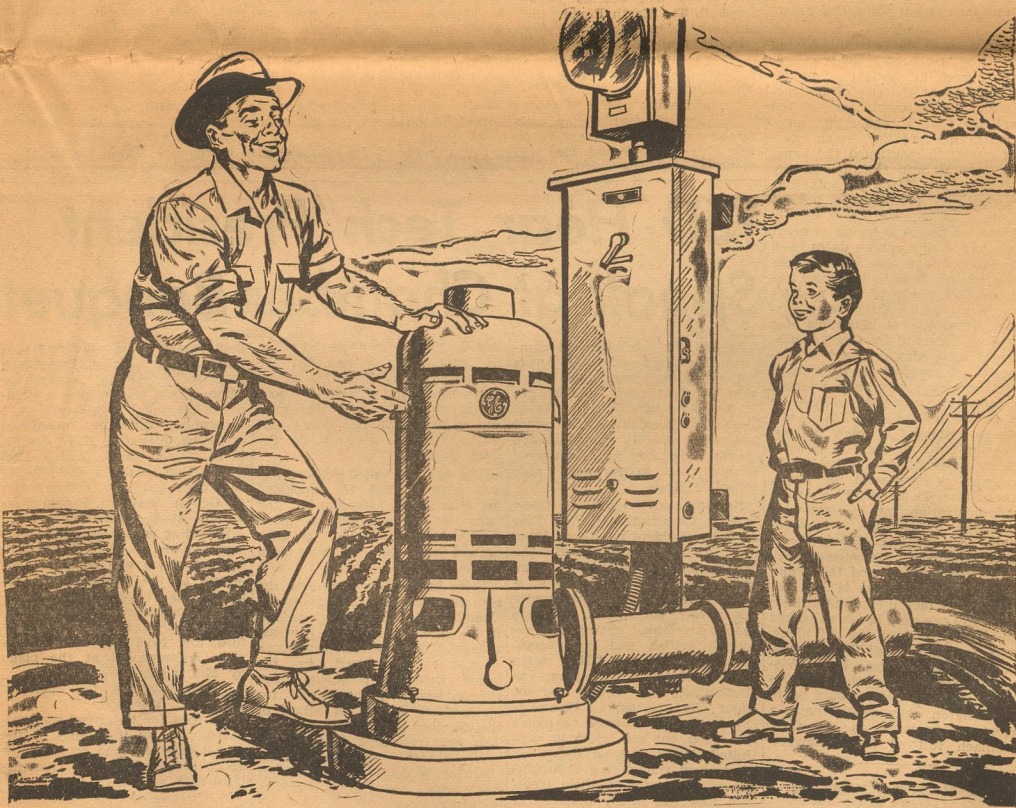

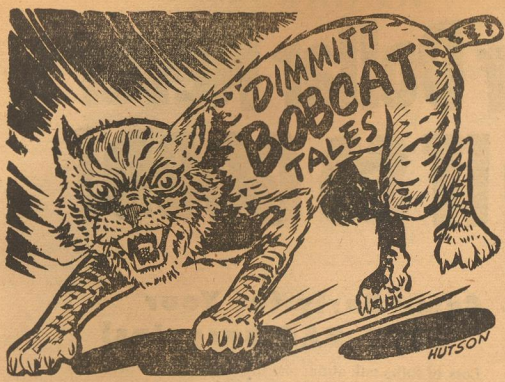

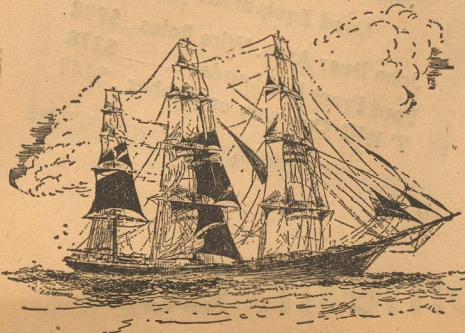

The JAMES BAINES, built in 1854, was in many ways the finest of all Donald McKay's designs. A record breaker in every line, she had 13,000 square yards of sail area, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute. On her first voyage from Boston to Liverpool, which she made in 12 1/2 days, she was timed as making 20 knots as she raced along the Irish coast with the wind strong and very squally. This is twice as fast as the Liberty ships built for World War II. Instead of a graceful lady as a figurehead, the JAMES BAINES boasted a statue of her red-haired owner on her bow, complete from drooping whiskers and chimney-pot hat to peg-top trousers. 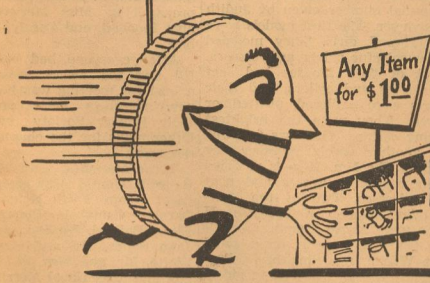

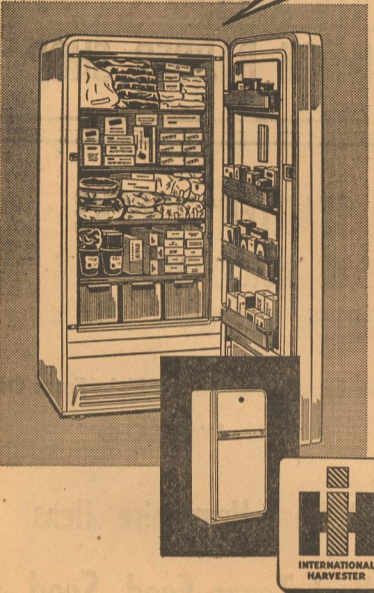

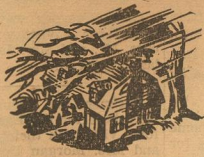

**MEMPHIS**—(from the Memphis Democrat) A bill creating the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water District to serve seven Panhandle and Northwest Texas towns was signed into law Wednesday (April 14) by Gov. Shivers. The Authority will serve Memphis, Clarendon, Hedley, Paducah, Wellington, Childress and Quanah. Under the proposal, a dam would be built on the upper Salt Fork of Red River, probably in the vicinity of Hedley. Preliminary surveys have indicated that the dam would impound approximately 100,000 acre feet of water from a watershed of about 750

square miles. The dam would be of earth. The proposed lake would have a dependable annual yield of around 25,000 acre feet, the engineering report estimated. This would serve the domestic needs of all seven towns that have subscribed to the Authority.

