Farmers' Co-Operative Union Of America

Now is the time of the year when the seductive lightning rod, patent chum and the patent washing machine man gets in his work. Look out for the man with the most wonderful grape that ever was, and also the enterprising newspaper that will give you some new and wonderful sort of corn that will produce so lavishly that it will take all the land around the field to hold the crop. The woods are full of fakirs of all sorts, and the new games they spring on the public keeps one busy dodging to avoid not doing what is sensible and avoiding being one of the biting suckers.

It is a good time now to enter your name for all the newspapers you expect to read next year. At this season they all have clubbing rates, which brings the magazines and newspapers to you at wholesale rates. Don't let trashy papers come into your house, even free, but be sure that you have a good variety of reading matter. You can get any number of first rate magazines at from one dollar to three dollars, and all sorts of weekly and daily newspapers at about the same price; and by clubbing a number of these together, you can trim the prices down from twenty-five to forty per cent. A dollar magazine of the real dollar's worth will furnish every individual member of the family more enjoyment than half a dozen of the best dollar shows that come through the country. Not that one should not go to the shows sometime, for every one ought to seek healthy diversion at times, but much of the diversion necessary to the right development of the human mind ought to be found in the reading and discussion of the leading topics that are current before the American people. Read the papers and magazines.

POLITICAL PURITY. "No man who is financially connected with a corporation that is seeking privileges ought to act as a member of a political organization, because he can not represent his corporation and the people at the same time. He can not serve the party while he is seeking to promote the financial interests of the corporation with which he is connected." The above appeared in big black type across the entire front page of The Commoner. In it is the whole truth about the germ of almost all the political corruption of the day. It may be that grafters and grafting are no more common today than at any other period in American history. The struggling colonists had grafting in one form after another to contend with; the revolutionists met the grafter on every hand, and on down through every period of our history the grafter has been getting in his work. The American people have at ways contended that ten or more political parties would keep the political atmosphere pure. Where the parties have kept close together in numerical strength, this has proven fairly satisfactory. All over the South the one-sidedness of things has allowed rings and cliques to rule in the party name, just as the same practice has prevailed in many other districts in the United States when any one party held practically undisputed sway for any lengthy period.

CO-OPERATOR CLIPPINGS. The Rubicon is crossed. Let's never again sell for less than eleven cents. The producers and not the "fixers" must set the price. Let's never tear down. Let's be builders. Mighty few people really attend to business. They make a bluff at it and wonder at their lack of success. The producers' jubilee is coming. There is to be a perfect understanding for just and equitable prices. Never sell on a declining market, and never below eleven cents for cotton, and never below the minimum prices for other commodities. Yes, let's build beautiful homes. Indeed and in truth the home is the hope of the nation. Give us lovely homes. Give us pure homes. A perfect understanding will do the work. Let us swap clothes for biscuits. Surely, now that we have won out again in many ways, every one will take a renewed courage and go to work harder than ever before. The greatest in the kingdom of Justice and Equity which is to be will be the one who has done the most to bring about this happy condition. In that great day of Justice and equity which is to be, the worker, not the shirker, the one who labors, not the one who leans, will be rewarded. Justice, equity and the golden rule. Where, then, is there room for slander and abuse? Builders do not engage in slander and abuse. The man behind the plow is a greater man than he who rules nations. The only truly great man is he who is an all-wise Creator surely never in desire worth will be realized, for the race. If we have been doubting Thomas, let's never be guilty again. Man can not live to himself alone and be happy. We must continually be doing something for others and

Now turn the proposition around and say, "No man who is in a position of trust or responsibility shall be allowed to accept favors from any concern that may seek special privileges under penalty," then it comes home to the smallest, as well as the largest office holder. Our highest offices have been tainted with the odor of attempted double serving, while even county commissioners in some counties have grown wealthy off an income that honestly accounted for could not have exceeded \$50 a month. Now, since there is no probability of two strong political parties all over the South, and in many other sections in the United States, would it not be well for the Farmers' Union to say to the world: "If you want this vote, you must not have the taint of graft on your garments, and you must make good in legislation your platform promises."

GET THE RECORDS. In the last issue of Co-Operator was an editorial paragraph suggesting that the secretaries of local and county Unions have the legislators of their respective districts to send them the daily printed journals of each branch of the legislature. Co-Operator again desires to make this suggestion to Secretaries. Think about the proposition, analyze it, digest it and see if there is not a vast deal more in it than seems to be possible on the surface. The Farmers' Union is not in any sense a political organization, but is in the fullest and only sense a business association, an aggregation of farmers with the firm, fixed purpose and unalterable determination to have a fair deal in the future, in the disposal of their farm products, to fix, maintain and obtain the prices for their products they think just and right, a fair margin above cost of production, a reasonable compensation for their toil, that they may support their families in that comfort that is their due, educate their children, thus keeping their wives and daughters out of the fields entirely, and their boys also, until they have a chance with their sisters to secure the advantages that education gives. That is to say, to support their families and educate their children in a measure and to a degree commensurate with their possessions and that equitable returns thereon will justify. Furthermore, this aggregation of the agricultural classes proposes and intends to be justly and fairly treated in all its dealings in the purchase of needed supplies of every character. It does not want extortionate nor usurious prices for its products and it does not propose that it shall any longer be the victim of shynock. It will exact a fair, reasonable margin for what it has for sale and is willing to pay the same for what it may have to buy. It believes that is the honest, upright, Christian way of doing business, and will pursue the course it has mapped out for itself, relying upon its own intelligence, upon its own integrity of motive, its own frank, candid, impartial, just methods and purity of intention, confident that all the world, save those who thrive by speculation, by spoliation, by over-reaching, by spurious and unscrupulous schemes, will approve and endorse it.—National Co-Operator.
