Mexico is the possessor of such vast and valuable soda lakes that the government refuses to dispose of them to anyone or at any price. President Diaz believing that they are yet to become sources of enormous income to the country, just as the nitrate of soda beds are to Chini.

At only one other place in the world is natural soda found under conditions which admit of industrial development, and even there it must be shipped hundreds of miles by rail and many tons of water must be evaporated by coal, to obtain a ton of the product.

But at the Bay of Adair, only a mile from the coast of Lower California. under the blazing sun of the desert, lie vast lakes of crystals of carbonate of soda, with the appearance of masses of snow and ice but from which will be made millions of tons of soap and other millions of tons of glass.



HIPPLE'S HEAVY FORGERIES.

Found to Have Gone the Limit in Daring Transactions.

Philadelphia, Pa., September 8.-Forgeries for more than a quarter of a million dollars by Frank K. Hipple, the suicide president of the defunct Real Estate Trust Company, have been discovered by Receiver Earle. The latter made this statement last night, adding that he had no idea where Hipple's villainy would end. Hipple, in orde. to meet his immediate overdrafts, used the names of some of the most prominent business men of this city on notes which in some cases amounted to \$150,000.

The president had taken copies of the signatures of a number of business men while some of their checks or negotiable securities passed through his hands, but in every case he avoided use of the name of a Real Estate Trust Company depositor.

When pinched for money to meet his overdrafts or some big Segal loan, Mr. Earle said, as a last resort, Hipple would draw up a note with the forged signature attached. This he would take to the cashier or paying teller, saying he had positively made the loan and that it was discounted. With the amount to his credit he would satisfy the pressing claim.

SIMPLIFIERS MULTIPLY.

A Large Number of Colleges and Universities in Line.

New York: The simplified spelling board prior to Aug. 1, 1906, received the signatures of 825 college presidents, professors, instructors and university officers who agree to use the three hundred words so far as practicable in their own correspondence. This university influence is greatest in New York state where 130 persons connected with universities and colleges joined the movement. Illinois comes next with universities; Massachusetts third, with 92; California comes next with 67; Michigan, with 52; Missouri sends 42; Pennsylvania 31. and Connecticut, Indiana, Kansas and Maryland each have more than twenty champions of the new spelling in high institutions of learning. 