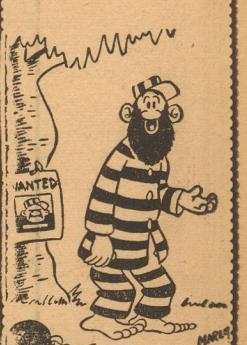

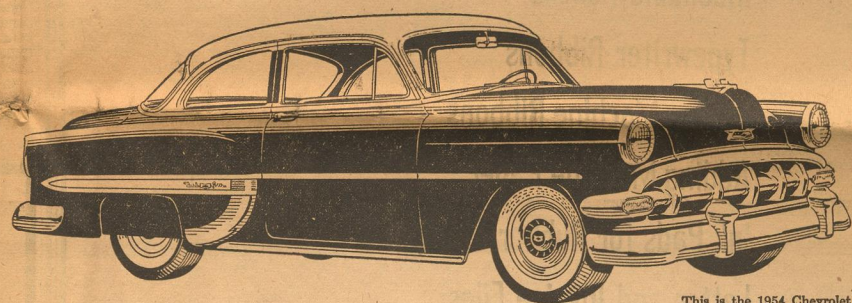

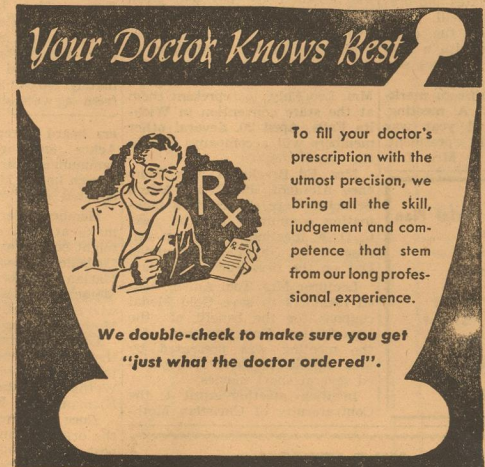

## WALTER ROGERS' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

**Back In Washington**  
This Newsletter is being written just a few hours after I returned to the Capitol city from a most pleasant visit to the district. When I first got to the Panhandle, the dust was blowing and it was about as dry as it could get. However, when I left, a drizzling, soaking rain had quenched the thirst of the wheat and grass and had changed the gray color of the earth to a rich brown that blended perfectly with the different hues of green. Some folks claim that it even made the people smile. However, one fellow accounted for this as follows: He said that Panhandle folks always smile. The rain just washed the dust off so other folks could see it. A pretty good philosophy and easy to prove out West. Anyway, we are glad we got the rain, because if anyone needed it, we did. I don't claim that I brought it, but I'll tell you one thing: I'm certainly proud that we came along together. I don't want to stretch my luck, but if it gets that dry again, I'm sure willing to take on the role of rainmaker.

One of the first things I ran into when I got back to Washington was the fanfare and trumpet blowing of the investigations, past, present and future. I thought this would probably die down some during my absence, but it seems to have gained momentum. They are now having trouble finding investigators to investigate the investigators who are now being investigated by those who were investigated by the investigating investigators. They are thinking of having a limited number of badges made up so that there will be no confusion as to who is the investigator and who is the investigatee from day to day. As the investigation shifts from one side to the other, the badges will do likewise. This is an economy move to

keep down the cost of badges. I have been a member of the American Bar Association, as well as the Texas Bar Association, for a number of years, and I deeply respect the members of both Associations. However, I do not think that the Senate Investigating Committee should confine their search to the American Bar Association. There are many able members of that Association who could do an outstanding job, but that does not mean that there are not plenty of good lawyers in the United States who are not leading figures in the American Bar Association, who could do a wonderful job of investigating this situation here in Washington. In fact, I have often said that a good West Texas county or district attorney, with a good West Texas grand jury, could probably get more facts in shorter time than has been the case in the past. I know a number of good justice of the peace lawyers that could really make this thing sizzle, if it's the truth they want the facts. A good justice of the peace and a couple of good county seat lawyers can get more facts and more truth in less time than many an investigating committee.

Speaking of investigations, I made a little private one of my own to find out how many organizations listed as subversive by the Attorney General and the Un-American Activities Committee, were enjoying second class mail permits. (The second class mail is that class of mail that has never paid its own way. The taxpayers must make up the deficit out of tax money.) I found that two organizations having second class mail permits are on the Attorney General's Federal Employee Security Program list. One of these is the "Daily Worker." On the "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications" (House Document 137, 82nd Congress, 1st Session), I find twenty-three, including the two that were on the Attorney General's list. It seems rather odd to me that while we are supposed to be fighting Communism, we are helping to pay the cost of spreading some of its propaganda. I introduced a bill to put a stop to this two years ago and hope to get it passed this session.

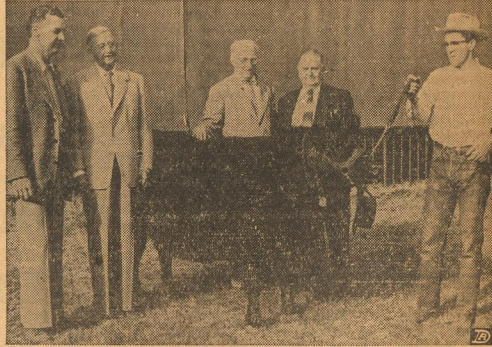
