Portales Bank and Trust Company Commence Business

Have Temporary Quarters in Sanders' Store Till New Building Is Completed

The Portales Bank and Trust company, which has been organized in Portales lately, is making arrangements to open up for business right away, having secured temporary office room in H. M. Sanders' building, on the south side of the square. They have plans made for a building to be built at the west corner of the square, and the contract for its erection will be let May 27th. The building will be 30x80 feet, two story, with pressed brick face and concrete foundation. This will make about the finest business house in town.

The officers of the new bank are as follows: W. G. Johnson, president; C. W. Morris, vice president; J. A. Fairly, cashier. The board of directors consist of the above named gentlemen and R. M. Sanders, C. V. Harris, J. P. Stone, Charles Woodcock, Dr. W. E. Patterson and C. M. Compton. These are well known business men residing here, except the president, W. G. Johnson, who lives in Kentucky. J. A. Fairly will make a competent and reliable cashier for the new bank. He has been assistant cashier of the Citizens National bank and is county

school superintendent. He is an old timer, has held several positions of trust and has the confidence of the people.

The capital stock of this institution is \$25,000.00 and is fully paid up.

Wheat took a jump of from 8 to 11 cents at the Chicago board of trade Monday, owing to the report of extensive damage to the growing crop.

In the town of Clovis, west of Texico, a newspaper has lately been started by A. E. Curran and called the Clovis News. It is rumored that another paper will soon be started there.

One of the most deplorable wrecks ever known occurred last Saturday in California. A special train of Shriners from the east was wrecked and about thirty-five lost their lives and many more injured.

The famous and foolish litigation between the states of Kansas and Colorado over the waters of the Arkansas river for irrigation purposes, has been decided in favor of Colorado. It was a good graft for the lawyers who had a pull.

"Wall street prices are no prices at all," says Andrew Carnegie. "They are fictitious figures which have nothing to do with real values. I have no sympathy for Wall street gamblers. Men who possess standard securities have no cause to worry about their value because of what Wall street gamblers say they are worth."

A great celebration is to be held at Carlsbad, July 3, 4 and 5. The territorial legislature appropriated \$1,500 for this celebration and the town of Carlsbad is raising \$3,000 more. Many prominent men will be there to speak and it is proposed to hold a jubilee on a scale never before attempted in the Pecos Valley. An opportunity will be had of seeing one of Uncle Sam's greatest irrigation projects.

The trial of W. D. Haywood, secretary and treasurer of the Western Federation of Miners, charged with complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Frank Stuenkel, of Idaho, last week. Owing to the interest taken in the case by the labor organizations and the wide publicity it has had, it will receive even greater attention than the Thaw case. Work on securing a jury was progressing at last reports.

Edmond G. Ross, who was governor of New Mexico during the first Cleveland administration, died at his home at Albuquerque May 8. Mr. Ross forty years ago was one of the most noted and most talked of men in the United States. He was then United States Senator from the state of Kansas and one of the Republicans who voted against the impeachment of Andrew Johnson, then President of the United States. He was a printer by trade and for many years also a newspaper editor.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE PORTALES WATER WORKS AND ELECTRIC LIGHT COMPANY

Know all men by these presents: That we, the undersigned citizens of and residing in the Territory of New Mexico, have voluntarily associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, and we hereby certify:

First. That the name of this corporation is "The Portales Water-works and Electric Light Company."

Second. That the location of its principal office and place of business is Portales, Roosevelt county, New Mexico, and its agent in charge thereof and upon whom process against said company may be had is Coe Howard, of Portales, New Mexico.

Third. The objects for which this corporation is formed are to construct, own, maintain and operate a system of water works and electric light and power plant and equipment within the town of Portales and adjacent subdivisions thereof, in Roosevelt county, New Mexico; and in general to do all things necessary to the proper conduct of a water-works and electric light and power plant, system and equipment.

Farmographs
We heard of a farmer near Portales who was plowing the other day, using four horses on the plow and had another horse hitched to one section of a barrow and was driving all five, plowing and harrowing at the same time. This man evidently has caught on to the right idea of dry farming and a good scheme for economy of work as well.

Sheep do well in this part of New Mexico and it is surprising that more of them are not found on the farms of this section. Some lambs were recently sold at Chicago which were shipped from Colorado and brought \$7.50 each. This is pretty good money and coming as it does, along with the wool clip, at a time of the year when the farmer has nothing else to turn off, makes some nice clean money for his exchequer.

A great many farmers are now reporting crops up and looking fine. The weather is still most too cold for the corn and kafir to grow as well as it might but the prospects are good. The farmers here feel that they are exceptionally fortunate, compared with reports coming from their old homes east. The old timers say we have the best outlook for a crop at the present time that ever has been known here at this time of year. The farmers have been hard at work during the winter and early spring, making improvements, putting up fences, etc. Now they are all busy in their crops.

A man told us the other day that John W. Puckett had a small patch of wheat on which he pastured cows and calves all winter, and it furnished lots of pasture in proportion to the size of the patch. That wheat was planted early and shows what wheat will do if planted in time to get a good start before the winter sets in. Some wheat that was planted very late has been disked up this spring. The wheat that was disked up was planted so late that it just barely came up and the dry weather and wind of the late winter and early spring got away with it. We have great hopes of wheat doing fine here if it is planted early so it will get up big enough to stand a spell of dry weather if it should come in the early spring.

Hogs are quite valuable property in this part of New Mexico at the present time. The development of the country has not yet reached the point where the supply reaches the demand. A Texico butcher recently returned from a trip east and bought \$1,250 worth of hogs at Hutchinson, Kansas, and had them shipped to Texico. The Santa Fe New Mexican tells about a number of car loads of hogs being shipped from Northwestern New Mexico to Los Angeles that were fattened on peas. Further on the hog question an exchange says that an acre of gubers will fatten four hogs. Hogs fattened on peanuts makes a very superior quality of meat. The celebrated "Virginia ham" is said to be from hogs fattened on peanuts. The small peanuts which the hogs waste, are scratched for and eat by chickens. As peanuts grow well here, some of our Roosevelt county farmers might produce some peanut fed hogs. But the time will soon come when there will be plenty of corn fed hogs here.

A bulletin recently sent out by the New Mexico experiment makes a point concerning the destruction of the codling moth. The idea is that if the fruit crop is all destroyed, the codling moth will not have any fruit on which to subsist and therefore will be starved out of existence. It is the habit of the codling moth worm to live inside the fruit. It cannot mature on the leaves or other vegetation. As the fruit is practically all destroyed this year it is possible that the crop of codling moth will be materially decreased and will not be present to ravage the fruit next year. To do this work thoroughly, every fruit growing locality in the territory should organize and critically examine all fruit trees in their respective localities, and destroy all fruit left by the frost. By systematic work and taking advantage of the favorable conditions at hand, the expense of destroying what little fruit there may be left will be small. Again, the small amount of fruit that may have escaped the frost will not be worth anything, since all of it will be wormy. Aside from this, it will furnish enough food for the cod-

ling moth during the season and thereby reinfest the orchards the following year. All wild fruits, such as cherries, plums, etc., as well as any kinds of walnuts should also be destroyed.


